Much higher waves occasionally occur as a result of earthquake or seaquakes. "Solitary" waves of this character have sometimes been encountered in otherwise tranquil weather, taking vessels by surprise and not infrequently sending them to the bottom.

According to Vaughan Cornish, who has probably devoted more attention to this subject than any other con-

This is regarded as about the limit of the height of wayes of the wind in miles per hour. She left here on July 3rd, went to Sydney and thence to Montreal where she took a full general cargo with a deck load of boats, etc., for Revillion Bros., Hudson Bay. The ship was bound to Port Harrison in the Bay on the east side of it about half way up to James Bay. She arrived there on th 1st August, met little ice but had very foggy weather. From there she went to Strutten Island, arriving on August | 7th, this place being up in the bottom of James Bay, and remained until the 16th, then returned to Port Harrison, arriving on the 18th, leaving there for Wakeham's Bay on the 20th and arriving on the 23rd. That day she spoke the schr. Laddie, Capt. Bartlett, of Brigus, bound to Fort Churchill and about 800 miles then from her destination: The vessel had supplies for the North West Mounted Police. Capt. Bartlett boarded the Adventure and reported himself and crew to be in good health. The Adventure left Wakeham's Bay on the 27th for Ungava and arrived at the mouth of the River the next day. Monday, going up the stream next and remaining until the 3rd September.
