A VERY sad accident occurred near North Bastion, on Tuesday, the 27th of September. A number of boats were out merrily, and about three o'clock in the afternoon most of them started for the shore. At the time there was a fair sailing breeze, and all the boats were gliding along nicely. When about two miles from land, one of the boats struck by John, Joseph, Moses and Paul O'Connell, brothers, was suddenly stopped by a squall or whirlwind, capsized and sunk. One of the brothers got hold of an oar, and another of two pieces of board, and thus managed to keep afloat. But Joseph and Paul sank with the boat, and were never seen again, and up to the present their bodies have not been discovered. The accident was observed from a boat at some distance away, and the two surviving brothers were rescued about fifteen minutes after they had been precipitated into the water. None of the other boats experienced the squall, or anything unusual in the wind or water. Joseph was about 30 years of age, married, and leaves a wife and child; Paul was about 19 years.

We are glad to find that Trotting is about to be resumed in this county under very favorable auspices. The races on Wednesday to-day will be the best ever witnessed on the Island. The stables now will have for contestants: "Black Pilot," record of 31; "Island Chief," 34; "Hernando," 37; "Dan Smith," 34; "Black Eagle" (a dark horse), and three or four fast ones from Nova Scotia. These splendid horses will make a race of the season, and better than will be made than ever was thought of on an Island track. The green race is chiefly for farmers' horses, and will draw a large number. As professional drivers are barred, there will be no jockeying, all will have a fair chance. The Island is being largely every year for want of good trotting contests. Horses are sold here for a trifle, in a short time, with good training, we hear of them trotting so fast that they are sold for thousands of dollars. By promoting good races all this money would remain on the Island, as well as providing much-needed recreation for the hard-working farmers and mechanics.

Telegraphic News.

MOSCOW, Oct. 7.—The workmen in a cotton mill at Kilia raised a riot yesterday and set fire to the factory, which was destroyed. Many persons were killed. Troops have been sent.

OTTAWA, Oct. 7.—The sum contributed by the A. W. M. Association toward the Pope's Jubilee Fund is \$6,000, of which the city gave \$1,600.

OTTAWA, Oct. 7.—Sir John has written Mr. C. J. Fox, suggesting that a delegate to the Interprovincial Conference, on the ground that it would be for his purpose.

OTTAWA, Oct. 7.—Owing to the prevalence of Asiatic cholera in Italy and the Mediterranean ports the importation of rugs into the Dominion from those regions is prohibited.

LONDON, Oct. 7.—The Sultan of Morocco, who has been critically ill for some time, is dead. His sixteen-year-old son took the oath of office on his father's corpse, assumed the government, appointing his favorite uncle Grand Vizier.

England has made a proposition to the Powers to all send men of war to the coast to protect their respective subjects.

OTTAWA, Oct. 7.—The revenue of Canada for the past three months of the current fiscal year was \$8,077,000. The expenditures for the same period was \$6,837,000, leaving the handsomely surplus of \$1,240,000. The net debt of Canada on the 30th September was \$227,340,000, showing a decrease during the month of September alone of \$1,183,000. The balance to the credit of the Government on the 30th September was \$21,521,000.

BUDAPEST, Oct. 8.—Twelve persons who left Trieste to destroy the wolves in the district were overpowered and seven of them were devoured.

PETRI, Oct. 9.—Owing to the alarming increase of brigandage in Zala and Veszprim, the Hungarian Government has placed those countries under martial law.

OTTAWA, Oct. 9.—Earthquake shocks are felt daily in the vicinity of Corinth. The inhabitants are camping in the fields.

RICHMOND, Va., Oct. 9.—Hon. Rufus A. Ayres, Attorney-General of Virginia, was jailed last night for refusing to pay a fine of \$400 imposed by Judge of the United States Circuit Court for contempt. The people of the State sympathize with Ayres. Governor Fitzhugh Lee, characterizes Judge Richmond as an outrage upon the constitutional rights of the State.

SOFIA, Oct. 9.—All the Government candidates have been elected and the result in the Principality are favorable to the Government. Election affairs in which blood was shed are reported at Vienna, Catinicola and Blovina. A crowd of citizens made an enthusiastic demonstration this evening at the palace of the Premier and Prince Ferdinand, who presided the loyalty of the people.

Sofia says the Russo-Turkish negotiations will be labor in vain. It is well known once for all that Bulgaria will never be abandoned by the Prince if he is chosen.

BALFAS, Oct. 9.—Sir Charles Tupper arrived from England to-day on the Nova Scotia, after an unusually rough passage. He leaves for Amherst to-morrow. In a few days he proceeds to Ottawa, and will return to England by the middle of November to complete some important business now in progress of negotiation there. Sir Charles called at St. John's and interviewed the local Government there in reference to Newfoundland's position on the Commission and other matters pertaining to the welfare of that colony. It is understood that the subject of Federation was talked over unofficially.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 9.—Messrs. Putnam and Angell, who with Secretary Bayard, represent this country in the negotiations between Great Britain and the United States, for the settlement of the fishery dispute arising under the treaty of 1818, arrived here yesterday and held a preliminary conference with Secretary Bayard. A mutual interchange of views and a general discussion of the subject of negotiations took place. Messrs. Putnam and Angell will remain here a few days in conference with the Secretary examining the voluminous official literature relating to the treaty.

NEW YORK, Oct. 10.—A child 18 months old died of cholera at Swinburn Island yesterday. This is the 17th death on the island, among the American passengers, a total of 20 deaths in all, comfort attending their case. 477 times.

LONDON, Oct. 10.—An immense meeting under the auspices of the National League was held on Sunday at the conference of the Sea and River Rivers in Ireland. The water was covered with the boats and barges bearing the participants. The usual resolutions denouncing the course of the Government in Ireland were adopted. The police were completely outwitted, having no knowledge whatever of the meeting.

ALBANY, N. S., Oct. 10.—The election court sat at 9 1/2 am, having with consent of counsel, adjourned from 10 a. m. Judge McDonald presided. The adjournment was to enable the respondent Sir Charles Tupper to be present. The petitioner, Mr. Phipps, and Sir Charles were both present in court. Mr. Condon for the petitioner, stated that he had on September 27th received notice admitting bribery by agents of the respondent, Mr. Tupper.
