#### A SUGGESTION

Dr. A W Thornton has a suggestion which it would be well for the Public and C. C. I. Boards to consider

Public and C. C. I. Boards to consider and act upon, viz., the systematic teaching of music, vocal and instrumental, in the different schools in the city.

"This is a matter," said the doctor yesterday morning, "which is in my opinion, very important, and I think the scheme should be adopted in our schools. There is nothing which has a more elevating effect upon society in general than has music, in its various forms, and if it were taught in the public schools, the result I think would be most satisfactory.

"I am not referring especially to the teaching of songs to the children. This is done now, and is a good be-

This is done now, and is a good be-ginning, but I would go further and teach the children to read music and teach the children to read music and play on instruments. I think it is a necessary part of their education. "I am very sorry to see that the McKeough School band is being allowed to drop. It is really a mistake. More children were given an insight into music through that band than during any other period in the history of schools and it will be a history of schools, and it will be a pity if the band is allowed to drop out of existence. As was predicted during the last session of Parliament, Canada has secured nothing from Great Britain in return for the concessions granted to British goods under our present tariff. Sir Wilfrid Laurier, by his senseless attitude in 1897, when he told the home Government that Canada was opposed to a preference for her goods in British markets, destroyed his own and his colleagues' usefulness at the Coronation Conference. 





sel or fort. The yellow flag shows a vessel to be in quarantine or is a sign of a contagious disease.

A "flag of truce" is a white flag displayed to an enemy to indicate a desire for parley or consultation.

loss or death of some of their crew.

Flags are used as the symbol of rank and command, the officers using them being called "flag officers." Such flags are square to distinguish them from other banners.

The white flag is a sign of peace. After a battle parties from both sides often go out to the field to rescue the wounded or bury the dead under the protection of the white flag.
