The robbery of the church was followed by several sensational incidents, in which many of the townsfolk played important parts.

It was 11.15 o'clock when the robbery occurred. From the residence of the parish priest, Very Rev. Dean Eagan, which adjoins the church, there could be seen lights burning in the rear of the building. The priest, thinking that the sexton had neglected to turn out the lights after the Holy Week service, went into the church. On entering the door he was surprised to see a man removing articles from the altar. Hoping to capture the thieves, he quietly withdrew and hurried for assistance. Knowing that a large number of commercial travellers were staying at the Queen's Hotel, he telephoned, and asked that the guests assist in capturing the desecrators.

Immediately twenty-five of the guests hurried to the church and surrounded the building. They had no sooner laid their plans for the capture than the man who had been seen by the priest quietly walked out. He was seized by several of the party, and at once taken to the lock-up. MAIL CALLED NO WITNESSES

Action of Lee-La-Crobe Bateman for Libel Concluded Last

VERDICT WILL BE KNOWN TO-DAY.

Beats Out Newspaper iu Manoeuvre for Last Word

In the Civil Assizes last evening Mr. Justice Ferguson instructed the jury in the libel action against The Mail Printing Company, brought by Lee-La-Crobe Bateman of Vancouver, B.C., to bring in a sealed verdict, which will be read at the opening of the countries of the c at the opening of the court this morn-

The article complained of was said to have been published in The Mail and legislature was prorogued a o'clock this evening, with the Empire of Nov. 29, 1900, and to have ceremony.

contained a statement as to Bateman's reason for leaving the British army. The defence denied malicious publication of the alleged article; further, that if the alleged article did appear, it is true in substance and fact, and was published in New York and other American and Canadian newspapers. Bateman swore that he was at one time a second lieutenant in the 60th Rifies (England). He resigned his commission, he explained, to enter his father's employ as overseer of a sugar plantation in Majorca. He contended that his gazetting out of the army was quite regular and not occasioned by any misbehavior on his part. Counsel for the defence, in cross-examination, worked hard to get in a certain letter to show, it was said, that nothing would be accepted in the way of an apology unless accompanied by substantial damages. Counsel for Bateman gave his client, in re-examination, an opportunity to say anything in his own defence about

Counsel for Bateman gave his client in re-examination, an opportunity to say anything in his own defence about certain divorce proceedings and about his relations with a woman referred to as "Mrs. Bateman." The witness said he could not do that without bringing out other names, and he preferred not to do so. He said he came to Canada with letters of introduction from Lord Aberdeen, Sir Charles Smith and Lord Alden, governor of the Bank of England.

This closed the evidence for the plaintiff, and the defence called no witnesses, depending thereby on getting the last word to the jury. Counsel for Bateman met this attempt to deprive the plaintiff of the last word by claiming that counsel for the defence had put in evidence when he put a paper in. The court held that exhibits put the order of the addresses as is usual, viz, the defence first, the plaintiff second.

The jury was then addressed by the counsel and the court. Judge Ferguson explained that it was not within his province to say whether or not the article complained of was libelous. If the jury thought that it was libelous, then damages that were not exorbitant, but reasonable, ought to be awarded. It was 7.30 o'clock when His Lordship instructed the jury to bring in a sealed verdict.
