



Soldiers Get Leave to Work on Farms.

The Military authorities have decded to grant a month's leave to solders who desire to work on farms during the spring seeding operations. The men will be provided with return transportation to and from any locality. not exceeding a distance of 300 miles from the station or camp where they are in training. Pay and allowauces withheld during the period of furlough will be paid on return. Each man must produce proof that he was bona fide engaged in farm work any man who misconducts himself luring furlough will be liable to foreit his pay and allowances for such eriod as may be determined.




