Resents Imputations Cast by the Drayton-Acworth Report.

SMITHERS AT MONTREAL

System Is Prepared To Make Any Improvements Required.

Montreal, May 15.—The Grand Trunk Railway is opposed to the nationalization scheme outlined in the Drayton-Acworth report, and it is believed this has brought A. W. Smithers, chairman of the board of directors, to Canada. Mr. Smithers reached Montreal today. The London board of the Grand Trunk and Grand Trunk Pacific resents the imputation cast by the Drayton-Acworth report on the financial strength of the Grand Trunk.

It is understood that the Grand Trunk directors desire the nationalization of the Grand Trunk Pacific if they are relieved of further financial responsibility for their road, and are reimbursed to the extent of their investment in the western company. They will fight the nationalization of the Grand Trunk System, and are prepared and have the financial resources to make any Improvements or additions to equipment required.

Ottawa, May 14 .- The follow ng statement was issued fepartment of agriculture The enthusiasm displayed in the matter of planting potatoes is only equaled by the enthusiasm with which potato prices are climbing up. It now costs from forty-five to fifty dollars for seed to plant an acre of potatoes. It is obvious that at these prices potatoes do not give sufficient food value. Housekeepers could well eliminate the potato and turn to more economic foods, and by such elimination leave that by such elimination leave that much more seed to be planted for the much-needed crop this year.

In the scarcity of potatoes it would be well for planters to turn to the question of beans. The same money that will plant an acre of potatoes, if invested in beans, will provide seed for more than ten acres. They are not only an excellent and nutritious form of food, but it looks as if they will continue to be in strong demand for army supplies, and companies with army contracts, are offering as high as polies, and companies with army contracts, are offering as high as five dollors a bushel for this year's crop. Soils suitable for potatoes are generally also suit-able for beans.



### LIEUTENANT IN U.S. **RECEIVES MORE THAN** MAJOR IN CANADA

American Officers' Pay Away Above Canadian Scale.

BUT PRIVATE IS LOWER

Lowest Rank Serving Uncle Sam Receives But 50 Cents a Day.

In view of the fact that since United In view of the fact that since United States has entered the war on the side of the Allied nations, there is a probability that the United States and Canadian officers will rub shoulders on the front in France, a comparison of the rates of pay for officers of the same rank in each army is of timely interest. The Advertiser military reporter has comparisons.

Although politically the United States

parisons.

Although politically the United States is popularly considered a more "democratic" country than Canada, where a ruling class exists, yet when the difference between the rates of pay received by the officers and that received by the men of the United States army is considered, it would appear that Canada is the more democratic of the two as far as the fighting forces of the two countries are concerned.

Lieutenans Gets 35 Per Day.

Lieutenant Gets \$5 Per Day.

In this country a lieutenant gets only double the pay of a private, the lieutenant receiving \$2 and the private \$1 per day, while across the border line a second lieutenant is paid almost \$5 per day and the man in the rank and file draws only about 50 cents as a daily stipend. According to these rates, the lieutenant in the United States army would be paid ten times as much as a private, which does not seem to tend toward democracy and equality as much as Canadian rates of \$2 and \$1 respectively.

In comparing the pay of officers in Canada and those of similar rank in the country to the south, the various allowance provided in addition to the regular pay must also be considered. A good idea of the comparative rates may be obtained if the second lieutenant in the United States army is taken as an example. An officer of this rank is paid \$1,700 per year, which is considerably more than a major in the Canadian army receives, name \$1,460. Referring to the congestion in delivery of parcels, etc., to the soldiers, the minister of public works stated that the difficulty had been altered, and now parcels were being delivered twice a week to the Canadian prisoners of war in Germany. Touching on his visit to the trenches in France the returning minister of public works said that he had had the pleasure of meeting Canadians along the firing lines. "They are covering themselves with glory," he said. "They are doing magnificent work which is gaining them the admiration of everyone."

Detroit United Kanway stock has been placed on an eight-per-cent divi-dend basis, with the declaration of two per cent for the current quarter, payable June 1 next to shareholders of record May 16.

The increase from a seven to an eight-per-cent basis is made just a year after the rate had been advanced from six to seven per cent.

The company has been benefitting to an unusual degree by the rapid growth of Detroit and its surrounding district. Among the larger public utilities of the continent there was probably none which approached the company's earning expansion in 1916. Gross earnings for the year showed an ncrease of 28 per cent, and net income an increase of 47 per cent, as compared with the previous year. The increase in net income, alone amounting to \$920,030, was \$170,000 more than the company had been distributing annually in

Before deductions for depreciation reserve, earnings were equivalent to 25 per cent on the common stock, affording ample justification for the seven-per-cent dividend decided on a year ago, or more if the directors chose.

### WOMEN GOOD RISKS.

It is well known to mothers that boys are more difficult to rear than girls, the fact being generally ascribed to the greater amount of "original sin"

But probably it is not realized that no fewer than four boys die to each three girls who succumb to the adverse conditions of life during the first three months. This is the startling fact which the figures for England and Wales bring out. We can find only one sufficient explanation for it—namely, that girls are born with more vitality, that boys are less resistent to disease.

The male mortality excess begins at the moment of birth, when 180 boys die to every 145 girls. Then inborn physical defects seem to be more prevalent among boys, for seven deaths among boys are ascribed to this cause, as compared with six among girls. And boys do not thrive so well as girls, for the vasting diseases of early infancy carry off fifty boys for every 41 girls. As soon as the infectious diseases begin their attacks boys yield to them

As soon as the infectious diseases begin their attacks boys yield to them far more readily than girls, with the single exception of whooping cough. Tubercular disease, convulsions, intestinal troubles, bronchitis and pneumonia and other maladies all kill more boy than girl infants in their first year. The gures are surprising.

All through life the death rate from nearly every disease is greater among males than among females—no fewer than fifteen men die of tubercular diseases to eleven women, twelve from pneumonia to eight women, five from typhold fever to three women, eight from appendicitis to six women, and so on.—San Francisco Chronicle.

Conservatives Now Favor the Proposal Once Rejected.

TORY MOVER THIS TIME

[Special to The Advertiser.]
OTTAWA, May 14.—There may be a change in the Canadian franchise act before this session ends. Today there was talk about voting and voters. It was brought on by a resolution offered by Dr. M. Steela, Conservative, of South Perth. He called attention to the fact that there were men at the front who, while old enough to fight, were not old enough to vote under the laws of Canada. He asked the House to agree that every enlisted soldier, without regard to age, should have the vote.

This same proposal was made from the Liberal side, two years ago, when the soldiers' vote bill was under discussion, Hen. Charles Marcil having moved it, and Hon. Arthur Meighen, with the members behind the Government, having opposed it. Today Mr. Meighen and the Conservative members favored the proposal.

Before the debate ended there were some words about the propriety of allowing naturalized aliens the vote during the war, and there is every indication that the question will be heard of again.


