

GREAT SLAUGHTER OF DOGS.

More Than Nine Thousand Cremated at the Bogs' Home in London.

London, April 24.—Up to 6 o'clock on Wednesday night, no fewer than 11,399 dogs had been received at the Dogs' Home at Battersea, from all parts of London, as the result of the muzzling order issued, by the County Council on Feb. 17 last. Of this number 9450 have been destroyed, and the new crematorium at the home has been kept in use all day and a great part of every night, in order to deal with the exceptionally large number of bodies that have been suffocated in the lethal chamber every day, and about an equal number have been cremated daily. A total number of 638 animals have been calamed by their owners and 512 have been sold. The total amount realized from the sale of the animals is £256, an average per do gof 10s. The total amount received in fees from the owners of the dogs that have been claimed is £88. Quite twothirds of the dogs that have been received were fox terriers, and ther have only been a very fw dogs of really good breed. The dally number of animals that are geing taken in is gradually decreasing.



THIS IS A GOOD MOVE.

American Live Stock Sent to Canada for Exhibition Purposes May Retarn to the U.S. Duty Free.

Washington, April 24.—A bill of much interest to Canadian exhibitions and ho. shows passed the House of Representatives to-day and will undoubtedly receive the consent of the Senate and become law shortly. It is a bill which deals with a matter brought to the notice of the Secretary of the Treasury by Mr. S. S. Howland, the well-known horseman and the owner of the Belwood Stud. Mr. Howland desired to send a number of horses over to the Canadian Horse Show held recently at Toronto, and found that on all his foreign bred horses he would have to pay duty a second time on their re-entering the United States. On his representations a bill was drafted with the following clause:

"That whenever any article or articles, or live stock, shall be sent out of the United States for temporary use or exhibition, at any public exposition, fair, or conference, held in a foreign country, such articles shall be entitled to be returned to the United States, under such regulations as may be prescribed by the Secretary of the Treasury, without the payment of customs duty, whether they shall be of domestic or of foreign production."

The bill was introduced by Mr. Adams and passed the House in short order. It removes a disability which has practically prevented American exhibitors from being represented at exhibitions and horse shows in Canada.

McIntyre & Wardwell send the following despatch to their branch office in Toronto: The passage of the supplementary antitrust bill by the New York Senate caused a heavy break in Sugar. The transactions on the decline were very large, block after block being thrown on the market. It is said that the bill gives the Attorney-General power to investigate the affairs of all trusts. It was aimed originally at the coal combination, but seems to strike Sugar, though how it is difficult to see, as the American Sugar Company is a New Jersey corporation. The balance of the list was held in check by the break in Sugar and sympathized with it, but on the whole held well. About 90 per cent. of all the Northern Pacific securities affected by the reorganization have been deposited, and the plan is likely to be the quickest on record. Consols are lower in London, and there is news of a British defeat in South Africa, which is bad for the London market. The close was steady, with the exception of Sugar, which was weak at about the lowest point.
