#### WEIGHTS AND MEASURES.

The unit or standard measure of capacity from which all other measures of capacity, as well for liquids as for dry goods shall be derived, shall be the Imperial gallon, containing ten Dominion standard pounds weight or distilled water.. weighed in air against brass weights, with the water and the air at the temperature of sixty-two degrees of Fahrenheit's thermometer, and with the barometer at thirty inches. The quart shall be one-fourth part of the gallon, and the pint one-eighth. Two gallons shall be a peck, and eight gallons shall be a bushel.

In using a Dominion measure, it shall not be heaped, but shall be stricken with a round stick, straight, and of the same diameter from end to end.

The U. S. standard of measure is the wine for liquids, which contains 231 cubic inches, and the Winchester for drv measure. The Imperial gallon is three per . cent. more, or 277.274 cubic inches.





### DEFINITION OF COMMERCIAL TERMS.

\$ means dollars; @ stands for at or to; lb. for pound, and bbl. for barrel; # for per or by the; % for per cent.

May 1. - Wheat sells at \$1.10 at \$1.20, seller June. Seller June means that the person who sells the wheat has the privilege of dellvering it any time during the month of June.

Selling Short is contracting to deliver a certain amount of grain or stock at a fixed price, within a certain length of time, when the seller has not the stock on hand. It is for the interest of the person selling short to depress the market as much as possible. In order that he may buy and fill his contract at a profit. Hence the "shorts" are called "bears."

the "shorts" are called "bears." Buying Long is to contract to purchase a certain amount of grain or shares of stock at a fixed price, deliverable within a stipulated time, expecting to make profit by the rise of prices. The "longs" are termed "bulls," as it is to their interest to "operate" so as to "toss" the prices upwards as much as possible.

#### BUSINESS LAWS IN BRIEF.

An agreement without consideration is vold. Signatures made with lead pencil are good in law. A receipt for money paid is not legally conclusive. The acts of one partner bind all the others. Contracts made on Sunday cannot be enforced. A contract made with a minor is invalid. Contracts for advertising in Sunday newspapers are invalid. Princi-pals are responsible for the acts of their agents. Agents are not responsible to principals for errors. A note given by a minor is void. It is not necessary to say on a note "for value received." A note drawn on Sunday is void. A note obtained by fraud, or from a person in a state of intoxication, cannot be collected. If a note be lost or stolen, it does not release the maker; he must pay. The indorser of a note is exempt from liability if not served with notice of its dishonor within twenty-four hours of its non-payment.

#### FACTS FOR BUILDERS.

One-fifth more siding and flooring is needed than the number of square feet of surface to be covered on account of the lap in siding and matching of flooring.

A cord of stone, 3 bushels of lime, and one cubic yard of sand, will lay 100 cnbic feet of wall.

Twenty-two cubic feet of stone, when built into the wall, is 1 perch.

Three pecks of lime and four bushels of sand are required to each perch of wall.

There are 20 common bricks to a cubic foot when laid, and 15 common bricks to a foot of 8-inch wall when laid.

Five courses of brick will lay one foot in height on a chimney; 8 bricks in a course will make a flue 4 inches wide and 10 inches long.

Cement 1 bushel, and sand 2 bushels, will cover 3½ square yards 1 inch thick, 4½ square yards 3-4 inch thick, and 6 3-4 square yards 1-2 inch thick. One bushel of cement and one of sand will cover 2 1-4 square yards 1 inch thick, 3 square yards 3-4 inch thick and 4 1-2 square yards 1-2 inch thick.

Two thousand shingles, laid 4 inches to the weather, will cover 200 square feet of roof, and 10 1-2 pounds of fourpenny nails will fasten them on.

Burns and Scalds.—A mixture of one part of carbolic acid to eight parts of olive oil. Lint or linen was are to be saturated in the lotion and second smoothly over the burnt part, which would then be covered with oil silk to exclude air.

Fly Paper—Coat paper with turpentine varnish, and oil it to keep the varnish from drying.
