The Nova Scotia Fruit Growers Association held its annual convention at Kentville last week The meetings were held in the aich day were largely attended veter From the interest displayed by the members it looks as though the fruit growing industry of Nova Scotia is going to have quite boom during the present year. The first session was held on Tuesday morning at eight o'clock. President Shaw gave a careful and xhaustive review of the Association's work during the year.
He spoke of the trials that the Fruit' Growers had been called lo undergo during the year, such as
late frosts, the severe outbreak of scaib, the shor seve of barrels, aitd the severe frost in October. He deprecated the enormous freight charges they were obliged to pay he ocean steamship lines, and

No. IV. THE PIPE ORGAN
The pipe organ is without oubt the noblest of all instru ments-the wonderful evolution
of the centuries. This instru ment is invested with such dignity yet possessing such mas ive tones that no other instru nent approaches. The Pipe O gan originated in ancient Greece from the "Pan Pipes" which con sisted of a series of whistles fast ned together and blown by the mouth. These same pipes wer fterwards placed on a wind box nd supplied with air through
bellows. The number of pipe bellows. The number of pipes wind than the and required mor produce. so a series of bellow was arranged and persons wer engaged to walk upon them, forc ing in the air by their weight Then a water system or hydraulic pressure was introduced, then pneumatic and now electricity which is more powerful and en Now quicker action, ete.

Space will not allow to explain aily the gradual advancement and growth of the Pipe Organ but it is most interesting.
The tone of the organ in it arier stage was much more lusty than the present day organ. It
is recorded that the pipe voices were so loud and strong that listeners could not venture near with uncovered ears.
The modern pipe organ is known to all but its parts and working known. The kind of pipes are of the whistle or flute type, also
