

#### PAYROLL OF DOM. GOVT. EMPLOYEES IS \$74,692,000.

Ottawa, March 21-The Dominion Government paid \$74,692,000 to its employees in salaries during the fiscal year 1925-26, as compared with the previous fiscal year, this is an increase of \$470,756, according to figures just eleased by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. In connection with the increase of close to half a million dollars it is pointed out that many payments of arrears of salaries on account of salary revision were made last year, both for the current year and the pre vious fiscal year.

The report shows that the grand total of employees increased from 38,885 in April, 1925 to 39,154 in March, 1926, an increase of 269
