When Norway Taxed England

Two interesting archaeological discoveries, says the Christiania correspondent of the London "Times." were made last autumn on the Bukn Islands. situated in the fjord of Bukn, about 20 miles northwest of Stavanger. They provide fresh evidence of the intercourse existing between the British Isles and Norway 900 years ago. Through the courtesy of Dr. Jan Petersen, director of the Stavanger Museum, who has subjected the discoveries to a close and expert examination. I have now been able to obtain the following details:

The first discovery was made by two laborers at a place known as Joseng Farm, in the West Bukn island. It consists of about 320 coins. Approximately 160 of these are of Anglo-Saxon origin, and, with one exception, were minted during the reign of Ethelred II, the Unready (A.D. 975-1013). Six others are somewhat crude copies of the Ethelred coins, and one belongs to the reign of his father, Edgar (A.D. 959-975). In the lifetime of Ethelred the

British coasts were constantly raided by the Vikings of Norway and Denmark, to whom the Unready King paid large ransoms, which he raised by means of the Danegeld, in order to deliver his country from their visits. This is the explanation which history offers for the large numbers of Ethelred coins which have been found in Norway, Denmark, and even in Sweden, whither they had doubtless found their way from one of the first two countries.

One-third of the coins appear have been minted in London, which was even then the most important trading center in England. Most o the others came from York, Lincoln, and Canterbury, while the collection as a whole contains coins minted in to fewer than 29 different places,

There are also some German coins but these are of inferior quality, and it has been difficult to trace their

The impassioned appeals of the orator, which wielded at will the flerce democracy, the finest creations of the poet, the almost breathing marble of the sculptor, the chef d'oeuvres of the painter, the proud temple of the architect even though they may have survived the changes of Nature, or have escaped the ravages of passion, may yet by mere accident, perish in one brief hour. The destruction of the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception, Harbor Grace, affords a most striking illustration of this melancholy truth. How well we remember its massive walls, its Corinthian pillars, its seven altars, and its lofty dome, 120 feet to the top of the Cross. The splendour of its dome, modelled after the greatest conception of human genius-St. Peter's in Rome—its altars of marble and gold, its pillars of polished granits and walls are now but a remembrance to those in miccre life.

The grand Cathedral was commenced by Bishop Dalton in 1863, carried on by Bishop Carfagnini, completed by Bishop MacDonald, and destroyed by fire September 2nd, 1889. The fund for its reconstruction met with great success—the late Hon. James Ryan, merchant of Bonavista brother of Hon. D. A. Ryan, heading the list with the princely donation of

\$4,000 (four thousand dollars). The plans and much of the artistic work was performed by Bishop Carfagnini himself, assisted by the great artist Frank McKenzie, who, notwithstanding his Scotch name, was a native of Valencia, in sunny Spain. The woodwork was superintended by that tamous citizen, Mr. Richard Ash, and the pillars and all the chief de-







Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir.-I have read with much interest and pleasure a summary in The Evening Telegram of August 29, of a lecture on Road Building by Mr. H. A. Winter. It is pleasing to see after as epoch of indifference to the technicalities of road making a turn to a more intelligent attitude. It is impossible to estimate our losses from such carelessness and it is to be hoped that the pleasant sounds we hear to-day are heralds of a better day about to dawn. We should not, however, fly to the other extreme and begin to construct roads on the new theory merely because the older one has not given entire satisfaction.

Mr. Winter's ideas have a plausible appeal, but as they represent the theories of a man who is not claiming any expert knowledge of the subect there may be flaws in his mechanical design as there are undoubtedly errors in his use of certain

However, this does not offer any serious objection to Mr. Winter's first class attempt to solve some of our read building problems for us. I have nothing but praise for the man who

Mr. Winter rightly put first in importance the material from which the road is constructed, but in dealing with this subject he uses technical terms very loosely and in a way rather confusing. Cray and gravel are dealt with by the lecturer in a manner that must be understood only by himself. Clay he speaks of as if it were common garden soil and plentifully disposed about St. John's.

There is no clay about here unless we assume the soil to be of that substance, which would be quite wrong. The gravel he speaks of is a material variously made up of boulders, pebbles and finely pulverized material
