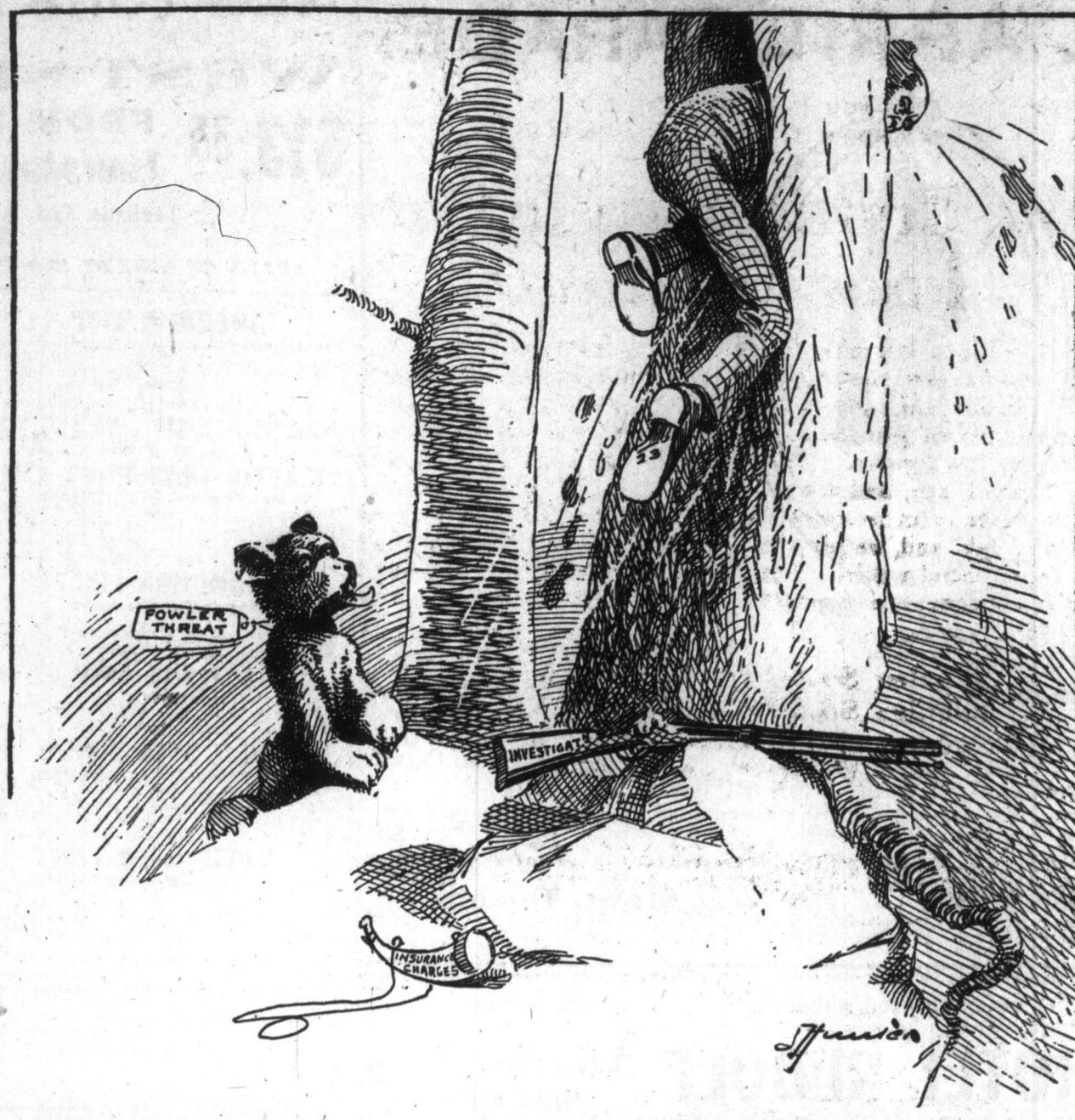

DOMINION ALLIANCE WANT SALE TO HEATHEN RACES PROHIBITED.

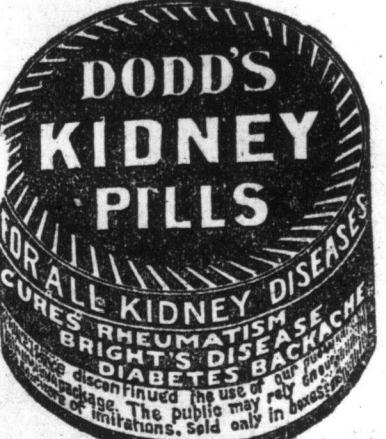

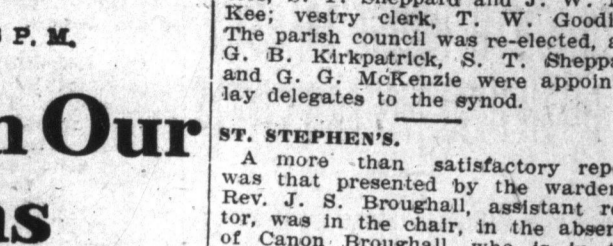
ST. THOMAS.

SOME GREAT CLYDESDALES PARADE AT REGINA SHOW

Mutch of Lumsden Wins in Canadian and R. Taber, an Ontario Co. Boy, Wins in Mare Classes.

Regina, Sask., had a horse show last week, where there congregated as excellent a lot of Clydesdales as have been together at one of the western shows. In fact, we are informed, few Ontario show rings can boast of as good animals. In the class for aged stallions the judges had a difficult time in deciding between Perpetual Motion, owned by Bryce of Arcoia, and Baron's Gem, owned by R. Taber of Condie. In the award Taber got the reserve and also again in the Canadian championship for stallions foaled in 1906. But in the mares, R. Taber practically swept the board, winning with Eva's Gem in the 1904 class and later carried off the Canadian championship with her, Baron's Sunbeam and Hillcrest Princess won in the 1905 and 1906 classes.

This R. Taber, who carried off the Clydesdale honors in this show, in the face of such keen competition, will be remembered as a bright, rustling lad, who wandered about the home of his well-known dad in Whitevale, Dr. Russell Taber, his father, was a well-known medical practitioner in the western part of Pickering Township several years ago. Russell, Jr., betook himself to the west and went in for pure-bred stock. He did wisely and did what many another boy, country-bred or city-bred, ought to do—in advanced agricultural work on the farms where they locate. Messrs. Albert and Walter Major of Whitevale, leading farmers and stockbreeders near Whitevale, are cousins, and it was on their farms that have love of farm stock and work was fed in the mind of R. Taber of Condie, Sask.

The granges, however, average much smaller in membership than those of New York, as Michigan has over 700 subordinate organizations for the 50,000 total members, while New York has 72,000 in about 650 subordinate granges.

P. W. Boynton of Markham gave The Horseman a treat on Saturday. He is decidedly against the practice in vogue with many horsemen of docking the tails.

That good bull—Cyclone—will be sold at Fenelon Falls on Thursday. One big man in Ontario says he is after him, so will overtake him as the bull to own for prize winners.

By burning the garden and orchard rubbish you destroy unseen, but numerous insect enemies. For that reason burning is better than hauling to come out of the way corner.

A Marshall County, Iowa, truck farmer last year had an income of \$2000 from nineteen acres cropped with onions, cucumbers, and cabbage, says The Homestead. When grown and sold, as they may be, intelligently, these products pay.

Lettuce is another plant not easily killed. Most growers plant it in the Southern States. In Iowa and Michigan the seeds of lettuce are much earlier than those raised from spring seedling. This year hints very strongly of the advantage of late fall sowing.

The dry fruit mummies hanging to the trees, especially the plums, have in them the seeds of future trouble for you. They are full of the germs of fungous diseases. For a dime you may be hired to pick and destroy what would otherwise cause you a \$10 loss later.

Get the peas in early. They germinate at a low temperature and a late frost will not hurt them. The sweet peas in the flower garden are no exception to the rule. If the seed is sown as soon as the soil is dry, you will be able to pick bouquets a week or two before your neighbors.

You can hardly get the saddle seed planted too early. It starts quick and young plants are sometimes killed by a late frost. Still, it is such an advantage to get a week's growth with this vegetable that it is wise to take the chances. But have plenty of seed ready so that in case they get nipped you can replant without loss of time.

Several farmers in Ontario are going to experiment with alfalfa this spring. Some are going to grow it with barley sown with every other spout closed. These farmers should be prepared to receive some discouragements the first year, but after experiments on the same field, if well drained, will be as encouraging as otherwise just now.

Seeding of oats is well under way in the Southern States. Iowa and Illinois are beginning to plow. Seeding of wheat will likely go on in a week.

Notice the potato ash in this issue, and it will be well to consider if an application to your potato patch would not be beneficial.

TORONTO HORSE MARKET BOTH HEALTHY AND LIVELY

But the Workers Must Be Healthy, Young and Brisk Movers—Carriage Horses in Demand.

Local dealers report exceptional activity in all classes of horses, by private sale in carriage and saddle horses, and at the auction marts in work horses, drivers and expressers. In fact, the demand was never better for the higher class of horses. A North Toronto firm during the past week shipped two pairs of high-stepping carriage horses to Montreal and one pair to Ottawa, the latter being more than ordinarily stylish. The same firm also shipped several extra good gig horses to different places, as well as a couple of promising saddlers. They have enquiries for several more of these types, but the prices they are compelled to sell at, owing to the difficulties in securing the right kind and the cost of educating and conditioning, are obstacles in the way of instant transactions. As regards draughts and heavy delivery horses, providing they are fresh, sound and young, no trouble is experienced in making sales at good prices, but too many are being sent in that do not fill these requirements and consequently averages do not appear so good as the general tone seems to warrant. Undoubtedly the market is in an unusually healthy state, but at the same time buyers never stood out more for character and quality. If there is the slightest blemish, either there is nothing doing, or it is at the poorest kind of bargain prices. The days when horses were a horse, no matter what kind of an animal he was, are passed, and merchants and delivery men are all looking for an air of superiority as well as soundness, briskness and freshness in their purchases.

Diminutive ponies are the fashionable fad in London just now. A lady recently paid a thousand pounds for an extra small Shetland.

Messrs. Morris & Wellington, Font-hill and Toronto, have just imported two really well-bred Shire colts. One is a 3-year-old bay, known as Bramhope Cardinal, by Duke of York VIII (1731), he by Nym Hitchin Duke out of Scarcliffe Amazon; dam, Bonnie (50437), by The Pope. The other is Golden Par, 2 years, by Rock's Golden Bar (18707), by Rock's Samson, out of Golden Lass; dam, Gladys Queen, by Rock's Commander. Duke of York VIII was leased last year to a syndicate for \$1500 the season.

The Nova Scotia Provincial Exhibition will be held at Halifax on Sept. 25 to Oct. 2, and \$3500 is offered for you. Only the free-for-all, trotters and pacers, \$600 each, are open to all; the balance of the purses are open only to those owned in Canada and Newfoundland.

Illustrating the growth in popularity of racing in New York State, it may be recalled that in 1895 the five per cent. tax on the gross receipts of racing associations was only \$27,229.74; in 1896, it was \$26,698.10; in 1897, \$34,034.61; in 1898, \$80,483.55; in 1899, \$80,791.74; in 1900, \$98,671.53; in 1901, \$128,181.50; in 1902, \$170,065.83; in 1903, \$250,741.67; in 1904, \$190,276.90; in 1905, \$190,714.43; and last year, \$201,053.71.

Buffalo advises says that last week's receipts were the largest of the season. Over 1500 head were offered, a good number being sold at retail at good prices. The auction market in the eastern as well as the local buyers being busy filling orders. Prices ruled steadily with big draught horses selling high. The eastern demand for good horses was never better than at the present time. A full clearance was made. Seven carloads of western horses were among the receipts.

Chicago advises says that with lighter receipts a more active tone characterized the trade on heavy business offerings last week. Finished fed draughts, in particular, were the sellers at the highest level of the season, a number of select lots being negotiated at \$225 to \$350, while the regular commercial offerings cleared at \$175 to \$220. Heavy feeders were also an increased demand by Ohio and Pennsylvania dealers at \$160 to \$210. Light harness classes were also more active with the approval of the driving season, and such consignments found broader outlet at \$150 to \$400. Foreign operators executed liberal orders for export to England and Mexico and in several instances select offerings cleared at higher prices. Small chubs and farm classes were slow sellers at unevenly lower values.

The big speed sale to be held at The Repository, Simcoe-street, on Thursday, starting at 11 a.m., is attracting much attention, and the demand for catalogues has been very extensive. Among the crackerjacks that will be sold without reserve are: Riley B., 2:05 1/4, a pacer; The General, 2:11 1/2 over a half mile track; a trotter; Josie, 2:08 1/4, queen of matinee mares, and Erskine Reed, 2:12 1/4. The best named being sold for no fault, but entirely because his owner has no time to drive him and race him, but he is a sure and splendid mover, either on trot or pace, and with handling, it is believed, will prove the equal of any horse in the country. He is young, sound and in full of get-up-and-go. There are only a few of the flyers that will be found in the catalog, which will prove a hundred strong, including an exceptionally high-class lot of green young horses.

39 CARLOADS AT JUNCTION TRADE BRISK, PRICES FIRM

Sheep, Lambs, Calves and Hogs Unchanged—Quality of Cattle Poor.

Receipts of live stock at the Junction Yards were 39 carloads, composed of 798 cattle, 3 hogs, 4 sheep, 21 calves and 3 horses.

The quality of fat cattle offered, with a very few exceptions, was not good, either in the butcher or export classes. Trade, however, was brisk all round, and when quality is considered, prices were fully 15c to 25c per cwt. higher than one week ago, owing solely to light delivery.

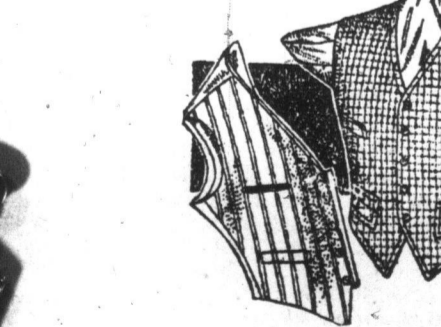

Thirty-two new members were enrolled, making a total membership of 300. The Easter offertory amounted to \$106.

ST. PETERS.

St. Peter's, Bloor and Carlton-street, Sunday school, presented a favorable report. The receipts amounted to \$517, with special contributions of \$191 for the Bodily Window, and \$100 for the mortgage and repairs. A floating debt of about \$2000 was paid off during the year, and it was decided to pay \$500 on the mortgage debt during the ensuing year. The various church organizations were all in a flourishing state. On Easter Sunday the attendance was greater than for 20 years past. Mr. Wilkinson's work was so appreciated that it was decided to increase his salary to \$2500 by the amount of the rent of the rectory, \$300.

ALL SAINTS.

An atmosphere of cheerfulness marked the whole course of the meeting at All Saints' Church, Sherbourne-street. The reports presented were the most satisfactory in the history of the church and in addition Rev. Canon A. H. Baldwin the rector, who has been ill for some time, was able to be present throughout the year. The various church organizations were all in a flourishing state. The receipts for the year were \$4203.35; expenditures, \$3754.77, leaving a lance of \$448.58.

ST. MATTHEW.

The report of the church wardens of the Church of St. Matthew's showed a balance on hand of \$417.49, the expenditure by \$20.21. The mortgage fund for the year amounted to \$565, leaving a balance on hand of \$200. The rectory fund totaled \$312. Satisfactory reports were presented from the various church organizations. The rector, Rev. F. H. Dewey, presided.

CHURCH OF THE ASCENSION.

The Church of the Ascension, West Richmond-street, reports a very successful year. The receipts for all purposes amounted to \$4625.09, and the general account shows a balance of \$140. The communications on Easter Sunday and the envelope subscribers numbered more than in any previous year in the history of the church. During the year a rectory was purchased at \$5000, on which \$1200 has been paid, and a systematic effort will be made to reduce the mortgage principal from year to year. The extra parochial offerings show a marked increase.

ST. BARNABAS, CHESTER.

The rector, Rev. Frank Vipond, presided and reported the year as one with much for which to give thanks. For the last year the statistics showed increases in attendance at Sunday services of 23 per cent, even-mentals 13 per cent, morning and communion 13 per cent. The church is a chapel of ease, (St. Andrew's had drawn slightly from the parish church, but in communications of \$18 per cent. There had been 24 baptisms, 22 candidates presented for confirmation, 10 marriages, and 13 burials. All the organizations were reported to be in a wholesome condition. The church's current account showed a deficit from last year, including \$80 deficit from last year, \$1098.18, leaving a balance of \$88.88.

ST. JOHN'S, NORWAY.

The regular vestry meeting of St. John's Church was largely attended and the reports showed the most encouraging year in the history of the congregation. The rector, Rev. W. L. Baynes-Reed, presided. The report of the finance committee showed the offertory from all sources, \$2871.50, an increase over last year of \$497.43. The sum of \$305.65 was received from missions and \$323.83 from special synod account. The debt on the church was reduced from \$2300 to \$2100. The sum of \$7491.25 was received from

The Church of St. John the Evangelist, Portland-street, held their Easter vestry meeting last night in the schoolroom, with the rector Rev. A. Williams in the chair. The most important feature of the meeting was a request of the rector that, owing to his advancing years, a vicar be appointed. He would consent to remain as rector. Mr. Williams stated that he had consulted the archbishop, who had made his assent if the church would make suitable provision for a vicar. A parishioner proposed that the curate, Rev. 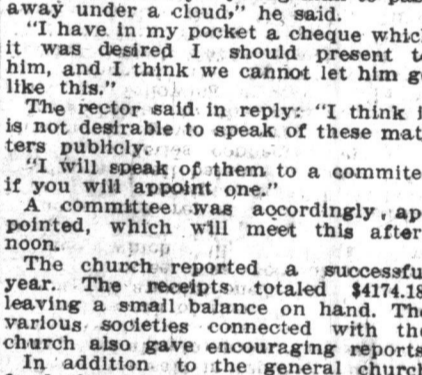

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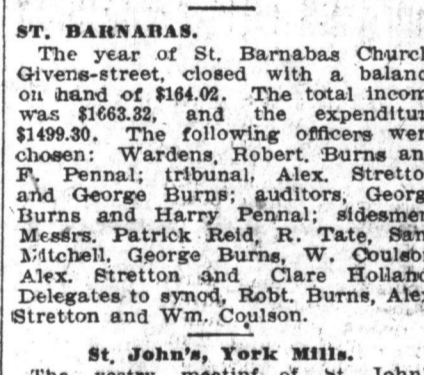
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
