MR. MEREDITH OCCUPIES THE FLOOR FOR TWO HOURS.

The speeches of the Mover and Seconder Speaker Clarke took the chair yesterday in the

He therefore called upon the leader of the government, before the close of the debate to announce to this bouse and to the country what his polecy in this direction would be, in the event of the people again honoring him with their confidence.

With regard to the two great questions of the boundary award and of the rivers and streams bills, no policy had been announced in the address. The speaker did not think a consolidation of the municipal laws advisable at p seent, until these were more settled. He recommended the government to introduce legislation relative to private lunatic saylums, to insurance companies, to the inspeation of boilers, to the enforce ment of the system of conveyancing and to the simplifying of titles, at a levents it seemed to him from the address now before him, that the matters which we were asked to consider were not matters of very great importance, and that the session would not be the most important of all sessions since confederation, as the address asked us to believe.

HALL EXTRADITION CASE. When Mr. Hall, accused of forgery in the United States, was brought before Judge Mackensie for extradition nearly six months ago, the charge could not be enstained, but his hoder granted a remand of eight days at the request of the U. 

(To the Editor of The World.) SIR: The verses written for Dr. Wild's dification which appeared in The World on Wednesday last over the signature "G" rve notice, not from any value in themwes, but because they are the expression of a certain phase of religious opinion which prevails widely among uneducated people. The key is found in the last line, "Preach the glorious gospel of Christ," and the idea which underlies is that it is the duty of a secher to confine himself very strictly to the preaching of certain threadbare, orthodox

he preaching of certain threadbare, orthodox feetines and not get out of his latitude by meddling with anything practical or anything touching on science or the progress of odern thought.

This method suits some preachers admirbly as it does not put them to the trouble of learning anything new or keeping up. of learning anything new or keeping up with the times but it does not seem to suit with the times but it does not seem to suit the more intelligent members of their congregations to hear the same thing over and over again forever. It may be an old, old story, but there is a possibility of its becoming a trifletoold, if people have to listen to it twice every Sunday for fifty-two Sundays in theyear. The trouble is that what suits "G," or the class he represents, may not suit people of greater intelligence and culture. It is true the preaching of the glorious gostel worked wonders under Wesley and Whitfield and similar cases, but the times have changed a little since then. There was really a great deal of novelty and originality in their preaching, and that was the secret of its success. These qualities are not necessarily sinful in a preacher, though peoble like "G" seem to think that they are.

The truth is that Wesley and Whitfield preached to suit the people they were addressing. They taught the first lessons of the gospel to people who had never heard them before, and to whose untrained minds God was an enraged and avenging deity. To these people a gospel of love and mercy and forgiveness was indeed a novelty and a strange wonder, and they eagerly embraced its truths fresh from the lips of these earnest and fervent evangelists. Now, you must take people as you find them, and when any one wants Dr Wild to preach to his Bond street congregation in the same strain as Wesley or Whitfield or Paul preached to their hearers, he necessarily makes the assumption that his congregation is on the same moral and intellectual level as their's were.
