**COWICHAN INDIANS**  
IN RESTLESS MOOD

Alleged That Tribal Discontent Is Aroused Through Oratory of Joe Capilano

The conduct of the Indians on the Cowichan reserve is reported to be causing some alarm among the residents of the neighborhood, some of whom believe that the time for an exercise of official restraint has arrived. The members of the tribe have been congregating of late to listen to the fiery oratory of their chief, Joe Capilano, who has become ambitious to rule over much more territory than is allotted to his people by the Dominion government. His territorial aspirations may not allow him to be permanently satisfied with anything less than the whole of Vancouver Island, but he admits a willingness to go slowly, and would be content for the present with the acquisition of a small strip of land adjoining his circumscribed domain.

The inhabitants of the reserve are generally peaceable, and have in the past been easily amenable to the advice of the Indian agent, but their desire has altered somewhat since Chief Joe has been to London to see the King. The Chief is now the proud possessor of his Majesty's photograph and autograph, and he presumes, it is said, to speak with greater intelligence and authority than any servant of the administration at Ottawa. His assertions and eloquence seem to have had a resounding effect upon the principal representative of the Indian department as the imperial court of the Myrtle Barrens. Yesterday marked the departure from Darcey Island, the lazaretto that has existed within seventeen miles of Victoria for seventeen years, of the eight remaining lepers immured there for some years. SPAIN MUCH CONCERNED. Expected Birth of Royal Heir Has Caused Complications. Madrid, May 7.—It was semi-officially announced yesterday that the announcement of Queen Victoria may be expected at the end of May. The specialist who is in attendance at the palace declared that the royal baby should have arrived before this. Confronted with announcements hitherto made in this connection have caused both indignation and amusement in court circles. The newspapers urge that some one be made to answer for this ridiculous mistake, which has kept the nation on the tip of needless excitement and entailed many premature preparations. They instance the fact that no fewer than twenty bishops have arrived at Madrid within the last ten days to be in readiness for the birth of the heir to the throne of Spain. Queen Victoria drove out this morning as usual.

### MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF SOUTH SAANICH

Quantity of Interesting Business Transacted at Meeting on Saturday Evening

The thirty-fifth meeting of the municipal council of South Saanich was held in the municipal office on Grandford avenue, on Saturday evening, at 8 o'clock. Present, the mayor, Thos. Bryden, and councillors Moore, Pointer, Grant, Quick, Durrance and Fuchs; Clerk H. D. Case; Constable Russell and Roadmaster Fin.

Communications were received from H. Campbell, the Winnipeg exhibition, asking the co-operation of the farmers of South Saanich in sending exhibits of fruits, berries, bulbs, and flowers, also asking for pecuniary assistance from the council, and pointing out that if they were not advertised for "Victoria and district."

It was decided on motion to help in the matter if the other municipalities would help as well.

Matson & Cole wrote on behalf of E. J. Smith, objecting to the extension to the roadway as shown on the present plan of lot 7, section 36. Laid on table, for new plans to be made and decide what difference it would make.

Yates & Jay wrote inclosing a letter to the council, asking for their quiet claim deeds for their clients on Finnerly road exchange of lots, and enclosing a map of the road. They referred to that a record could be obtained to insure their clients from molestation by future owners of the land, and also to advise that the council should refuse to sign the exchange of proposed road.

On motion, the advice of Yates & Jay, the attorneys for the municipal council, was taken, and they were instructed to that effect by the clerk, also to notify Crease & Crease of the action of the council.

The superintendent of the Victoria & Sidney railway wrote asking for delay in Cloverdale crossing, and stating that they were ready to proceed with the work as soon as the council was ready to do its share.

The clerk was instructed to write to the company informing them that the council was ready to proceed at once.

Rev. Robert Connor wrote to the council for their promptness in attending to the damage the water was doing to his property, and received and filed.

Petitions were received from E. M. Palmer and four of his neighbors on Cloverdale Rock street, so that they can go to their places.

From Mrs. Rhoda Hancock and three others to have Holden street opened up and graded. They were referred to the road superintendent for report, the reeve pointing out that the owners of properties have to grade roads, build fences and build sidewalks.

Mr. Gore submitted a plan of a road from Gore road to Bay road, by the old road on lot 6, and part of lot 5, of subsection 2 of lot 44.

The reeve motion was approved.

Mr. Wilkinson submitted a plan of a proposed road from Burnside road to the road on section 15, Plan approved.

Mr. Wilkinson offered a suggestion to the council to have a survey of the section lines to be made on each side, a monument should be placed at the corners, and the council to enter surveys no difficulties might be encountered in establishing a standard line for the section lines.

Mr. Wilkinson proposed that all section lines on plans should be marked in red ink so as to make them stand out and of more assistance to surveyors.

The reeve suggested that a card of resolution be passed by the council, should be issued to surveyors in future.

The Council also asked for information regarding the Wide Tire Act. The reeve said there was a provincial law to that effect, which was still in force, but that the council would also take the matter up.

It was suggested that a telephone should be installed at the council's office to facilitate business matters, and the cost of same should be ascertained from a telephone company.

The property owners who had notified the council regarding their property on Telegraph road and roads connected therewith, wanted information regarding how they stood in respect to their property. The reeve said that they were in a good position to be found, or any trace of them, at either end of their property; and that they should be instructed to be in possession of their property, and if they are not, to be compelled to move their fences each to the request of surveys made by the council.

In reply, the reeve pointed out that all roads by-law must be forty feet wide, and that owners putting fences on different lines did so at their own risk.

On motion the council adjourned.

### FAVORABLE IMPRESSION OF WESTERN CONDITIONS

Manager Mathews, of Dun's Agency, Speaks of Recent Tour Through Country

Winnipeg, May 7.—W. C. Mathews, Toronto, general Canadian manager of R. G. Dun & Co., in the course of his annual tour throughout the west, said in reply to a question as to the effect of the grain blockade upon payments and trade, that it had an effect in reducing the money market.

"But in British Columbia, in Vancouver and Victoria, where I have just been, the trade has been fairly good and people have been paying up pretty well. There, of course, they are not so much affected by the grain blockade. The banks, however, have been tightening up money in the matter of real estate, but I don't think there is anything in the west that is very exhilarating, and the feeling is, if things are not right, they will be very soon. If transportation facilities could be improved they feel that they would soon get out of their troubles."

"A large amount of money is being brought in by settlers in small amounts in each case, but a great deal in the aggregate, and there were few complaints that payments were not going as good as was expected."

"There was a general feeling of optimism, which affects creditors as well as debtors, and bankers say that they are prepared to look after legitimate mercantile customers, but they are being their look against real estate advances, and wisely so. Things have gone on so far as to be in a place where almost reached the danger limit. They have been going on for some time, but buying property at a higher price, and it was only a question of time when the point would be reached. There is a great future for both Edmonton and Calgary. Edmonton is in the centre of a splendid agricultural country, and the city has a great future ahead of it, but it will take time for many places in the west suffering from their inability to deal with the large influx of population. Settlers have been coming in faster than they can take care of them comfortably. One of the difficulties is illustrated by the high price of lumber. But at the same time they are not suffering to the same extent as settlers did in Ontario in the early days, nor even in Manitoba a few years ago."

"A good many people are getting up about the weather conditions, but these conditions seem to be universal, for they are in trouble both in the east and west, and I don't think there is any serious setback to the fact that a temporary check would be a very healthy thing."

"The E. R. irrigation scheme in the neighborhood of Calgary is a huge undertaking, and they have great hopes of the development of that district. They are bringing in lots of Americans from the irrigated states who are buying land and looking for a larger increase in the near future. There is one thing that is particularly attractive to Americans, and that is that they have a guarantee of water from the government. In the States questions of water rights are a man who buys land often buys a lawsuit. DEMAND FOR TIMBER  
BREAKS ALL RECORDS

Never in the History of the Province  
Have Speculators  
Been So Keen

Never in the history of British Columbia has there been such a demand for timber land as at present. Island property being especially in favor. Every day sales of leasehold crown lands are being put through in Victoria. While these sales are taking place, new frontiers are constantly being put in the market, as a result of the cruising of new districts. Several parties are at various stages of the land when they have completed their work it will mean a further addition to the amount of timber land available. The principal demand is of course for fir, but there is also a demand for spruce and hemlock. No kind of marketable timber is allowed to go begging, and the result is a stiffening in prices all around.

There is an active demand for all kinds of timber land, and Arthur Bell, real estate and timber agent, is a reporter for the Colonist, yesterday, and what strikes him particularly about the inquiries is the fact that most of them are from south of the line. As is well known, the British Columbia ready hold large tracts of timber land all over the province, but particularly in Vancouver Island. Some of the people who are here. Some are buying up timber tracts with the idea of working them, but many are purchasing simply for the purpose of investment, believing that a few years will bring a large increase in value. There are several reasons for this action on the part of Americans, but the chief one is that they see the forests in their own country rapidly disappearing and realize that it is only a question of time until the demand for lumber will be such as to drive the British Columbia timber lands.
