bune, a post which he held until 1862. During that time he was associated with Horace Greeley, and between them they made the paper the leading organ of the antisavery sentiment. It was the devlopment and organization of that popular sentiment which gave birth to the Republican party and led to the election of Abraham Lincoln in 1860. In 1861 Mr. Dana went to Albany to advocate the cause of Horace Greeley a candidate for the United States Senate. During the first year of the war he had a falling-out with Mr. Greeley over the conduct of the military operations, and this led to his resignation, after fifteen years' service on The Tribune. He was at once employed by Secretary Stanton, who in 1863 appointed Mr. Dana Assistant Secretary for War, which position he held until the surrender of General Lee.

After the war we returned to New York, organized in 1867 the stock company that now owns The Sun, and became editor. He made The Sun, and became editor. He made The Sun a Demecratic paper, independent and outspoken. His criticisms of evil administration during General Grant's term led to an attempt to get him (Dana) out of New York by taking him to Washington for trial on a charge of Mbel, without a jury, in a Police Court. Judge Blatchford declared the proposed trial to be unconstitutional and refused the warrant. He was author of several books, a first-class linguist and a forcible writer, impatient of prolixity and cant. He planned and edited, with George lipty. "The New American Cyclopedia," as well as a life of Ulysses Grant. One of his best-known works is his "Household Rook of Poetry."





The weather map showed very unfavorable conditions in the Northwest, snow or rains being general throughout that section, which will make seeding operations difficult or impossible for some time. In the west, however, rains, which are reported, will have a good effect, as that section has lacked moisture of late. Temperatures in the Northwest were low, ranging from 24 to 38 degrees. Northwest receipts were 1176 cars. against 1084 last week and 733 last year. Exporters at New York took, 408,000 bush of wheat yesterday and 260,000 bush were reported worked at outports, and for to-day 10 loads were reported. Continental markets were reported as strong, and buyers on the advance. We think the situation is becoming daily more buillish, and that no mistake will be made in buying May wheat on all recessions.

Chicago: Wheat—The market gave hope to the bears early by declining ½c below yesterday's final prices, the causes at work being disappointing cables and general rains west and a light speculative interest at the opening. Outside markets relatively weaker than ours, this fact further inducing selling, but effect was very transient. Foreign buying orders were here to a moderate extent, but the important feature of the day's trading was general demand for December wheat, causing premium to widen to 3c over May. It is probable that a good many shorts in December covered to-day and sold in other markets. Brokers identified with bull interests also bought December. Factors at work on long side were liberal clearances for the week, over 6,000,000 bush wheat and flour from both coasts, foreign buying and estimated increased visible supply of less than 1,000,000 bush. Market acts to us as if long interest was well concentrated and without heavier offerings from outside sources, will, we think, sell materially higher.

Corn—Has been influenced by higher wheat and good buying by commission houses, and the buying against weekly puts. We think liquidation about completed, temporarily, and if the weather should turn bad and decrease receipts, we look for better prices.

Provisions—Opened a shade lower, with grain markets, and reacted from same influence. Packers differ very much as to the decrease influence.
