#### Magnificent Feat

BY BRITISH DESTROYER CAPTAIN.

Belfast, Oct. 12 .- A grave collision n the North Channel between the Irish and Scottish coasts has involved officers and crew. The vessel with Kashmir of the Pacific and Orient Line. So far as could be gleaned at the time of writing, the Kashmir's wireless and other gear had broken down and; becoming unmanageable she crashed in to the Otranto with appalling effect.

Splendid discipline was maintaine but in the terribly wild weather that prevailed, with very high seas, the task of rescue was attended with the utmost difficulty and danger, and a number of small boats were immedi-

ing picture of the scene when the Soldiers lined up as if on parade and, at the word of command, stood to attention like statues. They never wavered. They remained there in military formation exemplifying during the crisis the poblest traditions of the army

The same thing applied to the sea men. While the greater number stood by their respective boat stations awaiting final orders, others went about their duties as if nothing had happened, mending gear and attending to one detail or another. All the while the gale was shricking out its angriest and most menacing warnings and the sea was washing over the list-

The following graphic account of the collision is given by

"The convoy was somewhere northwest of Ireland when the mishap occurred. It was very stormy at the time and the mist obscured everything. I got only one glimpse of the land on the starboard end and could see the breakers washing over the

"The Kashmir was abreast of us on the port side. She suddenly veered, as if her steering gear had fammed in the wrong direction. We manoeuvred to get clear, but could not do so in time and we were rammed. There was a tremendous hole made in our ship's side and many thought at first, she had been struck with a torpedo. The damaged vessel heaved over, but righted herself again. The steam was shut off and the engines stopped. I saw one of the engineers making his escape through a ventilator. All the seamen lined up at their stations and the soldiers were on board waiting orders. There was neither panic nor even excitement, though the ship took several heavy lists and it looked a

"All this time the fog was almost impenetrable and a heavy sea was olling. The other ships of the con voy, in accordance with instructions, continued their journey, but after a while a destroyer came to our aid. The way the destroyer was manipulated was splendid.

"The bugle then sounded 'abandon ship' and it was every man for himself. If there was loss of life or accident it was the result of jumping at the wrong time or in the wrong direction. I was carried into the destroyer on the crest of one wave and dashed back on to my own ship with the back wash of another, but I got safe at last on the rescuing war ves-

"MY GOD, TORPEDOED AGAIN!" "My God, torpedoed again!" this was the exclamation of a deckhand of the Otranto when the concussion of the Kashmir's impact shook his steamer from stem to stern. He had had the experience of submarine courtesies just twelve months ago. "October is my lucky month at sea," he interpolated, taking it for granted that the Cranto had been torpedoed. In less time than it took to tell it, he joined groups of sailors and soldiers on deck. The steamer had an ugly dent on the port side and the stokeholds had rapidly become flooded. Tremendous seas were running and the Otranto was pitching violenntly. Notwithstanding her great intake of water, the Kashmir had veered off again immediately and her quick disappearance was one of the mysteries of the tragedy.







#### SPANISH INFLUENZA

#### Instructions to Outport Magistrates.

Requests are constantly being sent to the Board of Health by Outport Magistrates for instructions in dealing with the influenza epidemic. The following points are to be noted:-

- 1. The disease is highly contagious.
- 2. It is spread very largely by contact one with
- 3. It is advisable to prohibit any unnecessary gathering of people about stores, street corners, etc.
- 4 Close schools, churches, theatres, etc., if there is any indication of spread of disease.
- 5. Avoid a panic, but take this thing seriously and co-operate with the doctors, following strictly the
- 6. Good ventilation is very important—therefore admit sunlight and fresh air as much as possible.
- 7. Do not allow the patient to spit, and when coughing cover the mouth.
- 8. Never neglect the precaution of washing the hands before eating or after contact with a sick person.

Quarantine is difficult to establish with any degree of success and the presence of the police in an attempt to enforce quarantine would create more panic.
