Church Conditions in New York.

[From the New York Sun.]

On Monday we analyzed statistics gathered and compiled by the Church Federation of this city, a Protestant organization, relating more specifically to the ages of the population of New York. From the same bulletin we now summarize the very significant facts presented as to the religious divisions and conditions of the people.

It appears from these statistics that New York is becoming less and less of a Christian community. Since fifty years ago, or 1854, the Christian and nominally Christian population per church has nearly doubled. In those fifty years the number of Christian churches increased from 480 to 1,195, but in 1904 there were 3,302 people to a church, while in 1854 the number was

only 1,891. About one-third of the population of New York is now Roman Catholic. About one-half is Protestant, but more than half the Protestants, or more than thing as plain as the nose on his a million, are altogether outside of not in the form of a mandament. Less than one-sixth of the Protestants are communicants of churches, but in addition something more than one-fifth are attendants on churches, that is, pay some heed to religious observances. Add these Jews to the "churchless Protestants" and we get nearly half the population, or more than 45 The Jews number nearly as many as the Protestant communicants and churchgoers put together. The 'churchless" Protestants are nearly as many as the entire Roman Catholic population. It appears, too, from a census made by this federation in various assembly districts that a very large part of the Jews are outside of the synagogues—Hebrews by race rather than in religious belief. If we added their number to the Protestant population not in the communion of churches we should probably get a majority of the people. 





He established a strike-out record for the season by fanning 15 men in nine innings. His percentage of free passes was very small. A pitcher cannot win his game. He must hold down the opposing batsmen while the men behind him manufacture runs. Young's record this year suffered sadly from the inability of his team to make runs. Mathewson was much more fortunate in this respect. Young's opponents made off his delivery an average of a little more than two runs a game, and only a fraction of a hit more than Mathewson's opponents did off his. Old Cy got his "bumps." and got them often. The heartless records show that he won 18 and lost 19, while the mighty Mathewents hit him safely an average of 6.5 a game. In Christy's 36 games his opponents made 67 runs, an average of 1.86 per game, while they made 226 safe hits, an average of 6.3 per game. Mathewson's fine average was due in a large measure to his splendid support, not in fielding particularly, but in rungetting. Old Cy has wonderful control. He gave but 30 bases on balls in 37 games, while Mathewson gave 60 in 36 games. Cy struck out 208 men, while Matty fanned 174. All of which goes to show that the "old man" is still among the top-notchers.-New York Globe.


