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Knighthood.

The press, without respect to political party preferences, has wondered about some of the royal honours bestowed at the coronation. Canada is a democratic country—democratic to the hilt,—to use an oft quoted phrase,—and should remain so. The creation of an aristocracy here cannot be any advantage to the country. Sir this and Lord that may behave very well, and be very much in sympathy with the people notwithstanding their high sounding titles, but it is likely that a lot of people may foolishly fancy themselves superior beings because descended from or in some way related to titled men. We could wish that every Canadian offered an old world title would do as did Alexander MacKenzie and others—decline it. Let the Sirs and Lords, with all the class distinctions, etc., which attach to the possession of such titles, be confined to the land in which they originated. The 'Beyond the Seas,' dominions of the Empire would be better off without such things.—Maritime Baptist.

Maitre Labouri.

The famous defender of Captain Dreyfus, Maitre Labouri, has been elected Batonnier (or head) of the French Bar, a position which the ignominy consequent upon his great exploit prevented him from reaching before. The news has been cordially received in English legal quarters, where he is well known. Burke said that the practice of the law was not calculated to liberalise the understanding, and much contemporary evidence can be cited to support his dictum. But the admiration and sympathy which the English Bar felt at Labouri's great achievement was genuine, and much of its warmth still remains. Soon after the Rennes trial Labouri came over to be the guest of honor at the annual dinner of the Hardwicke Society, where he delighted everyone with his vivacious eloquence and cultured wit. It is interesting to note the contrast between an advocate like Labouri and the counsel who comprise at present the chief ornaments of the criminal Bar. Since Sir Charles Mathews went to the Treasury eloquence akin to Labouri's has not been heard in our criminal courts. The self-renderer of which eloquence is the expression at the Bar is entirely wanting in our present-day advocates, who are always clear headed and cautious,

seldom inaccurate and untechnical, and never eloquent enough to be wrong. Labouri, with his fast-kindling sympathies and hot-blooded eloquence, was the man to right a great injustice, and his English conferees welcome the honor bestowed upon him.




