

Winnipeg, Man., July 31.-(Special.)-The oat harvest is pretty general thruout the three provinces. The yield is above the average. Some wheat cutting commenced in Manitoba to-day. Next week it will be quite general.

The weather is very favorable and the yield generally in this province will be up to the average. Early rains were excessive in some sections, and resulted in damage. Some parts of Manitoba to-day are complaining of too much heat, but on the whole the conditions are first-

The most serious feature is absence of farm labor. Thousands of harvest hands are now badly needed. Most of this surplus labor is in railroad construction camps here. High wages are being paid.
