ECLIPSES IN 1840.

There will be four Eclipses this year, but they will all be invisible on this continent, except one of the Moon.

The first will be a very small eclipse of the Moon, at the time of the full in February—invisible, as the moon will be below the horizon.

The Second will be of the Sun on the 3d of March, between 11 and 12 at night, and of course invisible in America; but in Asia it will be large and splendid.

The third will be of the Moon, on Thursday, August 13th, in the morning, partial and visible, as follows:—Beginning, 1h. 9m.; middle of the eclipse, 2h. 34m.; end, 3h. 59m.—apparent or solar time. Digits eclipsed, 7° 17' on the moon's northern limb, in the southern side of the earth's shadow.

The fourth will be of the Sun, a grand and total eclipse, on the morning of Thursday, August 25th, at about half past 2 o'clock—of course invisible; but by reason of the moon's south latitude, it would not be visible in North America, were it to happen after sunrise.

MORNING AND EVENING STARS.

Venus will be *Morning Star* till July 27th; thence *Evening Star*. JUPITER also will be *Morning Star* till May 4th; thence *Evening Star* till November 21st; and then again *Morning Star*. MARS will be *Evening Star* till May 4th; thence *Morning Star* through the year. SATURN will be *Morning Star* till June 9th; thence *Evening Star* till December 15th; after that *Morning Star* again.

MAIL ARRANGEMENTS AT SAINT JOHN.

Mails depart for, and arrive from Fredericton daily;—for Canada, they close on Monday and Friday evenings, and arrive on Wednesday and Saturday evenings.

Mails for Halifax, Yarmouth, Windsor, Kentville, &c. (via Digby,) close on Saturday evenings, and arrive on Tuesday afternoons.

Mails (by land) for Halifax, Miramichi, Dorchester, Sussex Vale, Kingston; &c. close on Wednesday evenings, and arrive on Friday evenings; and for Halifax and Dorchester they are made up on Saturday evenings, and arrive on Monday evenings.

Mails from the United States, Saint Andrews, &c. arrive on Monday, Wednesday and Friday evenings, and close the same evenings at six o'clock.

The Mail from Saint Martins arrives at 6 p. m. on Tuesday, and is made up on Wednesday at 10 A. M.

While the steamboats are running, three additional Mails are forwarded to, and received from St. Andrews and the United States—arriving and closing on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday evenings.

The Saint Andrews and Saint John Stage Coach Company's Coach (carrying the Mails,) leaves St. Andrews on Monday, Wednesday and Friday mornings, and arrives at Saint John the same evenings—starts from the City on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday mornings, and arrives at Saint Andrews the same evenings.

The "Harvey" Eastern Royal Mail Stage leaves Saint John every Sunday and Thursday morning at six o'clock, and arrives at Dorchester the same days at 10 p. m.;—leaves Dorchester on Monday and Friday mornings, (meeting the Miramichi Mail Stage at the Bend at 7 A. M. on Fridays,) and arrives in St. John the same nights.

The Saint John Stage Coach Company run the "Victoria" Coach three times a week to Dorchester, and once to the Bend of Petticoodiac, through in a day—leaving St. John on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday mornings at six o'clock—and Dorchester on Monday and Friday mornings, immediately after the arrival of the Halifax Mail, and the Bend on Wednesday at 5 A. M.

Steamers start from St. John and Fredericton every morning and evening (except Sunday) during the summer; and from St. John for St. Andrews and Eastport, every Monday, Wednesday and Friday morning, returning on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday;—for Digby and Annapolis on Monday and Friday mornings, returning on Tuesdays and Saturdays; and for Windsor on Tuesday evening, returning on Wednesday.—A new boat, intended to ply in the Bay of Fundy and to extend her trips to Boston, has recently been built by Messrs. Jas. Whitney & Co., and will afford additional facilities to travellers.

SIGNALS

Made at Partridge Island on the approach of Vessels to the Harbour of Saint John.

- One Ball close, for one square-rigged vessel.
- One Ball, half hoisted, for two square-rigged vessels.
- Two Balls, close, for three square-rigged vessels.
- Two Balls, separated, for four square-rigged vessels.
- A Pendant of any colour, for five square-rigged vessels.
- A Pendant under a Ball, for six square-rigged vessels.
- A Pendant over a Ball, half hoisted, for seven square-rigged vessels.
- A Pendant under two Balls, close, for eight square-rigged vessels.
- A Pendant between two Balls, separate, for nine square-rigged vessels.
- A Flag of any colour, for ten or more vessels.

[The above are hoisted at the East or West yard-arm, according to the quarter the vessels first appear in, and when their rig can be made out, the following descriptive colours will be hoisted at the mast head:]

- A Union Jack for a Flag Ship, with or without a squadron.
 - " with a red pendant over, for a two decker.
 - " with a blue pendant over, for a frigate.
 - " with a white ditto, for a small armed vessel.
 - A blue pendant, for a merchant's ship or barque.
 - A red ditto, for a merchant brig or brigantine.
 - A white and blue ditto, for a foreign square-rigged vessel.
 - A white ditto, without a ball, for a topsail schooner or sloop.
 - A flag blue and white horizontally, a neutral fleet.
 - A pendant white and blue, a neutral man of war.
 - A blue flag, a neutral merchant ship.
 - A red, white and blue flag, an enemy's fleet.
 - A red, white and blue pendant, an enemy's man of war.
 - A Union Jack over neutral or enemy's signals, the vessel is detained, or a prize.
 - A white flag over any signal, the vessel bears a flag of truce.
 - A red flag, pierced white, for a steam boat from Digby.
 - A blue flag, pierced white, for a steam boat from Saint Andrews or Eastport.
 - A Ball at the mast head, vessel is on shore or in distress: should immediate aid be necessary, guns to be fired.
- In thick weather a gun will be fired at Partridge Island, in answer to each gun heard at sea. There is a Fog Bell on the Island, which is rung in foggy weather, to warn vessels of their approach to the shore.
- When a vessel requires a Pilot, her descriptive pendant will be shown at the yard arm, instead of a ball.

TIME FOR GOING THROUGH THE FALLS,

NEAR THE CITY OF SAINT JOHN.

The Falls are level or still water, at about three and a half hours on the *food*, and about two and a half on the *ebb*, which makes them passable four times in twenty-four hours, about ten or fifteen minutes each time. — No other rule can be given, as much depends on the floods in the river Saint John, and the time of high water or full sea, which is often hastened by high winds, and in proportion to the height of them.

The *First District* comprises all that part of the city, between the south line of Pond street, and north line of Duke street, which lies to the westward of the east line of Mill street, Dock street, and that part of Prince-William-street, between the north line of the brick building belonging to Mr. James K. M'Kee, (northward of the Market-square.)

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and the north line of Duke street, and including King-street, to the westward of the west line of Germain-street.

Second District comprises all that part of the City between the north line of Union-street and south line of St. James's-street, which lies without or beyond the first district, to the westward of the east line of Charlotte-street.

Third District comprises all that part of the city which lies without or beyond the second district, to the westward of the east line of Sidney-street.

Fourth District comprises all that part of the city lying without or beyond the said third district, to the westward of the east line of Car-warthen-street.

Fifth District comprises all that part of the city lying without or beyond the said fourth district.

PUBLIC PORTERS AND HAND-CART MEN.

For loading, carrying and housing any goods, or any other articles on any hand-cart, from the Market-slip in King's and Queen's wards, or from any other place within the limits of the first district, to any other place within the said several five districts, the rates of prices are as follow:—For the first district, three-pence; second district, three-pence half-penny; third district, four-pence; fourth district, four-pence half-penny; fifth district, five-pence.

HACKNEY-COACH FARES.

In cases where pilots shall be detained on board of vessels, under and by virtue of the Quarantine or Health Laws of the Province, they shall be entitled to demand and receive from the Masters of such vessels, the sum of Ten Shillings per day, for every day of such detention, in addition to the allowance aforesaid.

Coasting vessels, going from one part of the Bay of Fundy to another; British or Foreign steam-boats, or British vessels drawing under six feet of water are not compelled to take pilots; when employed, they are to be paid according to the rates above-mentioned.

For removing vessels from any mooring ground to any wharf, or from any wharf to any mooring ground, or from one wharf to another wharf, and seeing them properly moored or secured, the following rates: For vessels not exceeding 100 tons, 7s. 6d.; for vessels over 100, and not exceeding 200 tons, 10s.; for vessels over 200 tons, and not exceeding 300 tons, 15s.; and for all vessels over 300 tons the sum of 20s.

LIGHT HOUSES.

Commissioners for Light Houses in the Bay of Fundy.—John Ward, senr., Robert W. Crookshank, Thomas Barlow, John Ward, jun., Lauchlan Donaldson, and W. F. W. Owen, Esquires.

Commissioners for Partridge Island and the Beacon Light Houses.—John Ward, senr., and Lauchlan Donaldson, Esquires.

Cape Sable Seal Island Light.—The first Light in approaching the Bay of Fundy, is on the South Point of the Seal Island. This is a plain white Light—elevated about 80 feet above high water mark, and may be seen in approaching the Island from any point of the compass. A very dangerous rock, under water, but upon which the sea always breaks, called *Blonde Rock*, lies about 2 miles s. s. w. by compass, from the Light House. Between this rock and the Island, there are some dangers—the ground is rocky throughout, and large vessels, therefore, ought not to attempt passing between them.

A Light House has this year (1839), been built at the entrance of Yarmouth Harbour, on which will be exhibited a Revolving Light.

Brier Island Light.—In advancing up the Bay, the next Light is situated on Brier Island, about half a mile n. e. from the n. w. point thereof, with an improved Lantern and Lamp. This light will therefore be much more beneficial to the trade of the Bay than formerly.—A plain white Light.

Digby Gut Light.—The next Light on the coast of Nova Scotia is placed on the West side of the Digby Gut—from Brier Island North Eastward. The coast is very bold and not indented; the Light is therefore chiefly intended as a guide into Digby Basin. The Lamps and Lanterns were renewed in the Spring of 1835, and reflectors furnished, so that this Light is in high order.—A white Light.

Gannet Rock Light.—This Light bears from the Light on Brier Island, N. W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. 21 miles. It is intended to warn vessels of their approach to a very dangerous range of shoals and ledges, which extend from the Old Proprietor to the Seal Islands off Machias, a distance of about twenty miles.

Bearings from the Gannet Rock Light House—

To the Old Proprietor, which dries at $\frac{1}{2}$ ebb, (very dangerous), n. by n. $\frac{1}{2}$ n. 7 miles.

“ Black Rock, (always above water 25 feet) off White Head, n. e. $\frac{1}{2}$ e.

“ South West Head of Grand Manan, n. w. $\frac{1}{2}$ n.

“ Northernmost of the Murr Ledges, (dry at $\frac{3}{4}$ ebb) n. w. by w. $\frac{1}{2}$ w.

“ Southernmost of ditto, called Saint Mary's Ledge, (always out of water), s. w. by w. $\frac{1}{2}$ w.

“ Machias Seal Island Lights, distant about 13 miles, w. by n. $\frac{1}{2}$ n.

NOTE.—Between the Northernmost and Southernmost of the Murr Ledges, there is a range of dangerous rocks and shoals, many of them always above water, and which extend Westward from the Light House about four miles; from this range, farther Westerly, about eight miles, lies a dangerous breaker, called the Roaring Bull. This may be avoided by keeping three remarkable headlands near the s. w. end of Grand Manan, open.—The red glass having been removed from the Lantern, there is now a flash light—whurr—twenty seconds dark and forty light in each minute.

Two fixed white lights upon the Machias & Islands, were put into operation in 1832—they are elevated about forty-five feet above high water, and bear from each other e. s. e. and w. n. w. distant about 200 feet, by which they will be immediately distinguished from all other lights upon the coast, (British or American)—the following are the bearings from them, viz. :

- To the Southernmost Murr Ledge, (St. Mary's) e. s. e. easterly.
- " Gannet Rock Light, E. by S. $\frac{1}{4}$ S. 13 miles.
- " Southern Head of Grand Manan, E. by N. $\frac{1}{4}$ N.
- " Northern Head of Grand Manan, N. E. $\frac{1}{4}$ E.
- " N. E. Rock, distant 2 miles. N. E. by N.
- " Little River Head, N. by W.
- " Libby Island Light House, (American,) N. W. by W.

Vessels standing in to the Northward, between these Lights and the Gannet Rock, should tack or haul off the moment they bring these Lights in one, as they will then not be more than three fourths of a mile from the Murr Ledges, if more than five miles to the East of the lights.

Head Harbour Light.—Next in order after passing Grand Manan, is Head Harbour Light. This is placed on the North East extremity of Campo Bello, and is a guide to vessels entering the main Channel to West Isles, Moose Island, and the inner Bay of Passamaquoddy; it enables vessels also at all times to enter Head Harbour—it is a fixed white light.

Point Le Preau Lights.—Upon this projecting head land two lights are placed, one above the other, and distant eighteen feet.—Both lights can be seen from every point of the compass, where they may be useful—both are fixed and white.

Partridge Island Light.—This light, at the entrance of the River and Harbour of Saint John, having been established upwards of forty years, requires no particular notice further than that it is a fixed white light.

Beacon Light.—Within Partridge Island, and upon a Spit or bar, which extends about half a mile s. s. e. off Sand Point, and which dries at two thirds ebb, stands the Beacon Tower. Upon this Tower a light is established, which is eminently useful to the coasting trade of Saint John, and to all other vessels having pilots on board, as it enables them to enter the harbour at all hours of the night. A fixed white light.

Quaco.—A revolving white light is placed on a small rock off Quaco Head, showing twice full and twice dark in a minute. This light can be seen from any quarter where a vessel can approach.

This year a new Light House has been erected on Cape Enrage in Westmorland, nearly opposite to Apple River Harbour. It has not as yet (Oct. 1839.) been lighted, but may when the winter sets in. A plain white light.

The half of the expence of the Cape Sable and Brier Island Lights is paid by New Brunswick, as they are so highly useful to vessels trading with this Province.

West Quoddy Light.—This is an American Light, and is placed on the West side of the entrance into the Saint Croix by Lubec and Eastport;—a new light house has lately been erected here, and the light much improved.

LIGHT HOUSES IN NOVA SCOTIA.

[In addition to the Light Houses in Nova Scotia, before noticed, there are the following.]

Sambro—Sambro Island, mouth of Halifax Harbour—a fixed light.

Roseway—M^r Nutt's Island, mouth of Shelburne Harbour—two lights, one above the other. [volving light.]

Liverpool—Coffin's Island, mouth of Liverpool Harbour—one revolving light.

Canso—Island, Gut of Canso—two lights, one above the other.

Halifax—Meagher's Beach, Halifax—one light.

Pictou—Entrance to Pictou Harbour—one fixed light

Low Point—Entrance to Sydney Harbour—one fixed light.

The light house on the S. E. end of Cross Island, at the entrance of Lunenburg Harbour, in lat. 44 22, N. long. 64 6, W. would be put in operation on the 1st of December, 1839, and will be distinguished from Sambro and Liverpool Lights, by exhibiting two lights, one 30 feet above the other: the lower one will be a fixed light, the upper one will flash or be darkened at intervals of one minute, and can be distinguished from the gradual motion of a revolving light, by the quickness of its motion or change from light to dark. The building is painted red, to distinguish it in the day time from Sambro and Liverpool light houses, which are painted white; and as a further mark of distinction, Cross Island is a low Island, near a mile in extent and thickly covered with trees, whereas Sambro is a high bluff rock, without trees of any description.

Notice has been given that the Light House lately erected on the Island of Scatarie, would be put in operation on the 1st of December, 1839. The building is painted white, and is elevated about 90 feet above the level of the sea, and will be distinguished by a revolving light of a superior description, visible one minute and invisible half a minute. A good boat will always be kept at the establishment to render assistance to vessels in distress, and a gun is placed there to answer signals. The light house is placed near the North Eastern extreme of the Island, and can be seen from a southward or seaward position, and without interruption from any highland, until the compass bearing becomes to the eastward of N. E. by N. when it will be speedily obscured, and any vessel so placed on that side of the Island, is in danger either of the rocks of Scatarie or the southern shores of Cape Breton Island.—From any position to the Northward or in the Gulf of Saint Lawrence, the light can be seen while the distance admits, but when it bears to the Eastward of S. E. a ship is in danger on the N. E. shores of Cape Breton, therefore as a present rule, whereby due warning may be obtained, the light house should never be brought to bear Eastward of N. N. E. or S. E. by S. by compass, nor yet approach nearer than one and a half or two miles.

Two Light Houses have been erected on the North and South extremes of the Island of Saint Paul's, and the one on the North end would be put in operation on the 1st of December, 1839. It will show a very brilliant fixed light, and is elevated about 130 feet above the level of the sea. The one on the south end is expected to go into operation in a short time: a boat and gun are placed there likewise. One of the light houses will be always open until a ship is on the rocks near the centre. The Northern light can be seen to the southward, on any bearing except between N. by E. and E. by N. when it is obscured by the hills to the southward of it.—The southern light can be seen from the northward on any bearing except between S. S. E. and W. when that is obscured by the hills to the northward of it, and when clear either light can be seen for six leagues.—The positions of these two light houses appear to be admirably calculated for the purpose of facilitating the navigation of the Saint Lawrence, as one light will be always open, and either can be passed within a mile.

well worthy our attention.—How can we spend our hours to better profit, than by perusing the very useful hints and remarks in those publications. But Mr. Grumpy says,—“Away with your peaky reading! Think I don't know how to raise taters and turnips without looking into one of these ere gobbled up prints? I guess as how my father knew as much as any one, and I learnt of him.” So cries out prejudice, this noisy ignoramus, which ever has been and ever will be raising its voice against all improvement.

FEBRUARY.—A pitchfork with but one prong, a dung-fork with a broken handle, a rake with three teeth only;—these are the tools of farmer Slouchy. "An undevout astronomer is mad," said the poet, and I have a mind to add also that an undevout farmer is the same. We see order and design, beauty and majesty, wisdom and power, throughout all the works of creation. Is not the farmer then privileged above all others?

MAY.—"The bright rosy morning peeps over the hills;" so, haste out to milking, my fair country girls. Some of our pretty damsels are quite too long upon the pillow. There are the daughters of old Dominic Dozy; it is next to impossible to arouse them. "Wake, Bridget, awake! Come, Dolly; the blue heifer is lowing; Jenny, Jenny, we are waiting for breakfast!" But what signifies this calling and bawling for such sleepy noddles. What! a farmer's daughter in bed after sunrise? I tell you what, neighbor Hoehandle, this would not answer the purpose in your family and mine. "Up and be doing," is the word with us, and thanks to our fathers and mothers, that they brought us up in the good old fashion, making us put it into practice. Fence, fence, fence! See what rents the winds and frosts have made! Low lay the long lengths, as some of our modern poets would phrase it: but I am not disposed for rhyming. Mr. Slack, I tell you in plain prose, that the time has now arrived for farmers to make all snug and safe about their enclosures. See to it, and not delay. Have you a negligent neighbor in this matter? Then urge him, press him, push him on to the business, until he does his part upon the division line. How much trouble arises from having one of these careless, lifeless dolittles alongside of us.

JUNE.—"As a man soweth, so shall he reap. Sluggishness at the beginning will be followed by want at the end of the year." This is certainly true doctrine, and I have no doubt but that many, moved by a knowledge of its truth, have attended to all the necessary preparation for their harvest crops. If, however, any have been dilatory and sluggish, if any have been whiling and loitering, turning and tumbling upon their beds in the morning, or posting themselves by the way-side and telling long yarns and gossip nonsense, when they ought to have been in their fields and gardens, when they ought to have been engaged in the duties of a careful, watchful and industrious farmer, such ones must not complain of the natural consequences of their conduct. If *their* children cry for bread, when smiling Autumn comes, pouring forth her bounties to others, will not the compunctions of shame and mortification keenly affect their hearts, that they have neglected the means given them by Providence to provide things comfortable

and necessary for their own, and therefore must depend on the charities of a neighbour? Wake, then, thou that sleepest, and arise from the dead! Thy cattle, thy swine, thy tillage, thy mowlands, thy fences, thy forests, thy implements, thy barns, dwellings, family, children, aye, and the wife of thy bosom, all cry AWAKE! be faithful to thy duty, and we will repay it.

JULY.—Hark to the music of the merry haymakers at the break of day! It is a fit accompaniment to the various melodies of the morning, feathered songsters. *Turwhit, turwhit*, it goes, as the rifle passes over the glistening steel! Round and round the meadow they sweep, and, before the village clock strikes nine, the beauty of the field is laid low! Come along with me, ye steeping, stewing city wights; who had rather endure the pester, plague and torment of trade, sometimes fretting, and anon trembling at the non-payments and non-punctualities in business affairs, than to swing the scythe, or follow the plough: come along with me, and see the steady, even, easy, consistent and independent life of a farmer. No one here is thrown into distraction because his note has been protested; no one here is startled at the sight of a bailiff approaching his premises.

AUGUST.—Thunder, lightning, hail-storm, tempest, tornado, dog-days and suffocation! How they come, in their angry fury or sweltering propensity. Are you a weatherwise? Every farmer ough' as far as in him lies, be prepared for all weathers. "Innumerable advantages would arise," says a writer on agriculture, "to the husbandman from a foreknowledge of the weather." However, this may not always be true. I very well recollect that my worthy grandmother, (heaven bless her memory,) kept for aye the breast-bone of a wild goose fast nailed over the kitchen fire-place. Here, in this bone, she would say, were sure indications of the approaching changes of the weather. How she could tell I do not exactly recollect, if I ever knew, But I remember that my grandfather had no confidence in her prognostications, and would often reply to her wise sayings with a 'fudge,' or a 'humph!' This would be rather hard upon her vanity, and she would retort by saying something of this kind: "Well, Mr. Span-shackle, if you get your hay wet, it will be good enough for you, and so there." But my grandfather would never send a rejoinder, as the lawyers call it, for he was of a peaceable make, and knew how important it was to maintain quiet in his household affairs. He and my grandmother, on the whole, were suitably yoked, and pulled well together.

SEPTEMBER.—Pomona, I see thy red, fat cheeks with pleasure; for though I am no cider bibber, I love to feast on thy sweet codlings, thy nonpareils, and thy seek-no-farthers. Nay, he might even cut off his right hand, because, in some incautious and evil moment, he has signed his name to a bond that has cost him trouble and distress. No, no, Mr. Hasty, I shall not destroy my fine Spitzensbergs, nor my Roxbury Russetings, nor my beautiful Baldwins. Come, my companions of the furrow, this is one of the finest months in the year

for business, or, if you please, for rational pleasures. How delightful to journey over hill, over dale, through the broom on the vale, as the song says! Plenteous harvest appears on every side, and every husbandman is cheerful and happy.

OCTOBER.—Look yonder in Tom Spavin's cornfield! Six cattle are doing business for themselves at a high rate! This is what comes from inattention to fence, &c. Such sort of harvesting Tom is more or less acquainted with, and from year to year he is seldom without this kind of help. But where is he? Probably gone to Cheatem's Corner to trade horses, for I just saw him pass upon a poor limping gelding, and leading the ghost of another, which the crows seemed to make derision of, as they flew over, cawing, and flapping their wings. How is it that men can thus love an old horse, hoof-bound, spavined, affected with gigs and glanders, wheezing and worn out, better than their wives and children? It certainly seems to be a fact. How happy Tom might live by casting off a set of loose and lawless companions, and devoting his attention to the cultivation of the enjoyments, pleasures and profits that may be found at home, with his wife, his children, his farm, &c. He has good land in plenty, good neighbours all around him, who would be ready at all times to lend the helping hand. But he that would have help from others, must first attempt to help himself. The neighbours are vexed at his negligence; his wife is discouraged; his daughters endure mortification; his only son, a youngster, begins to show an inclination for the pranks of his father.

NOVEMBER.—Dig on, Spuddle, and go ahead in this work; for, you see, old Winter is about closing his window blinds upon us. This digging potatoes is cold work for the fingers, to be sure, and I suppose you think that a glass of grog would serve to put warmth and vigour to them; but you are mistaken in this, neighbour. It is certainly nothing but the fuddling quality in rum that makes people love it.—This sweet delirium is what they like above all things. But, farmers, we must beware of this *lethe*. It's death to all our operations! I know one who dearly loves to take his glass; he sits and dozes while the weeds overtop his crops in summer, and harvest always cries—"You've come too late." USEFUL HINTS ON VARIOUS SUBJECTS.

Hints to Young Farmers and Mechanics and others.—Never be above your calling ; nor afraid of the *frock* and the *apron*. Put off no business till to-morrow, which ought, and can be done to-day. As soon as the spring opens, and the frost is out of the ground, put your fences in order. Plant no more ground than you can well manure and cultivate to advantage. Never hire a man to do a piece of work which you can do yourself. Every day has its appropriate duties ; attend to them in succession. Keep no more stock than you can keep in order, and that of the best kind. Never contract a debt without a reasonable probability of paying it at the time agreed on. Remember that *economy* and *industry* are the two great pillars of every man's prosperity. Should you take *any periodical Journal*, pay for it in advance. Never carry your notes in your pocket-book, as the desk or trunk is the fitter place. Keep them on file, and in order, ready to be found when wanted. Keep a place for your tools, and your tools in their places. Instead of spending a rainy day at the dram-shop, as many do, to their final ruin, repair whatever wants mending ; post your books. Drive your business, and do not permit your business to drive you. Never trust your money in the hands of that man who will put his own to hazard. When a debt becomes due, pay it at the time, whether your creditor wants it or not. Never ask him "to wait till next week," but pay it. Never insult him by saying, "you do not want it." Punctuality is a key to every man's chest. By constant temperance, habitual, moderate exercise, and unaffected honesty, you will avoid the fees of the lawyer and the sheriff, gain a good report, and probably add at least ten years to your life. When a friend calls to see you, treat him with the utmost complaisance ; but if important business call your attention, politely excuse yourself, and he will excuse you. Keep a memorandum book ; enter all notes, whether received or given ; all moneys received or paid out ; all expenses, and all circumstances of importance.

PRACTICAL OBSERVATIONS ON POTATO HUSBANDRY.—By *J. Irons, of Halifax.*—The Caledonian Horticultural Society, in the year 1811, offered their gold medal for the best essay on the diseases to which the potato crops are liable, especially the curl, which wrought destruction on the potato crops in Scotland similar to that experienced in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, from *dry rot*. This induced several scientific men to institute a series of experiments on the culture of this valuable root. They awarded the prize to Mr. Dickson, Nurseryman, in Edinburgh, for his valuable discoveries, which may be found recorded at length in the first number of the *Memoirs of the Caledonian Horticultural Society*. It was first discovered by Mr. Dickson that these diseases were produced from an over ripening of the tuber. He proved this by taking up a part of the half ripened potatoes in summer, and storing them for seed : in the following season these were planted with the other crops, and the result proved that the half ripened seed produced a more abundant and an earlier crop than the others, and quite free from disease. These statements when first published, appeared so much at variance with the general laws of nature, that a number of writers endeavoured to refute them, by reasoning from analogy, without due attention to the first principles of vegetable physiology. Mr. James Rennie, professor of zoology in King's College, London, has recently published a compendium of agriculture, wherein he describes the causes of this productive power in half ripened seeds, of some vegetable species ; which he very

clearly illustrates in the case of the potato : all seeds must have a certain portion of lactical juice inherited in themselves, to support vegetation until the plant forms roots to draw nourishment from the soil. In the case of the potato, it is much longer in a state of dependency than most other luginous plants ; it forms its first root so very slowly, that if the seed do not contain a sufficient supply of nourishment to sustain the plant till it can feed from the soil, it must canker and often die. A full ripe potato does not contain this nutritive sap in the same degree as a half ripe one, the juices being converted into a more solid form of pulp, or animal food, which renders it a bad nurse to a future offspring. The same law holds good in many culmiferous species, such as peas, broad beans, kidney beans, &c. Any one may easily prove the correctness of this position by selecting seeds before they become dead ripe ; for instance take up a quantity of half ripe potatoes, pack them in bran, saw dust, or chaff, plant them at the same time with other potatoes, and the result will be, that the potatoes thus selected, will yield long tubers, fit for table, from two to three weeks before the others, and the produce more abundant."

If we could divest ourselves of ancient prejudices, and examine *cause and effect* on philosophical principles, these facts would be no secret. I would add, that on the same principle, a change of seed from a late to an early climate is always more productive than the contrary, which the history of the potatoe will prove : It is a native of tropical America, and when found in its natural climate, is hardly eatable. Yet after being cultivated in a late climate, and re-introduced to its native soil and climate, it is so much improved as to become one of the chief luxuries of the table. By due attention to these facts, I make no doubt that many of the evils attending potato culture might be avoided, if not thoroughly remedied. The dry rot now so common, appears to me to be entirely a local, not a hereditary disease. The blue potato which is universally and deservedly preferred in this country has been cultivated in the same climate about 50 years (time sufficient to wear out its constitution, and cause a degeneracy.) This might be proved by sending seed of it to Europe : if it was subject to dry rot successively there as it is here, then the disease would be hereditary ; if not (and I think it would not) then the evil would be found local, and could be dealt with accordingly.

ROHAN POTATOES.—The Rohan Potatoe, it seems, has but lately been introduced into this country from France. Its greatest recommendation, it seems, is its wonderful productiveness. And surely, this is of the utmost importance to the farmer, who cultivates them to feed out to his cattle. The quality of the potatoe we do not find very highly spoken of, otherwise than its being a very solid potatoe ; by some it is classed as the *second*, and by others the *third*, among our northern potatoes for the table ; they are, however, vastly more productive than any other potatoe known in this country, if what is stated in an account given of them at *Hampshire* fair, in October, 1838, can be relied on—namely, that Mr. E. Mitchell, from four pounds of seed potatoes, raised 18 bushels, weighing 1,173½ pounds—this is an enormous yield—no doubt they were planted in a rich soil. But still, it is almost incredible, being an increase of almost three hundred fold.

This potatoe, being a native of France, will require early planting, say the first of May, they of course will require a longer time to ripen in. The Rohan Potatoe, of all the other varieties yet known, seems to promise to be a great acquisition to the farmer who raises potatoes for feeding out to his cattle.—*Thomas' Almanack.*

The Rohan Potatoe.—We are indebted to Edward Allison, Esq. for a few specimens of this very productive vegetable, and as he has kindly authorized us to say that what he has are at the disposal of Agricultural Societies and others, who will take some pains in the cultivation and diffusion of them, we beg leave to call the attention of our readers to the matter. Mr. Allison planted last year $2\frac{1}{2}$ lbs. on the 28th May, the product was 168 lbs. This is an enormous yield, more than four times, we believe, what is obtained from the common potatoe. The Rohan is very long, full of eyes, but not so good a table potatoe as many others—but for fattening cattle it must be invaluable.

Since writing the above we learn that John Fairbanks, Esq. has also raised a quantity of these Potatoes, and presented a bushel to the Agricultural Society for gratuitous distribution. The return made in this case was 110 potatoes, for one potatoe, and 77 lbs. for one lb.—*Novascotian*, Oct. 16.

CABBAGES.—If you wish to have good cabbages hoe them often. It is not necessary to heap a great quantity of earth around them; but the earth about them should be stirred often and kept loose and light.

Mix Straw with Clover.—Farmers who have straw or coarse old hay, will find a great advantage in mixing them in layers, with hay that is not thoroughly made; the dry stuff will prevent the clover from injuring by moisture, and it imbibes sweetness so that the cattle will eat with a good relish.—*Yankee Farmer*.

Destroying Insects by Camomile.—In the *Irish Gardener's Magazine*, it is stated not only that decoctions of the common camomile will destroy insects, but that nothing contributes so much to the health of a garden as a number of camomile plants dispersed through it. No green house or hot house should ever be without camomile, in a green or dried state; either the stalks or the flowers will answer. It is a singular fact, that if a plant is drooping and apparently dying, in nine cases out of ten it will recover if you place a plant of camomile in its vicinity.

To destroy Sorrel.—Thirty bushels of lime to the acre, judiciously spread, would sweeten and neutralize the acids of any soil sufficiently to prevent the growth of this pest.

BOTS IN HORSES.—It is said that bots in horses are caused by a fly that deposits its eggs upon the hair of the horse, which causes an itching, and as the horse scratches himself with his teeth the eggs adhere to the glands of the mouth, and are thence carried with the food and drink into the stomach, and there hatch and become bots. It is also said that if a horse be supplied with salt frequently during the fly season, that the eggs which go thus into the stomach will be destroyed and pass off without producing bots.—*Maine Farmer*.

SOMETHING NEW.—A contractor on the public works at Illinois has patented a new drill for excavating rocks. A fair day's work with one of these drills and a good horse, is forty-nine feet in the solid rock.

Improvement in blowing Rocks.—It is said that Mr. Vavnegher, a German in the Brazils, has made the important discovery that sandust (particularly of soft wood,) mixed with gunpowder, in equal parts, has thrice the strength of gunpowder alone, when used in blowing up rocks.

To preserve Eggs perfectly fresh for a Year.—Fill a tight cask, or other vessel, with new laid eggs, then pour in cold thick lime-water, sufficient to cover them; the thicker the lime-water is the better, provided it will fill up all the void spaces; lay a cover lightly over the cask or vessel, keep them from frost and heat, and keep the top moist by occasionally adding a little water.

Cure for the Hooping Cough.—A teaspoon full of castor oil to a table spoonful of molasses ; a teaspoon full of the mixture to be given whenever the cough is troublesome. It will afford relief at once, and in a few days effects a cure. The same remedy relieves the croup, however violent the attack.

Hooping Cough.—It is perhaps, not generally known, that when a child has this troublesome and dangerous complaint, if the backbone, from the neck downwards, be rubbed with garlic, previously warmed by the fire, and the patient being also placed near it, a cure is effected in a very short time.

Paste for chapped hands.—Wash a quarter of a pound of unsalted lard—first in common, then in rose water—mix with yolks of two new-laid eggs and a large spoonful of honey. Add as much fine oatmeal, or almond paste as will work it into paste.

Poison for Bed Bugs.—The best method of exterminating effectually those troublesome little things called *Bed Bugs* is—take one ounce of corrosive Sublimate, finely powdered, and dissolved in a pint of whisky, then wash with a brush where they frequent, and they will soon be got rid of.

Glass Vessels may be cut in two, by tying around them, at the place where you wish to divide, a worsted thread dipped in spirits of turpentine, and then setting fire to the thread.

To remove Ink Spots from Linen.—Take a mould candle or some very pure tallow, melt and dip the spotted part of the linen in the melted tallow, then put it into the wash, when it will become perfectly white.

Snuff useful.—A pinch of snuff applied to a dog's nose, operates so powerfully on the animal's olfactory nerves that however violently engaged in combat he immediately lets go his hold and makes off.

To make a Balking Horse go.—Tie a rope to the animal's tail and pass it between his legs out in front, and pull upon it, and he will move rapidly. This is the plan adopted with jackasses in South America, and they are reputed more stubborn than horses.

New mode of Resuscitation from Drowning.—Close the mouth with the finger, and suck off the foul air from the lungs through the nostrils, and promote respiration by pressing on the abdominal muscles on the sides. By this method, Dr. Fairbrother of Clifton, England, recovered a boy who had been under water a quarter of an hour, and another quarter of an hour had elapsed before the body was operated upon.

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A TABLE

FOR FORETELLING THE WEATHER, THROUGH ALL THE LUNATIONS OF EACH YEAR, FOREVER.

(Formed by Dr. Herschell, and revised by Dr. Adam Clarke.)

This Table and the accompanying remarks are the result of many years' actual observation; the whole being constructed on a due consideration of the attraction of the sun and moon, in their several positions respecting the earth, and will, by simple inspection show the observer what kind of weather will most probably follow the entrance of the moon into any of its quarters, and that so near the truth as to be seldom or never found to fail:

If the new moon, first quarter, full moon, or last quarter happens	IN SUMMER.	IN WINTER.

Observations.—1. The nearer the time of the moon's change, first quarter, full and last quarter are to *midnight*, the fairer will the weather be during the seven days following. The space for this calculation occupies from ten at night till two next morning.

2.—The nearer to *mid day* or *noon* the phases of the moon happen, the more foul or wet weather may be expected during the next seven days. The space for this calculation occupies from ten in the forenoon to two in the afternoon. These observations refer principally to the summer, though they affect spring and autumn nearly in the same ratio.

3.—The moon's change, first quarter, full and last quarter, happening during six of the afternoon hours, that is, from four to ten, *may* be followed by fair weather; but this is mostly dependent on the wind, as is noted in the table.

4.—Though the weather, from a variety of irregular causes, is more uncertain in the latter part of autumn, the whole of winter, and the beginning of spring, yet, in the main, the above observations will apply to these periods also.

5.—To prognosticate correctly, especially in those cases where the wind is concerned, the observer should be within sight of a good vane, where the four cardinal points of the heavens are correctly placed.
