Branch of the Ennk of Hamitton—Stocky and Moncy—Chicago wheat Closes Firm—Old Country Markets.

Toronto lumber dealers are in a state of antagonism to the Grand Trunk Ratiway. The reason is, the Grand Trunk declines to comply with the wishes of the dealers in regard to the rules governing the handling of freight. The dealers desire to have the lumber shipped, as it is got out and sold—by the thousand feet. The Grand Trunk says that it wants pay for every pound of freight it handles, and therefore prefers to handle it by the pound. The dealers say that they cannot figure on what lumber costs them laid down at certain points when they sell by the thousand, ship by the pound, and when overweight is so often charged. They further state that this uncertain way of doing business hurts the trade. The company allows 24000 pounds of the weight of a carlead and 1000 pounds extra weight for dirt, wet weather, etc., in the summer and 2000 pounds extra in the winter. The shippers here say that the car tare is inaccurate. The older the cars get the heavier they weigh, and many of them weigh much more than the named weight. In support of this they say that cars loaded from the same pile of lumber, and with the same quantity, are not shown to weigh the same. Some are charged with overweight, while others are not. The lumbermen met the Grand Trunk officials a short time ago and proposed that they should agree on the number of feet of lumber that should constitute a car load of 24,000 pounds. The proposition was that 8000 feet cut within 60 days of the date of shipment, and 10,000 feet cut previous to 80 days from the date of shipment, should be held as weighing 24,000 pounds. By dealing all round by the thousand feet, they said that business would be facilitated. The officials declined, however, to accept the offer, and the shipment of lumber is effected exactly as it has been. 




