## LIGHT HOUSES.

Board of Commissioners for the several Light Houses in the Bay of Fundy.-Robert W. Crookshank, John Ward, Isaac Woodward, Hon. W. F. W. Owen, John Wilson, Lieut. Charles Hare, R: N., and Johin James Robinson, R. N., Esquires.
Isaac Woodwarl, Esquire, Surveyor of those Light Honses in the Pay of Fundy belonging to New Brunswick, and also of those be onging to Nova Scotia which are partly supported by this Province.
Caps Sable Seal Island Light.-The first Light in approaching the Bay of Fundy, is on the South Point of the Seal Island. This is a plain white Light, elevated about 80 feet above high water mark, and may be seen in approaching the Island fromiany point of the compass. A yery dangerous rock, under water, but upon which the sea always breaks, called Blonde Rock, lies about $3 \frac{1}{3}$ miles S. by W. by compass, from the Light House. Between this rock and the Island, there are tome dangers-the ground is rocky throughout; and large vessels, therefore, ought not to attempt passing between them.

Brier Island Light.-In advancing up the Bay, the next Light is siyated on Brier Island, about hall a mile N. E. from the N. W. point ereof. A plain white light.
Digby Gut Light.-The next light on the coast of Nova Scotia is placed on the west side of Digby Gut-from Brier Island North East ward. The coast is very bold and not indented ; the Light is therefore chiefly intended as a guide into Digby Basin - A white Light. Gannet Rock Light. -This Light is intended to warn vessels of their proach to a very' dangerous range of shoals, and ledges, which exid from the Old Proprietor to the .Seal Islands off Machias, a dispee of about twenty miles. It is a flash light-rohite-twenty seads dark and forty light in each minute. The Light House is inted in stripes, vertical, black and white.

This may be avoided by keeping three remarkable headlands near the S. W. end of Grand Manan, open.

Machias Seal Island Lights.-There are two fixed white lights upon the Machias Seal Islands, elevated about forty-five feet above high water, and bear from each other E.S. E. and W. N. W. distant about 200 feet, by which circumstance of two Light Houses at the same station, they will be immediately distinguished from all other lights upon the coast, (British or Ainerican) Both the Buildings are painted white. Point Le Preau Lights.-Upnn this projecting head land two lighte are placed, one above the other, in the eame house, and distant 28 fect.-Buth lights can be seen from every point of the compase, where they may be useful-both are fixed und whitc. The Light Houne is plinted red and white, in stripes of fivo feet broad each, horizontally.

Partridge Island Light.-This light, at the entrance of the River and Harbour of Saint John, having been eatablished upwarde of forty years, requires no particular notice, further than that it is a fixed whice light, and that the Light House is red and white, in vertical stripen.

Beacon Light.-Within Partridge Island, and upon a Spit or bar whieh extends about half a mile S. S. E. off Sand Point, andiwhich dries at two-thirds ebb, stands the Beacon Tower. Upon this Tower a light is established, which is eminently useful to the coasting trade of Saint John, and to all other vessels having pilots on board, as it enables them to enter the harbour at all hours of the night A fixed uchite light. The House is white and black, in etripes vertically.

Quaco.-A revolving wohite light is placed on a small rock off Quaco Head, showing twice full and twice dark in a minute. This light can bo seen from any quarter where a vessel can approach. The Light Hoase is painted white and red in horizontal stripes.

Cape Enrage Light.-On the point of that name, in Westmorland, nearly opposite Apple River Harbour, N. S. A plain white light. The House is painted white, and is about 120 feet above tide mark.

West Qwoddy Light.-This is an American Light, and is placed on the West side of the entrance into the Saint Croix by Lubee and Eastport.

Cape Forchu Light-On Cape Forchu; on the weatern side of the entrance to Yarmouth (Nova-Scotia), in lat. 43,39, N. long, 668. W. It exhibits a plain revolving light-visible one minute andea quarter, and invisible half a minute The building is painted white, and is elevated 135 feet above the level of the sea.

Five Shillings per foot, for bringing any Ship or Vosed into the Harbour of Saint John, and mooring her into a safe place ar berth; or securing her alongside of one of the Wharves; and Five shithings per foot for removing and takiug any Ship or Vessel out of the Harbour.
In cases where Pilots shall be detained on board of Vessels, under and by Virtue of the Quarantine or Health Laws of the Province, they shall be entitled to demand and receive from Masters of such Veasels, the eum of Ten Shillings per day, for everyiday of such detention, in addition to the allowance aforesaid.

Coasting Versels, going from one part of the Bay of Fundy to another, British Steam Boats, or British Vessels drawing under six feet of water, are not compelled to take pilots; when employed, they are to be paid according to the rate above meationed.
For removing Vessela from any mooring ground to any Wharf, or from one Wharf to another Wharf, and seeing them properly moored or secured, the following rates: For Vessels not exceeding Ono. Hundred Tons, Seven Shillings and Sixpence; for Vessels over One Hundred and not exceeding Two Hundred Tons, Ten Shillings; for Vessels over Two Hundred and not exceeding Three Hundred Tons, Fifteen Shillings ; and for all Vessels over Three tundred Tons, the sum of Twenty Shillings.

## AGRICULTURAL.

Improvements on the. Farm.-The later part of August and the fore part of September :atay be considered the most favorable part of the year for making improvements on the farm. At this season, the carlier crops have been secured, the cultivation of the later ones has been finished, and the farmer is only waiting for their maturity. In addition to the comparative leisure which is thus afforded, there are other circunstances which render this a suitable period for such operations. The ground is generally drier than at any other time during the year, which permits the labour of men and teans on places which at other times are inaccessible from wetness. I'his is particularly favorable to the diainage of bogs; and to the excavation of peat or muck for manure. The growth of bushes and shrubs has also reached that particular crisiu in which they may be more easily killed by cutting or bruising.

One of the first objects to which attention should be directed in the improvement of the farm, is the eradication of bushes and pernicious plants in fields, along lines of fences, roadsides \&ec Thess are not only great drawbacks on the beauty of the firm, being unsightly to the eye, and conveying an unpleasant idea of careless and slovenly habits; but they are very detrimental to the pecuniary interest of the farmer. They draw nourishment from the ground which should go to the support of valuablo plants, and by propagating themselves, are constantly increasing and spreading the injury. Thistles, docks, briers and thorns, are often allowed to flourish unmolested in the situations mentioned. On the borders of fields they occupy the richest of the soil, and annually extend their encroachments. They are not unfrequently seen in good lands, that are devoted to various crops, and in pastures are quite common-many farmers being apparently regardless of their presence and effects. The greater extent of ground that is occupied by these worthless pests, is a dead loss; but besides this, grass and othier crops are robbed of moisture by them during drouth, and at other times are soured and diminished in growth by their shade and root.

It should be an invariable rule with the farmer to prevent all injurious plants from seeding. This will at all events keep them from spreading-except such as increase by root. Annual or b:ennial thistles are easily destroyed by being cut while in blossom and before any seed is matured; and even Canada thistles may be destroyed by following up this course for several seasons in succession. They should be cut close to the ground, and just at that juncture when they are in the fullost bloom. A few will start, which if untouched will produce seed in autumn; but this second crop should be cut without fail, when in the same stage as the first. The readiest and most effectual mode of destroying Canada thistles, where they occupy ground tinat will admit of cultivation, is by frequently working the soil with the plough, or some implement that will entirely prevent the growth of the top. No plant can bear to be deprived of its leaves for a long tino, and if thistlo patches are
worked over so often as to prevent the plant from appearing above ground, they will frequently be killed in one season.

The reclamution of waste lands, genernlly, but especially, those of a wot and swampy nuture, muy bo prosecuted with advantage at this season. With these, drainuge is the first object, The water which appears in the form of springs should be first catt off by deep channels nlong their sources, and these chapnels should convey the water to such points as will best insure its dissharge from the land. As tho water is taken away, the suil will settle moresor less, and this settling will facilitate further operations in several wayg. The solidity acquired will admit of taking on teams, for getting cut stones, stomps and bushes, and all suoli objects are left by the settling of the earth, mostly on the surface, from which they may be readily removed.

Heat tu be used in the barn yarl, for mixing with animal manure, should be dug out at this season, and piled on dry land, where it may be obtnined as wantel. "In this situation, the air and ruins gradually dissipate the acid which the peat contains when in its natural bed, and which must be dispelled or neutralized before the peat can afford nourishment to plants.

It is an erroneous idea, though entertnined by many. farmers, that improvement will not pay. We beliove this is in many instances, urged merely as an excuse for carelessness and negligenco. It is a safo maxim that, what is worth doing, is worth doing woll. $\dot{W}$ e could refer to liundreds of instances where such improvements as we have spoken of have buen mado, with a grenter profit on the money so expended, than is realized in the ordinary routinc of farming. The lands operated on are frequently of little or no value; but by an outlay of $£ 5$ or $£ 6$ are made to pay an annual interest of from $£ 12$ to $£ \underset{5}{5}$, and sometimes $£ 50$ an nere.

Preparing Land for a Crop,-A farmer has a field of elayey loam, which requires a week's work at least to prepare it for corn, oats or barley. Now how ought he to proceed?

It is not uncommon to see such lots turned over, and the furrowslice left day after day, to dry and bake in the sun, without the least attention till the ploughing of the whole field is completed.

Well; what better could he do ?
Reduce what he has plonghed to a fine tilth while it is moist and easily crumbles-not leaving it to lie one day before he puts on the harrow or the drag roller. A small share of labour at this time will do twice as much to pulverize the soil, as when it is hardened like an unburnt brick.

What! stop the plough befire finishing the field! Farmers, that drive a-head don't do so.

That is, they drive one day a-head; and leave their work two days behind But let me ask whit is the use of ploughing land?

The uase? why to put the ground in order; you could not expect a crop without it

Neither ought we to expect more than half a crop when it is only half pulverized. 'If' we plough eight inches deep, and one half of this soil is in hard clods, how much better is it than to
plough four inches deep, and have it thoroughly pulverized? How much betteris a clod on a field than a stone; An Old Farmer.

Peat an a Manurr -In the Report of the York County Agricultural Society, we find some usefill observations on the value of peat as manure, by Professor Rohb, of Fredericton, a gentleman of high standing as a geologist and chemist. He gives three modes by which this subatance may be advantageously used for the improvement of soil as follows:

1st. It may bo carted to the bare yard and spread all around, so as to absorb all the liquid manure, which it will do liko a sponge; not only will it thus sonk up and fis liquid and gaseons matters, whieh would otherwise be lost, but it will thereby takn on a state of fermentation itself, which will ressult in its becoming soluble and proper for the food of crops. When one layer is soaked and formented, more or less, it must be renewed, or replaced by fresh stutif from the bog, which will thus become a permanent benefit in the firm.

2d. The peaty.substance may be very udvantagenusly composted and brought to a soluble form thereby. If three loads of half dried peat eantry be mixed with one of stable manure (green), there will be formed four loads of manure equal in value to cow dung itself; for the ordinary root and grain crops. A layer of dry peat should form the base of the compost heap, then a layer of green manure, then alternate layers of peat and manure, ending with a thich layer of peat. If ashes be added, or if the heap be occasionally watered with urine, decomposition wiil be more rapid, and the compost be more fertilizing. In six. weeks, more or less, according to the senson, the heap may be shove!led over, and then carried oll to the lield, where its effects are equal, if not superior, to the same quantity of commen dung. It may be applied to any soil deficient in vegetable matter, and in any way, exactly as if it were so much well rotted yard manure. By ashes alone, the peaty earth may likewise be converted into the food of plants ; hut I believe it hest to use them as above directed.

3d. The peat may be burnt in the fields for its ashes, whith are applied with very, good effect as a top dressing to meadows, at the rate of forty or fifty bushels per acre.

Wastr of Manure - Little or no pains is taken usually to same the liquid manure of animals; no earth or saw dust is placed in ort beneath the stable to absorb it ; and the barn-yard is ofien so situated, that all the liquids that would collect in it, run off into the ${ }^{5}$ street, or are conducted to the adjoining field, where they are so $h$ little spread about, as to injure the crop by producing an inmoderate luxuriance. Liquid manure is exceedingly valuable, and the $y$ ards and stables of the farmer shonlid be so constructél, that it may all be saved: There should be no outlet to the barn yard, where the fluids collected in it can run off. They should either be taken away and applied directly to the land, or poured upon the compost heaps in and about the, barn yard. The turf about his
fences and stone walls, or the mud and muck from his swamps, should be collected in heaps or spread around his yard in order to absorb the fertilizing liquids collected there.

Among the great variety of occupations calling for the farmer's attention at different periods of the year, few are so little appreciated as farming accounts. Accurate information respecting every item of income or outlay is of the greatest inportance. With the account book sliould also be associated a book of experiments and observations, wherein as occasion offers, every circumstance respecting the operations of the farm may be recorded. Ample time offers during the long winter evenings for reviewing the course pursued, and fie results arrived at during the past year, from which valuable information relative to future proceedings may be derived. Good husbandry implies not only an accurate knowledge of what has been done during the past three or four years, but it also requires that she proceedings of the next three years should as far as possible be marked out. Proper application of certain necessary manures, and the adoption of a profitable rotation of crops can then be pursued: without such foresight it is impossible that a farmer can mako his farm produce within one third, and in many cases one half, of what it is capable of yielding in the hands of a careful husbandman.

Kiling Sorrel.-According to the Michigan Farmer, ploughing sorrel with a shallow furrow, late in the fall, leaving the roots exposed to the action of the frost through the winter, has been fuund effectual in destroying this pernicious plant.

## MISCELLANEOUS.

The Gregorian Year-Old and New Style.-The Julian year is observed throughout the greater part of Europe. This mode of computing time is a great improvement of the ancient calendar, but it is not quite correct, as it makes the year eleven minutes longer than the true solar year. This may seem a trifling error, yet it amounts t a whole day in one hundred and thirty years; and, therefore, if allowed to continue uncorrected, must lead to great mistakes, and irregularity.

The Julian mode of reckoning, however, remained unaltered till 1582, when it was found that the ycar began ten days later than it ought to have done; that, consequently, the seasons did not fall rightly with the months, and that the solstices and the equinoxes happened ten days before their sespective dates.

This led to many inconveniences. It unsettled the times fixed for the celebration of Easter, and of other moveable feasts connected with the Christian Church; many attempts were therefore made to rectify the error.

In 1582, Pope Gregory the Thirteenth ordered that after the 4th of October, ten days should be omitted, so that the day which followed the 4 th , in place of being called the 5th, was called the 15th. By this means the ervor of the then Julian year was corrected.

To prevent any such variation from happening in future, he also ordered, that after the year 1600, every hundredth year, which would have been leap year, according to the Julian reckoning, should be a common year for three successive centuries, but that every four-hundredth year should remain a leap year. 'Thus, the years 1700, 1800, 1900, have the usual number of days, but the year 2000 is to have an additional day. Those centuries, in short will be bissextile, which divide by four without a remainder.

In bonor of its founder, the new form of year received the name of the Gregorian year.

The calendar thus improved was adopted at once in all Roman Catholic countries. The Protestant states, however, did not conform to it till a later period, and in England the change was not introduced till the year 1752. It was then settled by Act of Parliament that eleven days should be left out in the month of September, because, one hundred and seventy years having passed since the ten days were omitted, the Sun had gained one day mere upon our tims.

On the 2nd of September, 1752, the old mode ceased, and the next day, instead of being called the 3rd, was called the 14th. At the same time, the 1st of January was declared to be the first day of the year, which had hitherto been said to begin on the 5 th of March.

Since that time, all dates are said to be according to the Newo Style, and Old Style distinguishes dates previous to the alteration. In reading old books we often find allusion to sirch dates, and we should bear them in mind wher, perusing chronicles and histories. Sorie countries, as Russia, and others, still retain the old style.

In the year 1800, which, according to the usual way of reckoning, was a leap year, the additional day was omitted, as had been directed when the calendar was reformed; so that there now are twelve days of difference between the old and new styles.

British National Debt-Fundeil and Unfunded-Charles M. was the first king of Great Britain who adopted a system of borrowing on the national credit. This began in 1660 . At the abdication of James II. ( 1688 ), the amount of the debt was $£ 660,000$, or rather more than half a million sterling. In the war of the British revolution, under William 1H1, there were contracted twenty-one millions. Total debt in 1697, twenty-one millions and a half. Paid off during the peace which ensued on the treaty of Ryswick (1697), five rillions. Total debt in 1702, sixteen inillions and a half. To prosecute the war of the Spanish succession, under Queen Anne, there were raised by loans, thirty-seven milliuns and a half. 'lotal debt in 1713, the date of the treaty of Utrecht, fifty-four millions. Paid off during this peace, in the reigns of George I. and II., seven millions and a half; reducing the debt, in 1739, to forty-six millions and a half, The war with Spain, and of the Austrian succession, under George II., increased the naticnal responsibilities in 1548, to severiyeight millions, the period of the treaty of Aix-la-Chapelle. In the ensuing eight years of tranquillity, the debt was reduced to seventy-five millions. In the seven years' war, under licorge II. and 1II, seventy-one millions and a half in louns were contracted; augmenting the total debt, in 1783, to one hundred and forty-six millions and a half Paid off in the next ten years of peace, ten millions and a half. The American war of independence cost this country one hundred and three millions; making the total debt, in 1783, two hundred and thirtynine millions. Paid off after the treaty of Versailles or Paris, five millions. Total debt, in 1793, two hundred and thirtyfour millions. In the war of the French revolution there were contracted two hundred and ninety-two millions. At the treaty of Amiens, concluded in 1802, the delt had reached five hundred and twenty-six millions; and in the next year three millions were added to it. In May, 1803, began the struggle with Buonaparte under George III. and the Prince Regent; and at the treaty of Paris, in 1815, it appeared that the contest had cost Fagland three hundred and thirty-six millions. The debt was then swollen to eight hundred and sixty-five millions. During the peace under the Prince Regent, George IV., and William 1V., it was reduced by not less than eighty-seven millions. In 1835, we had to raise twenty-millions for slave emancipationz Under William IV and her present majesty there have: adso been borrowed about five millions. Total of debt-all raisedivy' louns --eight hundred and three millions. Besides this, there were raised for the purposes of these various wars, in direct taxation, six inundred and thirty-five millions; making a grand total of one thousand four hundred and thirty-eight millions, as the war ex-
penditure of Great Britain'in a'céntury and a half. Total loss of life, in these wars, $3,910,000$; ' of whom $1 ; 40 \theta, 000$ 'fell 'in the struggle between the allied powers and Napoleon. The foregoing ancount of the public debt is exslusive of the annuities for lives, and terms of years, which now amount to upwards of four millions annually. 'I'he sum required yearly to pay the interest of the debt, the terminable annuities, and the management, is little less than twenty-nine millions and a half; being more than the whole expenses of government. The national debt amounted, in 1848, to upwards of eight hund red millions of pounds, being an'average of $£ 2912 \mathrm{~s} .7 \mathrm{~d}$. for every man, woman, and child in Great Britain ; and the payment of the mere interest of which, inflicts an annual tax of upwards of £1 2s. $2 d$. upon every human being living in the British kingdom.

THE EARTM.
The Earth, considered as a planet, occupies a favored rank in the solar system. It pleased the All- wise Creator to assign it a position among the heavenly podies, whefe nearly a!l the sister phanets are visible to the naked eye. It is situated between Venns and Mars.

It revolves round the sinifrom weat to east, in 365 days, 5 hours, 56 minutes arid 4 secorfis. It revolves on its own axis in 23 homs, 56 minntes, and 4 seconds. Its intean distance from the Sun is about 95 millions of miles. It consequently moves in its urbit at the mean rate of 68 thousand miles an hour, and on its axis at the rate of $\mathbf{1 0 4 0}$ miles per homr.

Thns, the earth on which we stand, and which has ser ved for ages as the unshaken foundation of the finmest structures, is every moment turning swifty on its centre, and, at the same time, moving onwards with great rapidity through the empty space.

The Earth performs one complete revolution on its axis in 23 hours, 56 minutes, and 4,09 secouds, of solar time; this is called a sideral day,"because, in that time, the stars appear to complete one revolution round the Earth. But as the Earth adrances almost a degree eastward in its orbit, in the time that it turns eastward around jts uxis, it is plain that just one rotation never brings the same meridian around from the Sun to the Sun again ;'so that the Earth reguires' as much more than one complete revolution on its axis to complete a solar day, as.it has gone forward in that time. A sideral day is the time employed in a planet's revolution round from one star to the same star again. A solar day is that which brings the Earth around from one meridian to the same meridian again. This difference between the sideral and solar time may be illustrated by referring to a watch or clock. When both hands set out together, at $120^{\circ}$ clock, for instance, the minute hand must travel more than a whole circle before it will overtake the hour hand, that is, before they will come into conjunction again.

In the same manner, if a man travel around the Earth eastioardly, no matter in what time, he will reckiun one day nore, on his arrival at the place from whence he set out, than they do who'remain at rest; while the man who travels round the Earth westwardly, will have less. From wohich it is manifest, that, if two persons start from the same place at the same time, but go in contrary directions, the one travolling east and the other west, and'cach"gies completely around the globe, although they should both arrive again at the same hour and at the same place from wohich they set out, yet they will disagree tno whole days in their reckoning. Should the day of their return, to the man who travelleel west, be Monday, to the man who travellell enst, it would be Wednesiay; while to those vohn remained at the place itself, it zonuld be Tuesday.

Froon these facts, we may readily compreflend the principles imvolved in a curinus $\therefore \therefore$ blem which appeared a few years ugo. It was gravely repurted by an American ship, that, in sailin!r over the vesan, it chanced to find six Sundays in February. The fact was in i..ied on, and a solution demuniled. There is nothing absurd in this. The mann oho travels araud the Earth east, will see the Sun go down a little earlier every succeeding day than if he had remained at rest ; or earlier than they do who live at the place frum which he set, out. I'ke fuster he tranels towards the rising sun, the snoner will it appear above the horizon in the morning, nud so much soozer will it set at night. What he thus gains in cime, viill bear the sume proportion to a solar day as the dístawee travelled tines to the circumferrnce of the Earth. As the glabe is 360 degrees in
circumference, the Sitn will appear to move over the 24th part of its surface, or $15^{\circ}$, sirery hour, which is 4 minutes to one degrec. Consequently, the sun woill rise, come to the meridian, and set, 4 minutes sooner at a place 10 east of ws than it will with us ; at $2^{\circ}, 8^{\circ \prime \prime}$ sooner ; at $3^{\circ}, 12, "$ and so on.
Sino the man who travels one degrree to the east; the first day, will have the Sun on his moridian 4 minutes suoner than woe do who remoin at rest ; cach successive day being completed 4 minutes carlier than the preceding, antil he arrives at the place from uchich he started; wohen this continsal gain of 4 minutes per day voill have amounted to $a$ whole day in advarce of our time; consequently, the day on which he arrives at home, whatever day of the week it may be, is one clay in advance of ours, and he must needs live that day over again, by calling the next day by the same name, in order to make the accounts harmonize.

If this should be the lasit day of Fehruary in a bissaxtile year, it would also be the same day of the week that the first was, and be six times repeated, and if it should happen on Sunday, he voould, under these circumstances, have six Sundays in February.

The Earth's motions abont its axis being perfectly equable anid miform in every part of its annual revolution, the sideral days are always of the same length, but the solar or synodical days vary very considerably at different times of the year. This vaxia tion is oving to two distinct causos; the inclination of the Farth's axis to its orbit. and the inequclity of its motion round the Sun. From these two causes it 1 s, that the time shown by a woll regulated clock and that of a true sun dial are scarcely ever the samie. The difference between them, which sometimes amownts to $16 \frac{1}{4}$ minutes, is called the equation of time, or the equation of solar days.

The difference òetween mean and apparent time, are, in other words, be tween rquinoc.. tial and ecliptic time, may be shovon in this uny :-Lest it be first premised, that equi. noctial time is clock time, and that ecliptic time is solar or apparent time. . It appears, that from Aries to Cancer, the sun in the ecliptic comes to the aneridian brfore the equinoctial sun: from Cancer to Libra, after it : from Lilra to Capricorn, bafire it : and from Capricorn to Aries, after it. If noe notice what months the San is in thrse several quarters, we shall find that from the 25 th if Dromber to the 16 th of April, and from the 16 th of June to the list of September, the clock is fuster than the sun dial, or sun slow of clock; and that, from the lith of April to tha 16 ith of Jwne, und from the 1st of September to the 25 th of December, the sun diati is fuster than the clock, or sun fast of elock.

The chief item of expenditure is the army, which is calculated at 700,000 to $1,000,000$ of foot, horse, and artillery. Some say that the emperor has many millions of treasure hoarded. The national debt is over $\$ 200,000,000$. About $40,000,000$ of the peoples are slaves, of whom $21,500,000$ belong to the imperial family. A synod of about 300 governs the chureh, and every parish priest must be a married man. Edncation is much more getleral of late years. There are several military schools. Moscow contains 400,000 sonls.

Hungary.-Its extent, inc!uding Transylvania and Crotia, is above 125,000 square miles, or a little more than Britain and Ireland. Its population exceeds $14,000,010$ men of various races, languages, and religions: $5,000,000$ are Majjars, over $3,000,000$ are Germans and Wallacks, 5,000,000 are Sclaves, less than 900,000 Croats. Cential Ilungary is not surpassed in soil and climate by any other part of Europe. It yields abondantly all the prodncts of the temperatezone, with others common to Italy and southern France, A mountain range 8,000 feet high, protects the plains from the cold winds of the north. The climate is the healthiest in! Enrope. Hungary is rich in coal, metals, and minerals. The Majjars are chiefly Protestants, who num. ber $5,500,000$; there are $5,000,000$ Roman Catholics, 2,000,000 Greek church.

British India.-It contains $100,000,000$ of people; is provided with an army of $300,000 \mathrm{men}$, whose support costs $\$ 70,000,000$ per annum, the whole public revenue of India being only twice $\$ 70,000$, 000. In 1846, the public debt of India was $\$ 187: 000,000$, the annual interest on which was nearly $\$(, 000,000$.

Reaming Books fok Schools -The Massachusetts Ploughman suggests that "an important improvement in common schools would be to introduce better matter for reading. Instead of pitting young scholars to read of the celebrated inen of old-warriors mostly, who acquired their renown by shedding human blood--let a part of their reading lessons consist in compositions relating to Agriculture."

When the constable has canght a hief, is it not monstrous that a counsellor. privileged us a friend to justice, will for a fee of ten dollars up to a thousand of the stolen money, exert himself to defeat justice, and send the villain back into the bosom of society again to plunder honest men? "I do not think it right," says Macanley, " that a man with a wig on his head and a band round lis neck, shonid do for a gninea, what, without these appendages, he wonld think it wicked and infamons to do for an empire."

Obseroations.-1. The thearer the time of the moon's change, first quarter, full und last qua:ter, are to midnight, the fairer will the weather be during the seven days following.
2. The space for this calculation occupies from ten at night till two next morning.
3. The nenter to midday or moon, the phases of the moon liappen, the more foulor wet weather may be expected during the next seven days.
4. The space far this calculation ocoupies from ten in the forenoon to two in the afternoon. These observations refer principally to the summer, thongh they affect spring and autumn nearly in the same ratio.

- The mon's change, first quarter. fulland last quarter happening. during six of the afternoon hours, i. e. from four to ten, may be followed by fair wenther; but this is mustly dependent on the wind, as is moted in the table.
6 Though the weather, from a variely of irregular ceatses, is more nucertnin in the latter part of autumn, the whole of winter, and the beginmug of spring, yet, in the main, the above observations will apply 1 those periods also.

7. To prognosticate correctly, especially in those caves where the wand is concerned, the observer should be in sight of a good vane, where the four cardinal points of the heavens are correctly placed.
