Later on, when this expression was revised, the name of Doctor Foster was substituted for that of Daddy Lester. The whole expression has all but died out now. I am told that in Bonavista (for years past) down to the present day, when boys are pitching buttons, a large button—known to us in Trinity as a "cody," or a "coatee"—is known in Bonavista, as a "Daddy Lester." It is supposed that Mr. Lester had a business there, and that those large buttons could be bought only at his shop; hence, the name, and memorial.
