In connection with its work with the blind the Museum has prepared twelve globes to be loaned to the public schools in which blind children are taught. These globes were pre-

pared in consultation with the late Gertrude E. Bingham, supervisor of classes for the blind in New York city. They are twenty-six inches in diameter ,and show the land masses in relief. The teachers report that in many cases the children have obtained, for the first time, a knowledge of the actual shape of the earth. In some of the schools the globes have been found so practical that they have been utilized by the children who see. The expense of the preparation of the gloves was met by the Jonathan Thorne Memorial Fund for the Blind.

> A group representing a number of deep-sea luminous fishes has just been completed in the Museum and opened to the public. It represents ten species of fishes found in the depths of the sea, half a mile or more from the surface. Some of the fishes are provided with rows of luminous organs or with headlights, while others have a light at the end of a tentacle with which to attract their prey. The group is illumined by electricity ins uch a way that the fishes may be viewed first as synoptic specimens in a case and secondly as if they were living fishes swimming in the darkness of the deep sea, lighted only by their own luminous or phosporescent organs.

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
