
HORSE MARKET DEPRESSION.







Bitterly Resent Greeks' Claim to Capture of Stronghold -Question For Diplomats to Decide. .

SALONIKI, Nov. 27 .- (Can. Press.) The Bulgarian seventh division, 0,000 strong, remains in the garrison at Saloniki and encamped in the environs. The Bulgarians insist that no agreement be concluded by the Greeks respecting the retention of Saloniki, which is a matter for diplomacy to de-

They contend that they fought their way into Saloniki, the capitulation of which to the Greeks was arranged with the Turks, it is understood in a manner not at all satisfactory to the Bulgarian officers. The Bulgarians will post sentries along the entire road from Saloniki for several miles to guard against Greek attacks.

The Greeks, who were in a hurry to reach Saloniki, weakened their forces elsewhere in the neighborhood of the enemy. Large contingents of Turks from Monastir, while marching southward, surprised a Greek investment of Sorowitz. The Greeks were routed, the casualties numbering two thousand.





The different disposal plants of the town's sewerage system are nearing completion. No. 2 and No. 3 are now completely roofed in, and all the tanks of No. 1 are roofed in except the four percolating filters, which have to be roofed in yet.

The public library received an addition to its books to the value of \$90, and next week another \$100 worth of books will be added, which will total \$400 worth of new books this year. Already the library room is becoming too small, and one of the first things that North Toronto will ask the city council is to provide more adequate quariers for the library.


