CANADIANS' COLONIAL CUP

Rajah of Kolapore's Imperial Challenge Receptacle Goes to the Mother Country at Bisley.

WITH OUR TEAM IN SECOND PLACE

Four Are in the Final Stage of the King's Prize Match to Be Shot Off To-Day.

Bisley Camp, July 19.—This afternoon the shooting for the Rajah of Kolapore's Imperial Challenge Cup took place, teams of eight men each from the Mother Country, Canada, Germany and Jersey participating.

There were seven shots at each range, and the scores of the Canadian team were as follows:

The Colonial prize, however, in connection with the Kolapore Cup went to the Canadians at the score of 735.

The King's Prize. That all important match, the King's prize, occupied the attention of riflemen and visitors this morning, and the Canadians, of course, kept a watchful eye on their men who had reached the second stage, for this was the day that would decide those eligible to enter the third and final stage to-morrow. The ranges were 600 yards and 800 yards, with ten shots at each distance.

It was first reported that only scores of 92 in the first stage would permit the second stage being reached, but it was later learned that the entrance score was 90, and this allowed Sgt. Gunner Fleming, 179; Sgt. Major McDougall, 178; Lt. John Org, 179, and Sgt. Wilson, 177, have qualified among the hundred men entitled to participate in the final stage of the King's Prize staff for a gold medal. Sgt. Crowe shoots off with 26 others for three places yet to be filled.

The King's silver medal was won by Cyclist Comber of the Surrey Volunteers with a score of 289.

In the Golden Penny match Lt. J. T. Murphy got 10th place, with 20 shillings; Pte. C. W. Spencer, 24th, won 20 shillings; and Pte. W. Masters, 28th, won 20 shillings.

In the St. George's match, first stage, Pte. W. T. Mason, 204th place; Lieut. John Org, 195th place; Col. Sgt. Richardson, 202nd place; Sgt. W. Swaine, 167th place; Sgt. A. Wilson, 233th place, each won £2.

ISTHMIAN CANAL NEUTRALITY. New Treaty Expected to Provide United States Guarantee Alone.

Washington, July 19.—With Great Britain in a conciliatory mood, as declared yesterday by Lord Pauncefoot, British Ambassador, the officials here have high hopes that a treaty which will enable American construction of an isthmian canal will be negotiated in the fall and will receive the approval of the Senate.

It is announced to-day in the State department that Lord Pauncefoot, British Ambassador, who arrived here on his departure he was furnished with a complete statement of what the United States government wanted, and he is now explaining the American government to the British cabinet. The latter will formulate his instructions so that when he arrives in London in October he will be prepared to discuss and to sign a treaty with the government which will provide for the neutrality of the canal, its neutrality to be guaranteed, however, only by the United States, and not by the world.

Help the Inebriate. From the Christian Guardian. I wish to call the attention of the readers of the Christian Guardian to a department of missionary work that, to my mind, has been very neglected, and to which, if Christian men and women would lend their interest, an ample reward might be found in the happy results that almost inevitably follow. There are in most of our cities a large number of men who have come under the yoke of the liquor habit. Such a craving for drink has seized them that they will do anything to get their hands on a drop of the same. No slave ever longed more for freedom than some of these poor fellows. Most people imagine that these unfortunate ones love the liquor habit—just as far from it. They hate it with an intense hatred. Some would give all that they possess to be free of it. They are in chains which bind them—chains of crepuscular as well as habit—seemingly unbreakable, and to despair of which I have known many a man. He had contracted the habit, and he believed it his fate. Not only so, but many of the victims of this habit can do nothing to help themselves. They are in a state of hopeless despair, and many Christian people appear to have the same opinion, or else more practical sympathy and help would be extended to this class in society.
