L. systems These would provide for heavy reductions in rates besides providing for all charges, replacement and maintenance, or a surplus at the maturity of the \$8,000,000 debentures of \$11,000,000. This Mr. MacKay takes for granted, would be absorbed in lowering rates.





"That if the existing Toronto Railway Company's system is linked up with the existing ciric system and the existing radial lines, and enlarged from 147 miles of track (the combined city mileage of all tracks at present) to 288 miles in 1921, with corresponding increases in car capacity, etc., and operated as a single consolidated system, to give a proper and an adequate unified service thruout the whole limits of the city on a single fare basis from any point to any point, with the usual transfer privileges, the net annual surpluees thereof when set aside and invested as a sinking fund-after providing for all operating costs, includ-ing taxes and replacement charges, for in-terest on the purchase price and interest on the new capital required for the ex-ting on the existing ciric system), and after paying to the city upwards of \$13.-00,000 in respect of the share of traffic receipts it is entitled to under its ex-isting agreement with the Toronto Street Railway Company-should amount by the first September, 1921, to the sum of substantially \$11,500,000.
