CREAT BRITAIN

LONDON, July 1st. — In the House of Lords to-night, the consideration of the Irish Church Bill was resumed in committee. Clauses 11, 12, 13 and 14 were agreed to without amendment, except as to the date when the property of the Church shall pass into the hands of the Commissioners, which was changed from January 1st, 1871, to January 1st, 1872. It was promised on the part of the Government that an additional clause should be framed providing that the Irish Bishops may retain their seats in the House of Lords. The Bishop of Peterboro's amendment that all compensation be made without deduction therefrom of the income tax was adopted by a vote of 95 income tax was adopted by a vote to 50. Clauses 15, 16, 17 and 18 to 50. Clauses 15, 16, 17 and 18 were agreed to. The consideration of clauses 19, 20, 21 and 22 was postponed. Lord Carnarvon's amendment fixing the commutation of life interests at fourteen years purchase was adopted.

Mr. Gladstone made a speech, in which he alluded to the Irish Church Bill, He said the Government. had bestowed its best endeavours on the conduct of the measure which formed the vital and essential portion of its work for the peace of Ireland and the security of Ireland, Since the Bill passed the House of Commons there had been great excitement, rumors of reaction and threatening of its speedy doom. During this excitement he and his colleagues remained in a state of great tranquility, for they felt that the review of their work was not a matter to arouse their jealously but was better calculated to create satisfaction. Although great care had been bestowed on the Bill it still had many faults. The Premier concluded as follows:—"We shall be grateful for every improvement and all changes shall be respectfully considered, subject to the position in which we stead from pledges given and the commission we received. We tendered the terms of the covenants when in opposition and shall not forget them when in power,"

Ecclestone vs. McLean.

Many of our Puslinch readers have no doubt heard of this suit. It was an action brought by Mr. Ecclestone, confectioner, Hamilton, against our friend, Mr. George McLean, miller, Aberfoyle, for the loss of a horse said to be worth \$150, which was so badly kicked by a stallion belonging to McLean that it had to be killed.

It appeared that McLean's teamster, in Out., 1867, stopped at Kenny's tavern. Brock road, to feed his horses. He put his horses in the stable, leaving his loaded waggon standing in the road opposite the tavern—a sufficient distance from the platform to enable another team to pass between the waggon and the tavern.—Shorily afterwards Craig (Ecclestone's teamster) drove up—taking a position nearer to the tavern than McLean's waggon. Craig then went into the tavern to

and but for this the accident in all probability would not have happened. It was shown that one of Ecclestone's torses was vicious and accustomed to bite, and that McLean's horses were quiet, and had never previously been known to kick.

The case was tried at Hamilton, in March, 1868, when Ecclestone was nonsuited. This nonsuit was afterwards set aside, and a new trial ordered. At last Hamilton assires the case was referred to Geo. W. Burton, Esq. Q.C., as arbitrator. After hearing upwards of twenty witnesses, Mr. Burton has made his award entirely in Mr. McLean's favor, and ordering Ecclestone to pay all the costs.

Each man of the country companies will have to bring cooking utensils with him The drill will last six hours each day, and, as we stated before, will be continued for eight days. We will in a few days publish the orders issued by the commanding officer, so that every man belonging to the force may acquaint himself with them. The place for the camp has not yet been fixed upon, but the best possible spot will be selected, so as to be convenient to the town, and also to wood, water, &c.

We expect the Battalion will muster its full strength this year, and that we shall have the pleasure of seeing 500 stalwart, well drilled men in the field.—A few days ago we received a copy of the Millitia Report for last year, and we notice that the 30th Battalion is spoken of in the highest terms of praise by Lieut. Colonel Taylor, and the Inspecting officer Major Bagot. Col. Taylor says:—"This is in every respect a first-rate Battalion." BANK ROBBERIES.—Another heavy bonk robbery is reported from New York, the vaults being blown open during Sunday, and money and securities to the extent of \$300,000 carried off.—This occurred at the premises of the Ocean Bank.
