

A license granted to operate a merry-go-round also contributed a tidy sum towards swelling the receipts.

Our rate of two per cent last year was insufficient to cover the expenditures herein before mentioned leaving us as in former yars with a debit balance to face and which must be seriously considered in preparing our estimates for the future.

It was thought advisable last year when the estimates were being made up that owing to the fact of the War being in progress and our citizens being called on for donations for the various funds being raised t assist the various charitable objects that we should endeavor to keep the rate as low as possible and economize until the load our citizens were carrying was removed. This was done with the results as heretofore mentioned. Sooner or later the Council must face an adjustment that will provide for the cleaning up of outstanding loans and give the Town a clean sheet.

We submit these facts for your serious consideration and recommend that economy should be our watch word until the condition s now existing are removed.


