Brief Holiday Before the Campaign— Contents of Mer Majesty's Speech.

London, Aug. 142—Parliament was prorogued to-day. The queen in here speech says: "When you assembled in October I informed you that an expedition was advancing up the valley of the Nile to the relief of Khartoum. Three months later, with deep sorrow, which was shared by all my people, I learned that the expedition arrived too late. Heroic Gordon and his companions had fallen. An endeavor which was ineffectual was made to reach Khartoum by constructing a railway from Suakim to Berber. My troops were ultimately withdrawn from the whole of the eastern Soudan down to Alashyert."

Michael Wynn, ex-prisoner. told a arrowing tale of excessive punishment for rivial offences. This is the man who was onfined so long in his cell on bread and rater, and who, when released, ran down and commenced eating refuse. His story of its punishment is substantially the same as that told by other witnesses.

In the afternoon Mr. Murphy asked Indge Sinclair if the court intended to sith fonday. His honor said that the court had est for fourteen days, and that both the cemmissioners and the public thought that the evidence should close. Mr. Murphy said he would conclude in two more days. He was very desirous that the commissioners should vist Kingston penitentiary to contrast the treatment of prisoners there with that in the Central prison.

Thomas Quinn, the prison storekeeper, swore that he could tell from the books how much goods had left the storeroom. He was not aware of clothes, etc., leaving the storeroom except to discharged prisoners and certain government employes who get clothing made on requisition and settle for it at the store in a regular way. In regard to furnishing prisoners with clothes and railway tickets on leaving the prison, Mr. Langmuir explained that only prisoners who had been well conducted were entitled to them.

Sergt. Franks, cross-examined by Mr. Murphy, gave evidence on a great many minor points. In regard to the bathing of diseased men, he said that whenever such a case came under bis notice he ordered the man to wash under the shower bath instead of in the tubs. In regard to Wynn's case he said he had often given Wynn bowls of soup when he begged for it, although Wynn was on bread and water justly on account of being perfectly accorrigible. He believed in the lash but met a flogging before the other prisoners. not a flogging before the other prisoners.
Judge Sinclair agreed with him. He said the guards all smoke when they get the chance, and thought the rule should he relaxed. He believed that the prisoners should have tobacco and that a shortening of time for good conduct would be beneficial. Judge Sinclair thanked him for a good deal of valuable information and for the straightforward way in which he had given his testimony.
