Tokio, May 29, 8 p.m.—(Delayed in transmission)— Admiral Togo continues his great sweep to the northward in pursuit of the remnant of the Russian fleet. Tokio, May 29.-Togo's casualties are not reported, but are insignificant. It is believed that the Russian casualties are heavy, although the Japanese appear to have rescued a large number.

The captured ships with prisoners and wounded are arriving at Sasebo. A number of Russian prisoners were landed on Tsu Island. Three hundred, believed to be from the transport Ural, have been landed on the Iwami coast, The political effect of the battle and its influence upon commerce has been already felt. At noon today the navy department notified shipping men that the sea was free. There was a scene of wild enthusiasm on the stock exchange this afternoon. Prices in some instances were the highest since the war began. The Emperor, princes and ministers are dispatching congratulations to Admiral Togo who, it is expected, will be given high rank and other imperial honors. Already a popular idol, he has become a demigod in the popular estimation. It is also expected that Vice-Admiral Kamimura, Rear Admiral Kataoka and other commanders will be honored.

Foreign observers sharply criticise Vice-Admiral Rojestvensky and Rear Admiral Nebogatoff, despite the meagerness of the knowledge of the details and conditions which governed them. Admiral Rojestvensky is criticised for not sending his light cruisers and transports by the northern straits, his failure to arrange a co-operation with the Vladivostock squadron, and his battle formation, which consisted of all the strong ships on the starboard column, and the weaker craft on the port column. Rear-Admiral Nebogatoff's courge, in surrendering on Sunday apparently without a fight, is questioned, although it is admitted that his ships were evidently badly bat-







LONDON, TUESDAY, MAY 30. The New Champions.

In the year 1884 the Government of Sir John A. Macdonald proposed to set farther eastward the limits of the Province of Manitoba, then a Consersion by force, for delivery to Manitoba, and for a time armed conflict seemed friends. possible

The matter was taken to the courts. The late Hon. David Mills prepared Ontario's case, and Hon, Edward Blake argued it before the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council in England. Every Conservative denounced the Liberals for this, but the court said the lands belonged to Ontario. We have them now, valuable mines, forests, water-powers and plowlands. Foiled!

In the year 1883 the Conservative Government at Ottawa, conceived the idea that the liquor license administration might be made valuable politiacted, the McCarthy Act, inaugurating a Dominion liquor license system. The provinces resisted, and everywhere were found two sets of license commissioners, both claiming the exclusive right to issue, and both issuing licenses. Doaninion licensees were summoned for selling. The matter went to the Privy Council and the Dominion act was held ultra vires the Parliament of Canada. Foiled again!

In 1895 the question of separate schools or no separate schools for the province was passed upon at a general. election in Manitoba, and by an almost unanimous vote the people resolved on public schools only. We are not concerned in this article with the question of the desirability of separate schools, but with that of provincial rights. The minority appealed under the B. N. A. Act to the Governor-Genservative Government, who promptly and peremptorily commanded the province to restore the old school system. The province refused, and the Conservative Government at Ottawa brought in a bill known as the remedial bill, also under the B. N. A. Act, setting forth a new school law for Manitoba, to be saddled on that province willynilly. Happily the Liberal leader was Wilfrid Laurier. He proposed a conciliatory attitude towards the Manitobans, and an effort to find a basis satisfactory to both parties. The Conservatives refused to listen, and insisted on coercing the province. The parties went to the country on that issue. R. L. Borden, in Halifax, and William Gray, in London, supported and worked hard for the party which staked its fate on coercion. This time the country spoke. Liberalism won R. L. Borden and William Gray and all the other coercionists failed.

The last years of the Conservative administration at Ottawa were filled with instances where little railways a few miles or a few score miles long and wholly within the province, and having no interests outside of it, were declared by the Conservative administration to be "for the general advantage of Canada," so as to give the Federal Government jurisdiction over them and to take them out of the control of the province.

These are the people-not merely the party, but the very persons-who are now posing as the champions of provincial rights. Will any Liberal, with of these new pretenders before him, trust their hypocritical pretensions?

Mr. Gray and the Workingmen

Some features of Mr. Gray's campaign in November last, which were effective for the time being, are recoiling upon his head. He made an elaborate pose as the representative of the working classes. His portrait looked out from the pages of the Free Press every day, with the flaring inscription, "The Workingman's Friend." Unserupulous methods were employed to prejudice Mr. Hyman in the estimation of the workers, as, for example, the untruthful story that he had sided with the railway companies against the members of the Grand Trunk Provident Society, and had burked legislation desired by railway employes. Mr. Hyman was depicted as a haughty patrician, and Mr. Gray as the tribune and plain friend of the plain people. "Codlin's your friend, not Short." The Conservative candidate plied the arts of the demagogue, and appealed to class feeling. He has no one but himself to blame if the workingmen are now asking him to produce his credentials. A good many of them took him at his word in November, but their eyes were soon opened by the labor organ. As a citizen of London Mr. Gray had a right to actively oppose the unions during the street car trouble. No crime is imputed to him because his sympa-


