In fact the examples of the idiom are not soon to be reckoned np. A curious incidental illustration of the fact first revealed by the cylinders, is the promise made by Belshazzar, that whoever interpreted the handwriting on the wall should be made the third in the kingdom. Why should he not have said second, as is proposed in other similar cases, as by Pharaoh, Ahasuerus, and Nebuchadnezzar?
