

Height of Waves of the Open Sea.

Maximum Storm Wave is Thirty Feet - One Wave was 106 Feet High. New York, Aug. 25. -Measurements of the size of waves have now been made systematically for many years, but they relate chiefly to the waves of the open sea; where the depth of the water is so great that the friction of the sea bottom exercises no modifying effect.

According to Vaughan Cornish, who has probably devoted more attention to this subject than any other contemporary man of science, the average height of the waves encountered in a severe storm at sea is 20 feet, but the ordinary maximum height of the waves in the same storm will attain 30 feet. In a 500 ft. of very exceptional violence the average height may reach 30 feet, and the maximum height 45 feet. This is regarded as about the limit of the height of waves due to wind only.

At Wick two stones weighing eight and ten tons each were thrown over the parapet of the breakwater, the top of which was 21 feet above high water, while blocks of concrete weighing respectively 1,350 and 2,500 tons were displaced, though there is some doubt whether the later movement was due entirely to wave action.



Why Does Not the Premier Dismiss

CROSBIE AND PICCOTT?

Yesterday we asked what new markets had been found by the Morris Government for the sale of our dry fish.

We also asked how many quintals of fish had been shipped to the new markets. As might be expected the Government organ makes no attempt at answering these questions. Three years ago, Sir Edward Morris promised to find new markets, and his candidates re-echoed the promise throughout the length and breadth of the land. Two and a half years have rolled by since Sir Edward Morris took charge of affairs, and to-day the Government cannot point to a single new market for our staple, and cannot point to a single cod's tail shipped as a result of any exertion by it to place dry fish in a country, which did not import it, before Sir Edward Morris became Premier. He was going to provide a live up-to-date fishery department that would enable the fishermen of the island to get the full value of their labour. And what has he done? He provided Mr. Piccott with his seasonal pay, pickings, pensions, and \$2000 a year besides, and enables him to have a fine time at his five up-to-date project of Morris has turned out a complete failure, and the Minister is, according to the organ of the Fishermen's Union, "the worst failure" yet. He has signalled his term of office by failing completely to keep fishermen in touch with the prices of their staple in the foreign markets, and of the conditions of the markets. His chief claim to notoriety to-day is his failure as a strike-breaker. While Minister of the Fishery Department he aids and abets the Hon. John Crosbie in an attempt to break a strike on his premises. He joins the latter in his automobile and proceeds to Bay Roberts, a part of the District he represents as a member of the House of Assembly, and inveigles some of the voters of that constituency, which had endorsed his appointment as Minister of Fisheries, to proceed to St. John's and do work which members of the Labourers' Union had struck against doing. When the Bay Roberts men found they had been inveigled into doing work which they could not continue to do without incurring the odium of being "scabs," they also struck work. That being so, what is to be thought of Mr. Piccott who went to Bay Roberts to bring them over? What is to be thought of Hon. J. C. Crosbie who took Piccott to Bay Roberts? What is to be thought of the two conspiring to inveigle the Bay Roberts men to become scabs? What does the country think of Piccott and Crosbie as leaders of a People's Party? They are good enough as leaders of a People's Party, notorious for giving out and reckless expenditure, but they are as much out of place in a real

That Bigamy Case.

THE PRINCIPAL IN IT ARRESTED YESTERDAY.

Yesterday we exclusively referred to the fact that a man was being sought for by the Harbor Grace police on a charge of bigamy. His name is Pascoe Puddister, of Northern Bay, and he was arrested yesterday afternoon and lodged in the Harbor Grace jail. The facts of the case are: About ten years ago Puddister married a young woman named Reid, of Lower Island Cove, and for some time he worked at the Workington mine, being coachman there with Mr. C. Duder. When work concluded there, he with his wife went to Sydney, and were there for some time when he left his wife and three children, the issue of the marriage, and went to the United States. The woman with her children, one of whom died after a while, came back to Northern Bay and lived for a time with her father there, but later went to Boston in search of her husband. After staying a couple of years there she came to St. John's where, upon the expiry of seven years, as she had not heard from her husband, she married a man named Driscoll, and both are still residing in this city at present. About a year ago Puddister returned and went to Northern Bay patients on his wife's second marriage, and there became enamored of a young woman named Hogan. He proposed marriage and was accepted, but the young woman's parents did their utmost to dissuade both from the step they had intended taking, but without avail. They were married at Harbor Grace a few days ago, the man carefully hiding his antecedents from the officiating clergyman, who performed the ceremony without a knowledge of the facts. The prisoner will be tried in the Supreme Court.

Iron That Will Not Rust

Massive Pillar on Plains of Delhi Good After 30 Centuries.

On the plains of Delhi, in India, there stands a massive pillar, nearly 50 feet in length and weighing about 19 tons. Says the Engineering Magazine: "This ancient column is literally a monument to the 'antiquated' processes and metallurgists that produced it, for it has resisted the attack of the elements during a period of about two thousand nine hundred years, in which fully a million times its bulk of iron or steel has rusted into useless dust."

No one would suggest that civilized man return to the primitive and laborious methods by which the iron of this column was made so long ago, and besides there are not men enough here today to supply our present demands, even if all of them should engage in this type of manufacture. But, granting that the world would pay for a limited amount of iron as "passive" as this old Kutub pillar; it is very doubtful whether iron workers know how to make it.

Probably this specimen of unusual iron is the result of accident rather than design, as far as its resisting qualities are concerned, and it stands to-day the survival of the fittest, not so much because it was intended to be as because it proved to be the most lasting. For it is not likely that a process known to give iron of this kind would have been used so seldom, since the importance of rust resisting iron and steel was so much appreciated in those days as now.

No doubt all the older processes made iron and steel which rusted less—yes, and some of it very much less—than what is usually produced to-day but there is a great difference between this mere excellence and a resistance to corrosion during 30 centuries, such as this column shows.

Developments in the Moroccan negotiations are not expected while the French Cabinet is digesting Germany's proposals, and while France's answer thereto is in course of preparation. The situation is quiet enough to justify the French Ambassador in leaving Berlin to spend several days at Dresden. The German Chancellor has returned to his country place in Prussia. Urgentness persists among the uninformed public. The run on the Savings Bank at Stettin has ceased, but a similar run started on the banks at Koenigsberg, the capital of the Province of East Prussia.

100,000 Drowned.

Special to Evening Telegram: PEKIN, To-Day.

Only meagre reports have reached the capital from the walled town in the region of the Yangtze Valley, where floods have hemmed them in. The reports of missionaries and other foreigners, received by the American mission at Wuhu, estimate that 100,000 people were drowned by the overflowing of the banks of the Yangtze.

Facing Starvation.

Special to Evening Telegram: SHANGHAI, To-Day.

Famine riots are spreading at Changzhou. The American chapel was sacked. With large areas of land under water the populace is desperate and in face of prospective starvation. In the Shanghai market the visible supply of rice will last ten days.

NOTHING OFFICIAL ANNOUNCED.

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, Sept. 8. Various suggestions have been made as to the character of Germany's reply to the French proposals in regard to Morocco, as given to Ambassador Cambon in Berlin yesterday afternoon, but no information that can be regarded as official has yet become public. The most general impression is that while Germany signifies assent to the French proposals, in their essence, she raises points on which further negotiations will be necessary.

DAILY MAIL STORY.

A diplomatic correspondent, whose communication is conspicuously featured by the Daily Mail, asserts that he is able to state the French proposals with greater precision than has previously been done. According to this account, the United States is directly concerned in the negotiations inasmuch as she would be called upon to be a signatory to a formal treaty, by which full liberty of action is to be guaranteed to France.

FRANCE'S COMPENSATION.

The statement continues that the sacrifice of territory in French Congo, which France is prepared to make, though not so great as Germany demanded, is of such extent that when it is made known the French people will be astonished, and, perhaps, exasperated, but compensation will be found in the revenues which the French Government secure in Morocco. These are not merely political, but also commercial, and are to be embodied in a formal treaty not alone with Germany but with the Powers of Europe and the United States.

AN INTERNATIONAL TREATY.

The Franco-German agreement of 1909, it is added, acknowledges the political interests of France and the commercial interests of Germany in Morocco. That agreement Germany declares to have been broken by the military action of France in the Soudan Empire. To renew it in its present form would be to invite a repetition of the Agadir incident at some future time. France is determined to avoid the danger, and it is proposed that the new agreement shall take the form of a treaty or convention signed by the Powers of Europe and the States.

THE POWERS AGREED.

If Germany consents, both Austria and Italy are prepared to follow her example, while Britain and Russia have already signified their approval of the terms of this proposed treaty, which are more precise than those of the Franco-German agreement of 1909. They acknowledge not merely the political interests of France in Morocco, but also her military interests. Any dispute as to interpretation of this treaty would be referred, not to Germany, but to Europe and the States.

OPEN DOOR IN MOROCCO.

France, it is stated, does not propose to concede to Germany any of the rights, commercial, industrial or otherwise in Morocco that are not possessed by the other signatories of the Algeiras agreement of 1905. The French Government, however, is prepared to renew in a more definite form its undertaking to maintain an open door in Morocco, and to give any necessary assurances and guarantees.

WAR MOVEMENTS.

Special Evening Telegram. PARIS, Sept. 8. La Liberte this afternoon affirms that notwithstanding denials and explanations, Germany is gradually concentrating troops close to the French frontier. Careful inquiries by that paper show that 30,000 infantry, 10,000 cavalry and 150 guns have been gathered in a triangle, which has for its points Moneils, Vic and Dienne. Numerous forces have been drawn up opposite Nancy, and immense accumulations of war materials have been disposed along the German frontier.

NICE, Sept. 8. The El Dorado Theatre here collapsed to-day and forty-four workmen were buried in the ruins.

Man Seriously Injured.

HAD NARROW ESCAPE FROM BEING BURNED TO DEATH.

Shortly after 4 p.m. yesterday, Mr. Benjamin Stafford while at work in the pharmacy of Dr. Stafford, his father, at the foot of Theatre Hill, had a narrow escape from being burned to death. He was at work mixing and heating some chemicals when some alcohol which was near took fire and in an instant the man was surrounded by flame which he vainly attempted to extinguish. His clothing took fire, and before anything could be done to quench the blaze, his hands were terribly burned, his hair was singed, he was also blistered about the legs and his mustache was obliterated by the fire, while his face was badly blistered. It was fortunate for him that there were present in the store Dr. Campbell, Dan O'Connell, Robert Dowden and Mr. Rendell, or he certainly must have been incinerated. The wall caught fire also, and taking matting off the floor these gentlemen enveloped the man with it and quenched the flames which were consuming his clothing and burning his flesh. Mr. Stafford suffered agonies of pain, and Dr. Campbell with the young man's father bound up the hands and applied anodynes to soothe the pain which he felt. He was later driven to his home, and it will be many weeks before he can be again at business. So intense was the heat caused by the fire that some of the tops on the soda water fountain were melted off.

**Special Hints on
Gas Cooking.**

Sometimes all the gridiron shelves are required; then put the browning shelf over all, but now and then it will be found necessary to move up the cakes, etc., from the second shelf to the first one nearer the browning shelf, in order to acquire a better colour.

Another point often forgotten is that the oven will remain hot for some time after it has had the gas turned off. This heat can be utilised for baking custards, finishing the cooking of large cakes, milk puddings, etc., or if there is no cooking to be done, put in a large vessel containing water to heat, to use for washing up after the meal is concluded.

Another way to reduce the waste of gas is, when grilling or roasting is being done, utilise the heat over the burner by boiling the kettle or some saucepan over it. It is extravagant to light another burner for boiling purposes when the grill is alight.

Received Nasty Cut.

Yesterday a man named Dawe, who resides off Barter's Hill, came to the police court seeking the liberation of his son, who is doing a term in jail and so noisy did he become that Sergt. Oliphant had to threaten to jail him before he would leave the Court House. 
