P. McGuire, has purchased the Nicollet hotol, Wianipeg, from P. O'Cunnor.

Samuel Astin, music dealor, Winnipeg, who is going to tako up his residenco in Toronto, has sold out to S. L. Birrowclough, in the same line at Winnipeg.
Tho filth annual convention of the Central Farmers' Instisuto of Manitoba openod in Brandon on Wednesday, presidont James Eldor, of Virdon, in the chair. A lumber of very excellent papers wero road at the convention.
Winnipeg city ongineer has reported on tho tondors for tho asphalt paving of Donald. Har grave and Kennedy streets, and Assiniboine avenue. The tonder of Kelly Bros., $\$ 30$, 881.80 for Wesstch and $\$ 81,131.80$ for Trinidad or Bermuda aspbalt, was shown to bo the lowest and was accepted.
Supt. Bedford, of the experimental farm, Brandon, reports vory favorably on tho crops at the farm. Ho also says: "I bave driven ovar the district south of Branden for forty milea, and the crops aro premising. fully uqual to those on the exporimental farm ; and I am informed that tho crops aro alss promising on every side of Brandon."
McRas \& Flowelling's blactesmith shop and Thos. Miner's carriage shop at Hamiota were burned rocontly. The adjoining building, a barber shop, occupied by A. Ficlly, was partinlly burned and otherwise damaged. The blacksmith and carriage shopa, with tho eniire contents, were consumed. Mr. Miner's loss is partially covered by insurance. McRan \& Flewelling had no insurance; loss about $\$ 500$.

## Forthwest Ontario.

A. Macdonald \& Co., grocers, Winnipeg, have oponed a branch business at Rat Portago. C. H. Jeckson, dealer in boots ard show, Fort William, has formed a partnership with A. E. Rutledge. The firm will be known as Rutlodgo \& Jackson.
Tho Bullion Mining Co. of Ontario has boen formed, with a capital of $\$ 300,000$, to
acquire, dovolop and doal in gold mining proportios in tho Lake of tho Wouds and othor gold districts. I'ho prospectus of the company is published on another pago in this number of Tho Commorcial. Some excollont names aro connected with tho enmpany, such as Goo: Barnes, meyor of Rat Purtnge, president; D. C. Canneron, president of the Outario and Western Lumber Co., vice-president; IV. A. Weir, minager of tho Imparial Rauk. Hat Portage. troasurer, otc., thus affording a guaranteo that the company is a solid concorn and will faithfully carry out its obligations.

Coal has beon discovered in Aigoma, near Sudbury. This is a particularly gratifyung find, as Algnma has enormous minernl rosources, in aid of the dovelopment of which coal has been nooded. Tho coal is said to be suitable for the iron industry.

## Alberta.

It is roportod that the Great Falls and Cancde railroad, the narrow-guage line running from (ireat Falls, Mont., to Lethbridgo, Alberta, will bo widened and mado Gtandard guage. Construction trains, it is said, will be put on at once and the road will be rebuilt as soon as it can be done. The work of building the bridges and trestles will bo continuod as fast as pussible. This will parmit direct cunnections to tho "Soo" and Canadian Pacific lines, and the latter will make a bid for tho business of northorn Montana in competition with tho Great Northern.
The quartorly mecting of tho Fidmonton board of trade was held recontly when I. Cowio way appointod with F. Oliver, M.P., to inturview the proper autiorities with a view to obtaining a roduction in railway rates on tho Canalian Pacific IRailway branches leading to tho Kootenay cuuntry. It ras also decided that tiose members of the board who are also provisional directors of the Fdmonton district railroad should join with tho directors in proparing data for MLr. Oliver's guidance at Ottawa in bringing before the Liberal government the promises made by their predecessors regarding aid to tho Edmonton district railroad.-Bullotin.

## Hides, Wool otc.

The Toronto Globe sags: The tanners are indiffercut and seom to be only buying hides to mect immcdiato requirements. Hulders aro firm, howevor, and prices wero advanced this week and aro now quoted at 6c for No. 1 greon, $\overline{0} \mathrm{f}$ for No. 2 and 4c for No. 3. Cars of cured are quoted $a \pm, 6 t$ to $6 \frac{1}{c} \mathrm{c}$. Lambskins at 95 c ; pelts at 15 c ; horsehides, $\$ 1.50$ to $\$ 1.75$ each; wool pickings are quoted at 8c to 9 c , and horsobair at 18 c . Tallow dealers aro paying 8t to 38 c . Eur firece wool, thero is a domand fo: all coming in, and the market is steady at 190 for lots of selected masiucu wool in the country. A littlo solected wool has been takon for oxport to the United States at ${ }^{2} 0 \mathrm{c}$ c.

The Chicago Shon and Leather Review says: Shipments to Europo of Australian tallow havo fallen off 12,000 tierces for June as 20 m parod with tho samo month of 1895. Stcelss of tallow in Europe are gradually decreasing and American renderers aro looking forward to an incroased domand from that ojuntry. At tho prosent time shippars are not bidding ovar 3de for prime packors' tallow, while 3 tic is asked. Tho output by the paclsors continues liberal, whilo the receipts of tallow in tho country markots aro meagor and of a poor qualits.
Regarding wool markets in tho United States, Bradstreet's ssys: "The market is very much deprossed, and tho business doing is largely confined to sample lots, but fow salcs of fair-sized parcols of rool boing noted.

Values aro not matorially differont, but aro largely nominal, thero being not onough business to ostablioh quotations. The featuro of tho market is the firm tone in London, and tho strong viows hold by operators at producing points in the interior. Manufacturors aro not woll suppliod, hut thoy will not buy wool until thoy are ablo to securo orders for woolons, hence tho low pricas provo to be no attraction. The supply ot old wool that crat high held at the sesboard is largo, and dealers are not dispused to show much speculativo tondoncy as long as they havo this on their hands, Australiau wool is hold firm, and sales run small Carpat wools aro dull but steady

## Grain and Milling,

About the closo of last year, says a Mont, real oxchauge it was known in cortain quarters that a roverened gentloman of this city was intorestod in 100.000 bushels of oats which he purohased in Chicago, somowhero around 22 c or 23 c . the markot thon boing threo or four conts against him, and it was generally supposod that ho closed the deal shortly aftorwards and mado his loss. Nothing more, howover, was heard of it until a few days ago. when the rumor was started trat ho was still carrying his oats. If such bo the case, thoso oats are getting protty wild on the down turn, as they have already reachod 15 c .
There was a wealior feeling in the market for oatmeal at Montreal on July 9 and prices declined 5 to 10 c per barrol. Rolled oats in car lots sold at $\$ 2.60$ per barrel, and at 82.25 por bag.

At Montreal on July 9 flour prices declined. Sales of winter patents were noted at $\$ 3.70$ to $\$ 3.90$, and spring at $\$ 3.60$ to $\$ 3.75$, while straight roller sold at $\$ 5.50$ to $\$ 3.60$.
R P Koblin, D. W. Cummings and James A. Mitchell, all Winnipeg grain man havo returned from the Kootenay country British Columbia, where they havo beon interested in mining properties.

## Grocery Trade Notes.

Currants, according to latost cables from Greece, rere quoted at 83 Gd for prompt shipment, which is an advance of 3d on tho last cablo quotation.

A tolerram received from Vancouver instructs agents to withdraw quotations on Fraser River salmon. The tolegram is supprsed to have beon sont because of tho rise in the Frasor, which makes salmon fishing difficult for the present.

A Bordeaux letter states that Fronch peas packers will not be able to fill thoir orders in full, and decline to accopt further orders.

Molassos are decidedly firmer, says a Montreal report, and the advances at tho Islands $n$-ted a week ago have been woll maintained. Several large carroes of Barbadoes molasees have lately arrived, two vesels arriving up on Wednesday. Offerings are now mado at sbout $28 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{c}$ to 29 k c in round lots. Syrups aro quist but steady.

## Dairy Trade Notes.

At Woodstock, Ont., on July $S$ at the cheese board 16 factories offered 3,05 boxes cheese. Sales- 840 at $618-16 \mathrm{c}, 1,010$ at 67 c . Bidding brisk, but salesmen are holding for higher prices sidec the pasture is drying.
At Brantford, Ont. on July 10, 14 factories offored 3.260 boxes Juno make. Sales- 950 at 618-16c. Soveu 'uyors present.

At London, Ont.: on July 11, 3i factorics bearded 5.500 boxcs June. Salns- 510 boxes at $6 \mathrm{gc}, 605$ at $6 \mathrm{i} \mathrm{c}, 1,235$ at $613-1 \mathrm{cc}$. Tho at tendanco was fair and the bidding brisk.

## DRTELOPMENT UR THR WEST.

The Commorcial has once or twice Iately montioned incidentally tho unpopularity of the Liboral party in the West. Previous to the recent goneral olection, the West has roturnod practically a sulid governmentsupport. The Liberal party in Nanitoba never succoedud in olccting mors than ono member representivg that party, whilo in British Columbia and the Territorics the solid consorvative support remaiued unbrokon. Eren when the anti-railway monopoly agitation was at its huight and thore was much dissatisfaction with the government, the Liberals were unable to make any hoadway in the West.

Tho reason for this situation has beon mainly twe fold. First it has been urged that as the West was a now region, requiring exponditures of governmont money to aid in its dovelopment, it would bo wise to support the party in power. The second and principle reason for the solid support which the West has always given the Conservative party hao been the belief so prevalent herv that the Liberals, as a party, did not appreciate the palue of the West aud wors oppored to iscurring exponditures for the development of the country.

As for the first reason given, that it was necessary to support the party in power in order to secure votos of inoney for public works, the history of the West during recent years does not show the correctness of this theory. It is true that the Cunservative party carried through tho Canadian Pacific Railway bili, but having done this they seomed to think they wero entitled to rest upon their laurels; and although tho West has for the past fifteon or sixteen ycars stood solidly by the goveruing party, the policy of the government so far as the development of the West is concerued, has been oxceedingly unsatisfectory. Nut a singlo important public work has beon undertaken in the West, such for instancoas the improvement of our waterways, and the aid to railways has principally beon in the direction of grants of public lands, which lands, The Commercial has herctofore conttended, shouldbe held for sottlomont, and not be dissipated in this way.

As for the second contention, that the Liberals were not alive to the value of the West and wero opposed to incurring espenditure for tho devolopment of the West, it is not worth while endeavoring at the present timo to argue either for or against this bolief. The Liberals no doubt mado mistakes in regard to tho Weat when thiy were in power, bat it is so long siuco they bave had in opportunity of showing what they would do, as a governing body, that their past record may bo regarded asa matter of ancient history. At any rate, the governing farty has nothing to boast of us regards its policy toward tho West during recout years, and it is doubtful if the Liberals would havo mado any less satisfactory rocord, if they had bean
in power. To a gront oxtent the iden that the Liberals were opposed to Western interests has no doubt beon vastly overdone here. It has beon roportod so frequently that it hav come to be accopted by many as a matter of course. The Commercial believes that thero aro many leading noen among the liberals who fully appreciate the value of the West, and who aro fully alivo to the dessrability of seekia.g to open out and develop tho country.
Though the Consorvative giveruments of lato years have been rathe iaactive in their poliey regarding the West, the now Tupper governrient made very extersivo promisoa, during tho recont political campaign, as to what would bo dono in the intriests of the West. Some of the enterprises which wese promised were the following: The coustruction of the proposed S:. Audrew's locks on the Red river ; tho bulding oi the lludson Bay Railway; the completion of the Manitoba and Northwestorn Railway; a zailway through the Crow's Neat Pass; the establish. ment of government creameites throughout tho Territories, otc. This is a protty extensive bill of fare, but as they camo as eloction promises, they are perhaps not entitled to as much woight as if they had been made at any other time. No doubt had the Tupper government been maintained in power, an effort would have been mado to have carried out at least some of the pronists. As it is, they have now gono by the board.

The now Liberal government will not bo committed to anything definito regarding public enterprise in the Wost, as no promises were made by the party during the elections. Neither do we expect tho Liberal government to at once enter ufon a policy of extensive expendituro in order to dovelop the West. Tho party is on the cther hand pledged to a policy or rotrechment and cconomy. At the sametime Tho Commercial would take the liberty of pointing out that there aro many enterprises in the West which scriously domand the attontion of tho new government. Furthermore, the West is justly eutitled to more hiberal traa:ment from the government of Cayacia, in the way of develcpment work, than it has icceived for sumo sears past. All the enterprises promised liy the Tupper government aro worthy ones, with possibly the exception of the government creameries. (The Commercial dees not endorse the pinciple of government compotition in the dairy trado.) It would perhaps be too much to expect the new government to take up all theso matters at once, but they aro all worthy of sorious consideration. 'The vait watorwass of the West aro capablo of great dovelupment by a yery moderateerpendituro. It is not too much to say that our W'estern waterways have beon groviously negiceted by the federal governmont, and their valuo as a means of aiding in the derelomment of the coultig has bren gross) y overlowked.
Tho Liberals now have their opportunity. By the futuro and not by the past should they be judged. If their has been a prejudice against them in tho West in the past, perhaps an uurcascnable prejudico, they now havo an opportunity of proving it so. Whilo we do not look for a polioy of extravaganterpenditure, wo do expect that tho now governmout will at onco enter upors an active and
ot:orgotic policy to secure the sottlemont and development of the Wost, belioving that such a poliey will provo to tho advantage not only of tho West alone but of tho nation at large.

## THE COMING CONTESS.

The rault of tho Domocratic national convention at Chicago shows that the coming conkst (or rather wo may say tho contast now ontered upon) in the United States will be a staaight fight on tho moncy question. Tho lumublican platform propared by tho recont convontion at st. Louis, declares straight for gold. 'The Democratic pletform, now announcod, is a straight declaration in favor of the freo and unlimitod coinago of sil wer it the ratio of 16 to 1 .
At was expected from provious forecasts, the - iver men carried the Domocratic convention by a large majority, the platiorm as roported by the committeo having beon adopted by a vots of 626, to 803 against. The question is now, what will tho sound monis Dsmocrats, who formed about onethird of the couvention do? It has already been announced that another Dinocratic convention will be hold, by the sound mouoy section of tho party, to promulgate a platform and nominate a candiato for tho presidency, but it remains to bo scon what will be the outcome of such a movensunt.
At any rate, the situation shows that the great Dumocratic party of the United States is in a stato of domoralization, and wo may say, utter hopslossuess on tho ove of a presidental election. Tho Republicans were comparatively solid for their platiorm, only a small minority of silver mon having opposed the adoption of the platiform. The Republican silvar mon will no doubt go over in a body to the silver section of the Damocratic party, now that the lattor havo triumphed, and nominatod thoir candidato for the presidoncy. It is also expseted that the Populist party will support the Democratic silver party, thus combining the silvar men of both partios and the Pupulists, undor Bryau, the presidential nomince of the Chicago Dumocraric convention. Whether the sound money Democrats will unite with the hepublicans, or put up a fight of their own with a third candidato in the fiold, remains to be seen. It was at first supposod that this would bo the plan followed but the movement to hold another convention, with the avowed purpose of nominating a sound money Damleratic candidate, complicatest ho situation somewhat.
No mattor which courso may bo adopted, the Domocratic party at the resont time seems to bo in desperate straits. A great mavy of tho most influcatial journalists of the party utterly repudiate the platform monulgated at the recert Cbicago convention, and tho best men of tho party, including Prosident Claveland and prosumably his exccutive, aro thoroughly opposed to freo sitver coinage. The majority of the rank and filo of the party, hoviover, has boon carried away by tho freo silver craze, and this section seems determined upon carrying out their programme regardless of cunsoquences. There zeems to havo beon littlo attemp to compromiso the situation, at the Chicago couvention. The silver men were
in the majority and thoy ignored the sound monoy men. ludocd, compromise was out of the question, as thero could be no rational ground for compromizo batween tho support ors of an ho nest curroncy and thoso who practically demanded ropudiation

What the outcome of the situatian will $\mathrm{lo}_{\mathrm{o}}$, it is ditlieult to cell. The tonc of the eastern I'nited stafor jrnsat atems to isdicato a cubr plote confidenco that honost money will win. But in spito of this confidenco, sud in epito of the aplit in the Denucracy, the situation is certainly ono of great dat gor. The silvor agitation has spreal with wonderfal rapidity of late, and combined with the Populists and the silver Republicans, caudidate Bryan and his party may pat up a very strong fight. They have in their favor hard times and low prices The great depression in the pricas of agricultural products will bo nu immanse factor in their favor. 'The people are dis. satisfied and they will bo ready to try the now policy, which is pat forth as a panacen lor low prices and hard times. Tho times, therefore, seem favorable to the silverites, and nil their talk about making monoy abundant and cheap will not be lost upon the mass of comparatively illiterate voters of the West and South.
The fight will bo a sectional one to a great extont, with the Suuth aud West arrayed ggainst the East. Somo profes3 to seo in this situation clements which threator the oxistonce of the Uuion, and there aro prophecies of open rupture and civil war botw on the Fast and West. I'his, however, is no doubt an overdrawn picture of the dangers of the situation. The possibility of a debasod curreucy and proctical repudiation is bad onough, without conjuring up thoughts of civil war.

In olden days faction. wars were of frepiont occurronce, often growing out of disputed rights to the throne, or other eminent positions. It has been prophecied that in modorn days wo would have civil wars, growing oui of economic disputes, capital against labor, etc. Still, to undertake to forecast angthing of this nature is evidently taking an extremely pessimistic view of the situation.
We are bound, borever, to have commercially troublesome times ahead until this contest in the United Siates is over. The commercial situation will bo nervous nud unsottled, and we see little hopo for a revival of busines until the elretions aro uver, confidence in the permanency of the situa. cion. the first requisite to basiness presprity, being absolutely lacking.

## the IzPerial bank.

A cendonsed report of the praceediugs of the recent annual meoting of the Imporial Bank of Canada will bo found on another page of The Commercial this weok. The report of this bank is particularly intereating to western people, owing to the entorpriso of the bank in so largeiy extonding its operations in the West. The Imperial bank has for many jears been formost in the $W$ est, and it has branches all over the country from Winnipeg to the coast, leadiny all other banking institutions in the number of its wastern branches. Tho Winvipeg branch,
which has been for 30 many yoars continuonsly undor the management of Mr. C. S. Hoato, is ono of tho of lest financial institutions of this cuuntry.

The annual report in question shuws that tho Imperial Bank contiuued th do a profit. ablo business for tho past banting year, the profits being hearly equal is the provious year, which is R gend shuwing the viow of the close times and gnomal rednction of bank profits. Tho ficancial situation spoales for itsolf and whow the favorable standing of the bank. ia adilition to the regular dividonds, a bonus was paid to the stocisholfors last year, and $n$ g will balace of profit wis carriod forward.

## E.ITORIAL NOTES.

One of the principal leatures of intorest in the recently publi-hed annual report of the Hudsou's Bisy Co.. is that in reference to landsales. Tho land sales for tho sear ended March 81 last, wero moro than duuble thoso of tho provious sear, boing 9,299 acres, as compared with 4.48 acres for tho year onded March 31, 1895. This shows a very gratifying increase in the sales of farm lands. There was also a moderate increaso realized in the price por acro of the lands sold. The receipts of interest and principal on account of lands provinusly sold also showed a large increaso last year, as compared with the proviou business ycar.

A Provincial. exchange says that a stubble burner, built on the principle of a firo break burner, which is intonded to remove the heavy stubble from fields, to mako plough ing more easily poriormed, is being constructed by l'remier Greenway. About e gear ago The Comencrial reforrat to tho great value of fire as a destroyor of the soeds of weeds. We stated that if some machino could be devised for the burning over of stubble or weedy land, it could le mude of immenso advantage to the country, in destroying the seeds of nusioas wceds. Possibly Promier Green viay's machine will be found to answer the furpose. If the machine will do tho work well, and not cost tos much, it would be a valuable thing on evory farm, and particularly weed farms.

TuF result of a general eloction in the largo towns aud citios of the country is usunily taken as expressive of the opanions of the poople regarding the commercial policy of the goverament. If the result of the recont olections can be taken as a guido in this lespect, it would incicate that the great manufacturing and commercial interests were not alarmed over tho prospect of a change in the government of the country. It is interesting to note that in tho dozinn chiof cities of Canada, the Cunservatives lost 13 seats and gainod only Wiunipeg. In two other citıos, London, O.At., and Victoria, B.C., they held their own. Iiberals mado gains in Montreal, Toronto, IIamilton, Oitana, Halifax, St. Johns, (2 rebec. Kingston and Vancouver.

Ir is to bo hoped that the necessity for strcet improvements in Wianipeg will not be
(verlooknd now that tho soason for bad road ${ }^{\text {d }}$ is past. During tho long spell of practically impasable sureots last spring, overy ono was talking of tho urgsnt need of atreet improvements, and soveral plans woro then proposed for doing the wook. Now that the ronds aro fairly good again, very littlo is heard about the strects. Tho real nead, however, is just as urgont nuw as it was a short tumo ago, when the streets woro hub deop with mud, and though wo may nut soon have as long a sosson of wet weather as that rocontly passod through, thero is no knowing what may happen. At any rato, it is timo Winnipeg had something batter than mud roads on sc many streots. Even when the roads aro dry, the streots upon which tho eleotrio cars run are in a dangarous condition, wharo tho track is laid on a mud road. Those atroots aro simply diagraceful, with tho track atioking away up above the street. rondoring it at best, risky to cross tho track with a vehicle, A general scheme for street improvements is cestainly needed in Winnipeg, and where tho street railway track has beon laid on a mud road, there is special urgencs for paving the streots.

Ir is not ploasant reading the virulent porsonal attacks appearing in a portion of tho Liboral press against Sir Charles Tupper and other leading public mon. The lato promier, since his return to Canada, has failon in for an unlimitod sharo of personal attacki. It seenis part of the business of the political press to abuse the prominent men of the opposite party, but in the opiaion of The Commercial, much of this stylo of party warfara could be dropped to advantago. As for Sir Charles Tupper, he is undoubtedly an able, vigorous, and wo may say fearloss man, and moreover a man who has worked hard for and accomphashod much in the interest of his country. No one can charge him with lack of patrotism for, or lack of faith in his country. Indeod, he has bson ridiculod fcr suaking somewhat ostravagant predictions regarding the future of his country. Sir Cbarles Tupper no doubt has his faults, and he has his enemies, but he also has his virtues. Why look at his failings now, and leave his virtues for recognition after he is no longer with ux? Now that the heat of the recent contest is over, cannot a. Liberal paper be found which will show any charity for the Conservative lesder, and recosnize in him what he really is, na rible, vigorous, patriotic and enthusiastic Canadian, who has long served his country with ability and onergy, and who has always shown tho greatest faith in its future. The Commercial does not believe in some of the principles so vigowlisly advanced by the lato promier, but we are none the less ready to recognizo his ability ant the service ho has been, during many years, to his country.

Ir solnnos somowhat humiliating to progressivo Canadians to read in the pross about the bickerings rogarding appointments to the new federal cabinot. According to pross reports, thero seams to have boen some wire-pulling as to who should represent the Irish Catholies in tho new government. Why ghould tho Irish Catholies or the Scotch

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Protastants or tho Orangomon or any other oliqua, olass or areod be represonted in the governmont? Govornmont on theso prinoiples has continuod too long in Canada, and it is timo this kind of thing should bo droppod. Canadinn oitizonship, combinod with propor qualifications for the position, should bo tho requiremonts for a rosition in tho governmont. Aro not these pooplo all citizons of the country? And is not the govornment for the whole couatry? Why then should there bo any necessity for the roprosontation of those various interosts in the government? The attumpt to carry on the governmont of tho country in tho past on those lines led to tho furcing of impropor porsons into the cabinot. The quastion has been not so much the ability and fitness of the candidato for a cabinet position, but the influence ho would have with his sect, creed, clique or society. As the population of the country increases, and particularly when the West attaing more power in the councils of the land, this seutional principle c' gor-rnmont will not bo so evident. Ia the miantime, it will not do any harm to entor a protast, as occasion may ariso, against the system.

A littile broeze has arizou botween the Provincial health board and the Winnipes city healch authorities, which has led to charges of noglect or inefficienoy against the lattor, groning out of the recont increese of infectious diseasozamong childron principalls, in the city. There certainly seems to be neglect somewhere regarding the handling of some cases of this nature. Ot course it is not to be expected that these diseases can bo entirely proventod; but there would certsinly bo fewer cases if greater care were exercisod in isolativg patiouts and in quarantiniug and disiufecting residences where diseases had occurred. It is a common repurt that houser wherescarlet fover, weasles or diphtheria have broken out are sometimes not even placarded. The Commercial was infurmed the other day that ons house where three cases of diphtheria in succession had cccurred, had not been placarded. If the citizens would co-operate with the bealth authorities, these diseases could be kept in check much better than they are. Many people, however, scem to try as much as possible to evade the regulstions. 'They object to have their houses placarded, and do not try to isolato patients. Tnrough the selfishnees or ignorance of parerts or guardians, convalescing children are allowed out on the streets, or are evon taken out on the tram cars or to public places. Action of this sort is simply criminal. Much responsibility rests with medical mon. It is not an uncommen complaint to hear it stated that the doctor in attendance neglected to give careful instructions as to isolation, etc. In some cases they have oven rathor made light of the danger of cuntagion. While the health authorities may have been lax in in some cases, it is also evident that the citizens at large are much to blame for their falure to co-vperate with the authorities. Should thene not be punishment for those who expose others to danger, by allowing parsons who may carry infoction, to go into public places?

## The Live Stook Trade.

A train load of stockor cattle, Joarlings and two yoars old, arrived at Winnipeg from Ontario and was sent on west, this week. There wero 580 head in tho lot, and thoy woro a fino class of animals. Thoy woro brought up by a sindicsto of local doalors for westorn ranchors. Tho low price of beof cattle lataly, it is thought, may discourage the ranchers from'making heavy purchases of stockor cattlo this year.
Mr. Bond, Winnipeg. had in a car of sheop Irom Whitewood this week.
At Liverpool on July 18 the weaknoss in cattlo continued aud prices mode anothor decline of $\frac{1}{2}$ to 10 por 1 lb ., which makas a drop of 1 to 20 in the last two weeks. The supplies wero heavy, and with very warm weather trade was bad. Beat light States ard Canadians sold at 8 to 9 c , aud heavs cattle were almost unsaleable. The market for sheop, however, was firmor and tho inside figuro showod an advanco of as compared with last wook, ohoice stock solling at $11 \frac{1}{2}$ to 12 c .
At the Montreal Stook yards at Point St Charles, on July 13, the recoipts of cattlo were large. Thedemand for caitle from local buy. ors was limited, owing to vory warm weather. Tho demand for export stock was limited and unly a fow salps were mado, and prices wero lower. Export cattlo sold at 时 to 83 , and butchers' stock at 2 to 8 c per 1 b . Hive weight The weak feeling in the market ior live hogs continued and prices declined 15 to 20 o per 100 lbs, and 8 to was the outside figure for choico lots, and as low as 8 c was accepted for $011 l$. At the East End Abattoir Murket a fow vers choice stears and hoifers sold at 34 to 8 do, and other sales wers made at prices ranging from 2 to 8 c par 1 lb . live weight. Sheep slow sale and prices easier at $2 \xi t \mathrm{to} 3 \mathrm{c}$ ror lb. T. demand for lambs was good and prices were firm at $\$ 2$ to $\$ 9.50$ each.
The order for the equipment of the first, "fify cars for the transport of cattle with the "Weating hoase air brake" has just been completed in the Canadian Pacific Railway car shops in Winnipeg, and hercafter cattlo thains will be equipphd with this improvement.

The Loudon market for bars has been steady at $81 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{c}$. per ounce, and the commercial quotations for silver here were flrm at 687c to $69 \frac{12}{}$ at the close of the weeh, when 69 to oysic wre quuted. ## TRE BDSLNESS SITUATOM.

Winnipea, Saturday, July 18, 1897.
There aro some improvements and some unfavorablo features this week. Wheat, conn and oats, particularly the latter, his vo been glrougor in leading markets this week, imparting a slightly bottor fooling hero, but soveral unfavorable orop reports have como in from the esstorn and southern districts of Manitoba, where rust is causinggroat damage in somesections to the wheat crop. Dairy products aro steady. The exportation of cattle wa.s resumed this weok, grain ied cattl on the westerth ranges boing now fit to ship. Prices, howevor, aro very discouraging, foreign markets baing very low. Bank clearings at Winnipag this week show an increase of 90 per cont. over the corresponding weok of 1895 , and about 51 por cent. over tho like week of 1891.

Failurex for the weok havo bean 269 in the Uaived Statos, against 256 last year, and 35 in Canada, ggaiust 39 last year. Money at New York yosterday was quoted at 2 to $2 \frac{1}{3}$ por cont on call; morcantilo paper 4 to $\overline{-1} \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{c}$ per cont. Bar silver, 6Sifc. Bradstreots says of the situation in the United States. Tho iron and steel industry is less satisfactory than a weok ago, with increased competition and furtber sacrifices in prices. The like unfavorable condition continues in the woolen and cotton goods industries aud mauufacturing liaes generally. Wool sales continuo oxtremely siow. Unsatisfactory roports coutinue with referenco to lumber. Among more favorablo features are improvements in quotations for wheat, corn, cats aud pork and firm or unchanged pricos for wool, sugar, lumber, loather, and print cluths.

Wheat - General. Situation - United Statos grain markots have beon firmor this week, advances having becu made on wheat, corn and oats. The leading influences have boen firtaur European markets, better export domand from tho Atlautic cuast, some unfavorablo roports from threching roturns of winter wheat in the southwest, and rust in the northwestern spring whent region. A weak featuro was an increase in the visiblosupply, the first for sometimn. Exports of wheat. flour includot, from both coas s of the Uuited States and Montreal, this week, amount to $2,963,000$ bushels, against $2,167,000$ bushels last week; 1,052030 bu-hels in tho c rresponding weok last year; 1873,000 bushels in the second week of July, 1891, and as compared with $5,007,000$ bushels in the corresponding week of 1893.
Wheat - Local. Situation - The improvement in the geucral situation of wheat caused a better feoling locally, but the marbet was not active. A littlo better prices, however, wero obtained. There wero sales Thursday and sesterday at 57 c for No. 1 hard, afloat Fort William. and possibly is shado better yesterday. Nr. 2 hard was guotol at 5 Jc aud No. 8 hard at 52 to 52 jc . Reccipts uf whent at Fort William last week wero $381,82!$ bushels, shipments 129,819 bushels, in store $2,108,625$ bushels. While many favorabio crop reports cume in from somo districts, some very unfavorable reports have come in, priscipally from the eastern and southern portious of Manituba weicre the excessive rains and receut hot weather appear to have injured the crop. A lot of samples of wheat in straw shown at the exchange this week, were all more or less affocted with rust. the roots had no dopth, and the heads were thin avd short. ## Froight Rates and Trafflo Mattors.

Tho Montroal Trado Bullotin of July 10, says: Large ongagements of grain have been mado during tho week. For Liverpool is 9d has been accopted, but has sinco beon rofused, by vessel men, who now ask 2 s . London space has been socured at 2 ; 3 d , and Gilagigow freights havo beon takon at 2s. A large quantity has beon booked for Bristol at 2s 6if. These prices are a fair indication of the market, Which is firm and likely to romain so. Grain to Hamburg has been engaged at 2s Gd nud sack flour ${ }^{ \pm} \pm 183$ 9d. Sack flour $t$, Iondon $11 \mathrm{~s} \mathrm{8d}$ to 12 s 6 d ; to hiverpool, 8s to 10 s ; and Glaggow, 10s. Provisions 103 to 22s Gd Liverpool, and $12 s$ Gd to 153 Losidon and Glasgow. Cattle freights 403 to 403 as to port. Chseso and butter freights 203 liverpool and London, 253 Glasgow, and $25 s$ Bristol. Some heavy ongagemeuts nave also ben mado in inland freight, about 250,000 bushels of wheat having been takon at Duluth fur Montreal at Gc, and other engagements from Fort William at 6c. The through freight on corn and wheat from Chicago to Montroal is quoted at 49 c to 5 c .
R. P. Mithet \& Co., of Victoria, B.C., in their last munthly roport say: "A light sunply of tonnage on the spot and to arrive in the noar future has maintained firmnoss in graiu froights. The groater part of tho enfegements have naturally been for new crop loading at rates ranging from 27 s 0 d to Cork for orders less 1 s 3 d direct, up to 303 net. At the close however lower fi ;ures havo been accopted. Lumber freights have been steady, with a good all round demand, ss shown by the fair-sized list of charters. There is nothing of interest to report with regard to the Salmon flect."

## British Columbia Busingss Bgriam.

Vancouver, July 14, 1896.
The wholesalo business showed some improvement lest week, although money is not vory easy and old collections aro very hard to make, porhapsowing in a measure to the fact that su much money has been taken out of circulation in tho nicreautile conters for the purpuse of bonding mines, otc. Thero are a good many changes in the market this week. Cured meats slicw an upward tendoncy and have advanced one-qi arter of a cont at this writing. Butter is easier and will go still lower. There are now some four or five creameries in operation in tho province and this has made a decided difference with the Manitoba import, uhich does not meet with such a ready sale as furmerly. The local creamery is selling for a cent a pound more than the imported articlo. All grades of sugar havo fallen one-eighth of a cont. It is said in this councction that the Vancouver Sugar kefinery are prepared to tako all the sugar that cau bo carried by the CanadianAustralian steamers from Brisbane as long as the present tariff continues and provided the stoamers mako Brisbano a port of call. The flour market appears unsettled, owing to rival firms pushing business in tho local market, but the quotations given aro said by dealers to givo the best ides of prices. Manitoba should look alive as to her grain trado with Australia. It might be advisablo for largo firms to sond representatives to Australia, judging from tho numerous enquiriesuriving iu Vancouver for British Columbis gruin. Many dealers in Australia ovidentis thank that B.C., and not Mantoba, is tho grain prodaciag country. The fruit market is not by any means overstocked and pricos have ruled high. The rasmania spple arriving aarly is botter that none at all, but is not a favurito ouling to its chippy or woody taste. California apples will como noxt, then tho B.C. apples. All apples sold here aro far inferior to the aastern Canadian apple. Ban-
anas have arrivod in misorable condition in many casos, and as a consequence thoy are still selling as a luxury. Owing to tho unusual heat, strawberrices had a ahort season. Tho B C fruit crop will be light. Vegotables will bo plentiful. The hay crop will be lighter than usual. The damago to crops by the recont freshet has beon vory severe, but not to be compared in tho afgregato to the damago of 1891 . Last wook's catch of salmon was light. Thoy havo now however commenced to run more freoly. Tho contract price for salmon is 25 cents on the Fraser. Two thousand boats are out. Ship. ping is active. Thoro are at present 17 ships in B.C. loading. Both the Oriental and Can. adian-A ustralian lines tonk away all the froight thoy could carry on their outgoing trips, the Miowera of the Australian line being compelled to leave a quantity of froight behind on the wharf. A consignment of lobsters and oysters from Halifax arrived hero on Tuesday. They were shipped alive for the the purpose of transplanting them in B.C. wators. The government steamer Danube has taken them to differont points along the coast and liberated them. A fow million lobster eggs were also plantod.

City Engincar Tracoy of Vancouver, asked to report on the Rossland country in connection with tho establishment of a smelter in Vancouver. In brief Mr. Traoy said that thers were three smolters in Koot. enay, kept running by the Silver King at Nolsun, tho Li Rui at Rossland ard tho Bluo Bello at Kootonay Lake. Judging from indications and the mines already developed, British Columbia, especially IVootonay, will make tho Province tho rich mining producing country in tho world, and owing to its pesition, Vancouver is especially favored to melt tho ores of vast mineral regions. but what is more needed now in Vancouver chan a smeltor is a thoroughly equipped refinery.

Miners are returning from Alaska. Tboy claim that the six milo boom is a faho and that miners scduced into the count: $\bar{F}$, with a $\$ 1.50$ in their pockets, will have to be brought back by the government.

A seam of ceal, seven feot nine inches in thickness, has been discovered on Gabriola Island.

A company with a capital of $\$ 5,000,000$ has beon incorporated in Seattlo to dovelop Cariboo.

Eight more mining compsnies ware incorporated last weok. This capital stock aggregated $\$ 1,000,000$.
Nany worthy British Culumbia citizens are gotivg lucrative positions as managers, accoutants, ctc., of big English mining syndicatos. A large amount of English money is being placed in circulation in British Columbia in consequenco.

Tho Canadian Pacifio Railway land dopartment Winnipeg has startod out inspecturs to cover the different districts and make arraugements with the farmers owing money on lauds, who may wish to do so, to pay the company in wheat at tho rato of 50 c per bushel for any arrcars they may owe.

## British Columbia Salmon Oatlook.

(spectal corresiondence to the COMMERCIAL)
Thore are this year 85 canneries in active operation on the Fraser rivor. Each cannery has an average of 40 sockoyo nots and theso nots aro manipulatod by 2,000 fishormen. There aro some 50 canueries in operation in tho ontire province, employing about 8,000 fighermen. The sockoyo rum commenced on July 1st. The first wook of the ryn was very light. On the second weok it considerably incroased. Usually the first sookeyes caught are small. This season they are all large, indicating that the younger fish have given their ran a t.velve months hoist. For this saason canners havo boen willing to contract with fishormen at 25 cents por fish for the season, believing the run will be small. However, liko politics and horse races no man can size up a salmon run of the future. Last ycar was to have boon a small run and it was the second biggest year in ton yoars. This yoar canners say the run will be light, but the fish of unusual size.

## Nurthwestern Flax Acrajge,

A writer in tho 3linnespolis Martet Record says: On some lines in Southern and Central Minnesota and in South Dakota there appears to be about as largo an incrense of flax this year as last, in a few larger than last, and along other lines a smaller acreage.

I havo not yet made a careful investigation that is sufficiently satisfactory to base reliable figures upon, but in a goneral way I think that Sinnesota has about 350,000 acres into flax, North Dakota probably 275,000 acres, whilo South Dakota may have something like 175,000 acres.

I find that there has been a disposition on the part oi the farmers of South Dakota and in many portious of Suuthern and Contral Minnescta, to go out of flax production to somo extent, but owing to the weather this season there was more or less of wet ground where they were late in soeding and put in a larger acreago of fiax than was intondu! carlier. The same is true to a largerx eut in North Dakota and in Northern Milisesota, where the acreage is largely increased.

The estimates genorally now put the figures at about the same as last yoar, but I boliovo there is an excess over last yoar, owing ts the large increase in tho North.

## The Orodit Systom.

"Sinall profits aud quick returns" is an oxcellent busiunss maxim, and were it to be aloptod universally, and strictly adhered to, there would be more satisfaction among $\dot{j}$ siness men. The mon of Jargo capital suffer equally. if not more-though they may not feel it so keenly-with thoso with a mere limited supply of cash, from the evils which result frum the crodit system. These evils are not confined to the Duminion of Canada, but are equally trying in Great Britain, the Uaited States aud othor countries. Sirong efforts are being made to grapple with and overcome tho evil, which has grown to gigantic proporthons. but these effurts are being neutralized by tho want of cuhesion among those who while thoy realize that something muct be dono, not only to stop its progress, but to reduce its proportions, aro timid about instituting a reform. The effort put forth recently by the Whoiesalo Dry Gouds Assuciation of the Montreal Buard of Trade did not succeed is securing that unanimity of action which it was expected would have attended the effort. That is curtailment of the crodit systom now ruling is necesiary, was universally admitted, but tho best means to accomplish such a rosult was not arrived at. It was thought best that this curtailmentshould bo done quietly by each individual firm. How this will succeed remains to be $s$ gn. The cheapness of credit is one of the groatest dificulties with which business men have to contend. To it are annually due heavy luses which both wholesalo and retail houses aro called upon to sustain. Wers a higher value put upun credit by those within whose proviuce it is to do so, lussos would become less in volume and in uumber and the bonofits resultiag therefrom would accrue equally to buyer and seller, the one would be in a position to pur hase at a lower figuro, and the other, while ablo tu sell at a lower price, would realize a botter profit. The Bradford, Fugland, Obsorver, in dealing with the question of ch ap credit, points out that "It onables a man of no rating whatover to put up a sigu and begin bissiness as a wcol morchant ur top maker. Although it is pe-loctly well uuderstood that he has no capital of his own, he is presently found to be buying thousands of balcs at the London sales, and solling tops in lots of six or seven hundred packs at a time. Whether he is financed directly by a lug firm in tho trado, or indiroctly through a bauk, the peculiarity of his position reuders it necusary that he should do business; he caunot stand aside aud wait the turn of the market, but must realize beforo the next sales begin or he is cornered. In a falling market he very likely hesitatos at first to sell at a loos, and waits until he can hold no longer, aud tion comes in, 'cuts' pricos, and utterly demuralizes the market." In the United States o movoment is now on foct to form a

National I azociation of crodit mon, having ior its ohy $\cdots$.t, the bettor protection of credits, the reduction of losses ?rom bad deb's, the provention of fraid and inj istice 6, erofitors, the prosorution and penishmont of fraud, the roformation and improvement of the collection laws, and imprivement of the commercial reporting systom, the improvomunt of the present methenls of handling bankrupt estites. The movement has recently takon defiuito shape, and a national convontion of crodit men is to convene at Toledo, on June 23rd, 24th and 25th. Would it not be well ts agitate a similar movoment in this country? Steps in that dircction might bo taken at the convention to be held at Otcawa shortly to form a Duminiun 13 ard of Trado, when tho busines" men attonding there as delegates might informally meet and discuss the question, either before of after the menting of the Dominion Board of Trade convention. Thero is no doubs that tie National Policy is largely responsible for the growth and extent of the credit system. The manufarturers' losses are large, and their profits must be immenso to enable them to stand them. With a ruduction of the crodit system, their saies would probably be smeller, bat thoir lusses would be diminished and thoir proSts increased, whilo the roduction in prices which such a saving would securo, would roduce to some extent the burdens which tho consumers are called upon to bear as a, result of maintaining that policy.-Shareholder, Montreal.

## Area and Population of Japan.

According to a Japanese Journal, "in the year 1720 tho population numberored $26,065,-$ 422 ; in $1815,25,622,000$; in $1880,35,929,-$ 000 ; in 1885, $37,869,000$, and in 1893-91, although the ezact figures are not known, it may be inferred from the rate of increase during tho preceding two decades that tho population of Japan at the end of the year 1894 could not have been much less than 42,000.000 . As Formosa has been nowly added to the Japaneso corritory by tho treaty of pace, and incre than $3,0,0,000$ perple in Eurmosa havo, in conseqnace, bocome Japanose subjects, the present population of the country is piobably more than $15,000,000$. The area of the new torritory being 2,532 square ri (s quare ri equals $\overline{5} .9$ square miles), the total area of the country, which was before the war 21,791 square ri, is now $27,32^{\prime \prime}$ squareri. Japan in the extent of her territory compared with European countrics, stands iow next to Spain, being about equal to Swedon. She is largor than Great Britain and Iieland by 6.933 suare ri, and is the eleventh largest countip is the world. Har popination is greater thau that of Franca by $6.600,00 \mathrm{~J}$, but less than that of Germany by $4.416,000$. Compared with Great Britain and Ireland, sho has 7,100,0N0 more people. In population, theroforo, Japan ranks as the fifth power in tho world."

## The Domouratic Platform

Following is tho piatform which the committeo on rosolutions reported to the Chicago Democratic convention:

Wo, the Demuerats of the U'mited States in national cumvention asonibled, do ro afliirm our allg giance to thoso great cosential priuciplas of justice and liburly upna which our institutiuns ano fuunded aud the Democratic party has advocated from Jufferson to our own timo, freedom of speech, fruedom of the press, frocdom of conscience, the prosorvation of porsonal rights, equaisty of all oitizons brfore tho law, and the faithful ubservation of constitutional limitations.

During all theso years the Democratic party has resicted the tendoncy of selfith interests to the contralization of governmontal power, and stoadfastly maintained the integrity of the dual scheme of government established by the founders of this ropublic of ropublics. Under its guidance and teachings the groat principlo of local solf-government has found its best exprossion in the maintenance of the rights of the atates, and this assertion of the necessity of cols...ing the general government to the exarcise of the powers grantod by the constitution of the United States.
Rocoguizing that the money quostion is paramount to all others at this time. we invite attontion to the fact that the foderal constitution names silver and gold together as the money metals of the United States and tho first coinage law passod by congrass under tho constitution mado the silver dollar the unit of value and admitted gold to free coinage at a ratio measured ky the silver dollar unit.

We declare that the ant of 1873 demonotizing silver without the Enowledge or approval of the Amorican people has resulted in the appreciation of gold and a corres. pondiog fall in the prices of commodities produced by the people, a heavy increaso in the birden of taxation, and of all debts public and private; ourichment of the money leading class at homo and abroad; paralysis of iudustry and impoverishment of the people.

We are unalterably opposed to the single gold scandard, which has locked fast tho prosperity of an itidustrious peoplo in tho paralysis of hard times. Gold monometallism is a Bitioh policy founded upon British greed for gain and power, and its goneral udoption has brought other rations iuto financial servitude to London. It is not only un-A merican, but anti-American and it can be fastened upon the United Statos only by the stifiing of that indominable spirit and love of liberty which proclaimed our political indopendence in 1776 and won it in the war of the revolation.

We demand the immediate restoration of the free and unlimited coinage of gold and silver at the present legal ratio of 16 to 1 , without waiting for the aid or consent of aus other nation.

Congress alone $h^{n}$ ns the power to coin and issuo money and this power cannot bo delogated to corporations or individuals. We therefore denounce the issuance of national bank notes as in derogation of the constitution and domand that all papor made legal tender for debts and for the payment of duties to the United Statss shall bo issued by the government of the United States.

We are opposed to the policy and practice of surrenderiog to the holders of the obligati If United States the option reserved by law w the guvernment of redeemingsuch obligation in cither silver coin or gold coin.

We are oposed to the issuing of interest bearing bonds of the United States in time of peace, and condemn thetrafficing with banking syndicates, which, in exchango for bonds and at onormous profit to thomsolves, supply the federal treasury with gold to maintain
the policy of gold monomotallism. Congress alone has powor to coin and issuo money, and I'rasident Jackson declared that this power could not be dolegated to corporations or individuals.

Wo therofuro domand that tho power to issero notus be taken frum the national banks and that all paper moroy shanll bo issued di rectly by the treasury departmont; bo rodoomnbln in coin, receivablo ior all dobts, public and private.

Wo hold that tariff duties should bo lovied suloly for the purpase of rovenuo, such dutios to bo so adj'stod as to opernte equally throughout tho country, and not discriminate betweon class or sectinn. and that taxation should bo limited by the neods of the goversiment, honestly and fairly administerai. We denounce as disturbing to business th.o threat to restore the Mckinloy law, which has been twice condemned by the people in national elections, and which, enacted undor tho false plea of protection to home indusery, provad a prolific broeder of trust, monopolios. enriched the fow at the expense of many, rostricted trado and doprivod the prodiceors of the great A merican staples of access to 1 heir natural markots. Until the noney question is settled, wo are opused to any agitation for furthor changes in our tariff laus, oxcept such as are necesary to make up tho deficit in revenue, caused by the alverse decision of the supreme court on the incom tax.

There would havo been no defict in federal revenue but for the annulment by io suprome court of a law passod by - Lumocratic congress, in strict pursuance of the uniform decisicns of that court for noarly 100 years, that court having sustained constitutional objections to this enactmont which has been ovorruled by the ablest judges who had ever sat on that bench. Wo declaro that it is the duty of congross to use all the constutional power which romains after that docision, or which may come from its roversal by the court as it may horeafter be constituted so that tho burdens of taxation may bo equally and impartially laid, to the end that wealth may bear its proportion of tho expense of the government.

We hold that the most efficient way of protecting A merican labor is to provent the importation of foreign 1 auper labor to competo with it in the home marset, and that the valte of the home markets to our Americau farmors and artisans is greatly reduced by a vicious monetary system which depres ed the price of their products bolow the co-t of froduction and thus deprives them of the means of satisfying their neods.

We denounce the profligate wash of the money wrung from the poople by oppressive taxation and tho lavish appropriations of recont republican congressos, which he-n kept taxes high, while the lasor that pays them is unimployed, and the products of the pooplo's toil are depressed in prico till they no longer repay the cost of pruduction. Wo demand a return to that simplicity and economy which beat befits a Damocratic government, and a reduction in the number of useless offices, the salaries of which drain the substance of the people.

We denounce arbitary isterierence by federal authoritios in local affairs as a violation of the constitution r! the Uhited Staies and a crimo against fr:e institu:ions, and wo especially object to government by injunction, $2 s$ faew ard highly dangerous form of oppression by w ich federal judges, in contempt of laws of states, and tho rights of citizens become at once logislator, judgo and executioner, and wo approve the bill passed at the last session of thu United Statos sonsto and nuw pending in the house, relativo to contompt in federal courts and providing for trials by Jury in cortain cases of contompt.

No discrimination should be indulged by the government of the United Satates in
favor of any of its dobtors. Wo npprove of the rofural of tho fifty-third congress to pass the Pacific railrnad funding bill, and donounces the offurt of the presont Republican congress to onact a similar moasure.
Recognizing the just olaims of deserving Uuion soldiars wo heartily ondorse the rulo of Commissionor Murphy that no namos shall bo arbitrarily dropped from the pension roll and the fact of onlistment and sorvice shoult bo doomed conclusivoovidenco against disoaso and disability boforo onlistmont.

We favor tho admisuien of tho territorios of Now Muxico and Arizenu into tho Union as states, and wo favor the admission of all the torritories having tho nocessary population and resources. to entitle them to statohood, and whilo they remain territorics wo hold that the officials appointed to administer the government of any territory, togother with the District of Columbia and Alaskr, should be bowa fido residonts of the torritory of the district in which their duties are to be performed. Tho Damocratic party belioves in home rule and that all public lands of the United Statos should be appropriated to the ostablishment of free homes for American citizens.

Wo recommend that the territory of Alasta be granted a delegate in congross, and that the general land and timber laws of the United States bo extended to said territory.
We extend our sympathy to the poople of Cuba in cheir heroic struggle for liberty and indepondenco.
We aro opposed to lifo tenured public servico. We favor appointments based upon merit., fixed torms of office, and such an administration of the civil service laws as will afford equal opportunitios to all citizons of accertaining fitness.

We declare it to be the unwritten law of this ropublic, established by custom and usage of 100 years and sanctioned by the examples of tho greatest and wisest of thoso who founded and have maintained our government, that no man should be oligiblo for a third term of the prosidential office.

The feddral government should care for and improve the Mississippi river and othergreat waterways of the epiablic so as to secure for the interior states easy and cheap transporta. tion to tide-water. When any waterway of the republic is of suffisient importance to demand aid of the government. such and scould bo extinded upon a definite plan of continuous work until permanent improvement is $s$ red.

Confio, in tho justice of our cause and the necessity of its success at the polls, we submit the foregoing declaration of principles and purposes to the considerato judesment of the American peoplo. We invite the support of all citizens who approve them, and who desire to have them made effoctive through legislation for the reliat of the people and the restaration of the country's prosperity.

It is in the form of an allegation of fraud mado by manufacturers of the Luyal wheel, of Now York, agaiast th:0 Thorne company of Washington, makets of the Hawthorne wheel, alleg. ing that the lattes jompany is contemplaung an assignment aud meauwhils isselling wheels by auction for an average of $\$ 22.15$, or less than cost. The complaintants aro tho Wesston-Niviuson company. The Thurne company will assert that thers is a good profit in the whee's at the price recsived for the Hawthorne, aud it is said will go into details as to the cost of bicgcle sundries. Wheolmen are much intorested over expected developments,

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## Montreal Grocery Market.

Advices to-day from abroad wero stoadier in tono for the raw article, but prices showed io actual change. The market here for the refined articlo was quiot and witinot. any now feature of nuto. Since the recont doclino in values there bas been some demand for round lets of gravulated, but at prices which refiners would nut ontertain. The indications at presont are that pricos will not go any lowor, providing the speculative olement let up in pounding prices for the raw article, which aro considered to bo extremely luw for this season of the Foar. We quoto: Granulated at 4 fc in 250 barrol lots and over; 4 fc in 100 -barrol lots, and $47^{-3}$ in smallar quantities. Yollows range from 3 te to 3 ga, as to quality, at the factory.

Thore has been no improvement in the domand for syrups, and the market in concoquence has ruled very quiet, with prices unchangod at 1 de to 2 flc por 1b, as to quality at the factory.
The arrivals of Barbadoes molasses this week havo been large, thero being three cargues in 1 ort, with about 3,000 puncheons in all, but this has had no depression on values, owing to tho fact that tho bulk of it was sold to arrivo. In regard to new businass thone has boon very little doing. as bayers now have ample stock to supply thoir costomers' wants, and until such is worked off importers do not anticipato much activity. Round Iots are offering at 28 e to 28 ic, and small quavtities at 30 c to Blc.
As this is the rice season the demand is gonit aud an active busines is diving. In sympathy with strong ard sdvancing prices abroad values here arefirmly hold. Wo quote: -Crystal Japan. $\$ 1.75$ to $\$ 5.00$; standard B., $\$ 3.45$, Patua, $\$ 1.25$ to 85 , Carolina. $\$ 7.50$ to $\$ 75 n$; choico $B$ rmuda, Ss 75, and Java sinds, 81 .

In spicos, business is quiet, the demand boing unly fur small luts tu fill actual ioquirements at stoady prices. The folluwing quutatiuns are what jobbofs can buy at only l'onang black pepper, fic to 7 Ic ; white popper. 10 c to 12 lc ; cloves, 7 jc tu fo, cassia, 8is th 91c, nutmegs, ouc to 90 c , aud Jumaica ginger, 15jc to 18 jc.
Thero has beon no improvement in the coffeo market during tho past week. The demand is sluw and tho feelug eass. Hulders would, no doubt, shado present prices for round lots. Wo quoto Maracaibo at 172c to 18 c ; $\mathrm{H} 10,16$ to 17 ze, Java, 23 c to 25 e , and Mocha, 23c to 26c.

In teas business continues dall, owing to the fact that buyers 'iave amplo supplices on hand, and until such are worted off dealers and importers do not auticipato mush activity. Sume samples of now crop teas continue to arrivo, which are ofliving at a rargo in prices from 15 c to 25 c as to quality, and tho demand fur thess ase even limited - razetto, July 10.

## Grop Roport.

Returns to the Unitod Giatos dopertment of agricalture mako tho following averages of condition: Corn 92 por ccot; winter wheat, 75.6 ; spring wheat, 93.9 ; combined spring aud wistor wheat, 89.4 ; oats, 96.3 ; winter rye, 938 ; spring To 98.6 ; barley, S0.1; tobacco, 91.5, pota ves, 99 ; rice 82.9 ; applos, 61.6; peaches, 51.8. Acroago of potsto , comparad with 1595 1s 33.7, and of tobecco, 93.8 . The report on the acreage of corn, which is preliriniuary, shows 33.7 as comparod with that of 1895, a docroase of 1.3 points. This mates in round figures 81,000 ,000 against $82,000,000$ acres planted last $\overline{\mathrm{j}} \mathrm{ear}$.

Tho avorars of the principal corn statos arc Ohio. 106.7 ; Mrichigan 106 ; Indiana 103; Illinois, 109; Ioma, 97 ; Missouri, 39 ; Bansas,

105; Nobraska, 102; Texas, 83; Tonnesseo, 91; Kontucks, 86.
The average coudition of corn is 92.4 , against 93.9 in July last year. Tho avorages of condition in the principal gtates are as follows: Ohin 106, Michigan 100, Indiana 111, Mhanis 18 , Inwa 91, Missouri 81, Kansas 102, Nebraska ius, Texas, 49, Tennessoe, 90, Kantucky 97.

The connition of wintor wb-t is 75.6 , actainst 77.9 in Juno and 658 last July. The percentages by states are: Now York 78, Pennsplvaris, 70. Kontucky 64 . Ohio 50, Michican 73, Iudiana 66, Illinois 80, Missouri 75., Kansas 75, California 100, Oremon 95, Kansas 75, California 100, Oregon 95, Weshington 100. ## Gold Hining in Rcador.

Tho Pall Mall Gazette, Londun, says "In roports as to the position of tho Playa de Oro Mining Cumpany, it is contended that among the gold-producing countries of the world Ecuador promises in the near futuro to take up a standing in the first rank. The placer cold fields, situated in the province of Esmeraldas, in the northeastorn part of Fcuador, cover an area of 200 square miles, or thereabutis, and consist of huge banke of gold-bearing gravel. This vast tract of auriforous country, it is said, is held in feosimplo by four conpanies. prominent among which is the Playa do Oro Mining Company, which has alreacy expenced coor $\$ 600,000$ on its plant. which is being rapidly pushed on to complotion, and already shipmonts of gold have beon mado by this cumpany of over $1,15 \mathrm{j}$ vuncus frum the nashing dune duriag the progress of development oparations. The threo other cumpanies working in the district are alsu ongaged in activo development, and the Decessary machinery fur the treatmont of the gravel is being erectod. Tho depusits are situated at the foot of tho Andes, and froun their lecation caz be worked ea, nornically, the water porer for hydraulic miling being suppliod by the Santiago river and other largo streams iu the anighborhord of tho pmportie, mhilo the lands aro well timbsed. Another favorable point is the climeto. which boasts of little variztion during the year, and is vary suitable to Europeans. Under the amended Equadorian mining lars, mining properig, mining machinery and the output of tho mines enjoy immunity from any desaription of tasation for a period of twenty-five years from the date of the now law threo or four scars ago. Labor can bo ublaieed both plentifully and choaply, and cable communication mith Now York is beang eatablished by tho Ecuadorian government, whilo negotiations aro in hand with the Pacific Steamship Company for the establishment of a service."
