It is not a proper system which subordinates the interests of the people to the indifference of capitalists who will only move when the inducements are sufficiently enticing to arouse them. However, the Mayor and aldermen might improve the service in the manner suggested if they would only exercise the authority that is vested in them. According to the agreement, we are to have an up-to-date service, and this calls for better speed, rejection of trailers and a much greater mileage. So far the agreement has been practically worthless, as far as the rights of the citizens are concerned. We have been altogether left at the mercy of the company. If the city authorities cannot force the company to live up to the agreement, they might at least call President Mackenzie's attention to the fact that his company would make much more money if it were more liberally managed. By the way, the board of directors now contains several enterprising citizens, including Messrs. Nichols and Pellatt. Cannot these gentlemen do something towards making the Toronto Railway an up-to-date institution?

Georgian Bay Canal Bill Provokes Discussion on Its Second Reading in the Senate.

Ottawa, March 26.—In the Senate today Hon. Mr. Ferguson enquired whether the subsidy due by the government of Canada to Prince Edward Island at the beginning of the present year was computed and paid on the basis of the census of 1901. If so, was a requirement then made of the preceding semi-annual report that the subsidy due on July 1 last on the same basis of population? Whether adjustment to the payment of the subsidy to Prince Edward Island for the current year, a correction has been made of the account by placing the said subsidy on the basis of the population as shown by the census of 1901? If such correction was made, has the government of Prince Edward Island been notified thereof? Did the government of Prince Edward Island, at the falling due or payment of the subsidy at the end of the present year, object to said subsidy being computed on the decreased population, as shown by the census of 1901?

making the conditions governing such bills more stringent. They had seen reports that Mr. Turle had some very important schemes on hand, and a proceeding with this Georgian Bay Canal bill, parliament and the country had a right to a declaration of the government policy. He thought the bill should stand over. It would not prejudice it in any way.

Hon. Mr. Scott thought the bill might be read a second time a survey of this route was made 20 years ago. Without doubt it was the most important national work the country could be doing. A request had been made to the government to guarantee the bonds, but the limited extent, but the government did not feel justified in doing so.

Hon. Mr. Wood, Hamilton, understood that there was a private bill. Were the people prepared to build this canal at their own expense?

Hon. Mr. Scott said that he did not think the country was prepared to guarantee the bonds even at 2 per cent. The country could do better service in the Northwest. It was out of all question to expect the country to guarantee any such bonds.

Hon. Mr. Bernier said the canal would benefit all Canada, and would be a most important military canal.

Hon. Mr. Owen said the opening of this route had been too long delayed. There would be difficulty in getting 20 feet of water. He reminded the Senate of the expert evidence that would pass it. It was for the government to decide whether the work should be carried on as a public work or by private enterprise. It cost \$100,000,000, all the better for the country in which the English money was invested.

Hon. Mr. Ferguson, not having the bill before him, understood it was merely a bill to extend the time for construction. All the arguments advanced in favor of the bill were in favor of delay, and he thought this an opportune time for obtaining an explicit statement of the policy of the government in this matter. He invited the Secretary of State to give this statement before the bill went to the Executive Committee.

Hon. Mr. Pointier thought the principle of the bill was accepted by the House when the first bill was passed. It was his bill which extended the time for construction. He believed the details should be given and the details discussed in committee.

The bill was then read a second time, and the Senate adjourned.

**DEFECTS IN OUR STREET CAR SYSTEM.**

Superintendent Stanley of the Detroit Street Railway System was in the city yesterday. The World directs the attention of Engineer Rust, the Mayor and the aldermen and the management of the Toronto Railway Co. to some criticisms made by him on the Toronto street car system. He tells us that the use of trailers is an antiquated practice. They have discarded them in Detroit. He tells us further that the cars are run very slowly here, compared with the speed in Detroit, where they average 10 1/2 miles an hour. He notices the small mileage of Toronto, compared with United States cities. Detroit has 190 miles of track to our 90. The Toronto Railway Co. claim they cannot operate more cars in the centre of the city, but the Detroit superintendent says that on Woodward avenue they have a headway of 7 seconds during the rush hour at night. Supt. Stanley's criticism is right in line with what The World has contended all along in regard to the operation of our street railway system. The cars are run too slowly and this is owing to the burden of the rates and the restriction of the Toronto Railway Co. seems to be to carry as many passengers as possible with a single motor and with the fewest employees. With this end in view, they run trains instead of making every car an independent motor. As the time table has to be made out according to the slowest trip, the motors running without trailers have to follow the same schedule as those which have trailers attached. When 150 passengers are carried in a train, there is necessarily a great many more stops than when half the number of passengers are carried in a single car. The doing away of trailers would diminish the average headway of cars on the various routes and thereby improve the service, as well as make it possible to make much better time. The comparison of mileage between Toronto and Detroit will hold good as between Toronto and all other United States cities. The same policy of crowding everything in our system as compared with that of other places. Mr. Stanley states that his company and that they make more money by improving the service as much as they can, instead of stopping it and giving the public merely the bare necessities.

The railway service of Toronto is admirable in many particulars, but there are a great many ways in which it could be improved, and some of these have been indicated by the superintendent of the Detroit line. The trouble in the Toronto system seems to be traceable to the fact that the president has too many other duties to attend to and he does not give those who are operating the road sufficient authority to initiate improvements. A weak point in private ownership of franchises of this kind is that those who control them will not undertake improvements unless they see a large margin of profit for the company. The municipality would be satisfied to undertake improvements without any margin of profit and a low rate of interest on the capital invested. A franchised corporation, however, is not content without making every improvement an occa-

**POLITICAL INTELLIGENCE.**

The Hon. E. J. Davis, Commissioner of Crown Lands, evidently anticipates a warm contest with Herbert Lennox in North York. Already he has commenced opening committee rooms in various parts of his riding, and has had his speech on the budget debate printed for distribution among his constituents. Mr. Davis has also issued a campaign booklet, bearing his portrait. At the Parliament Buildings, on Monday, he entertained a number of his friends to luncheon, among them being several jurors of the York County Assizes.

The Liberals of the new riding of West Nipissing have decided to hold a convention at Sturgeon Falls on April 10.

It is understood that the Conservatives have decided to bring out a labor candidate against Mr. Preston at Brantford. They have arranged for a series of meetings, to be addressed by Quebec friends, in the districts where there are numbers of French electors. Arrangements have also been made for labor speakers to address the meetings.

Mr. Walter Murray, it is said, has consented to oppose Andrew Pattullo, M.L.A., at the ensuing Provincial election in Woodstock. Mr. Murray says that he has received the strongest requests from influential men in his riding, to stand in the work for him on the ground of Mr. Pattullo's malfeasance in the "road" question. The same paper also accuses Mr. Pattullo of lacking in truth and candor in regard to the removal of the Reformatory for Boys.

The Executive Committee of the Oxford Prohibition Committee, which has been meeting in Woodstock, has called a general meeting of the General Committee, to further consider the advisability of putting a prohibition candidate in the field.

The Pictou County Conservatives have elected W. H. Williamson, president, and J. McEwen, secretary-treasurer. The old vice-presidents have all been re-elected.

The St. Catharines Evening Journal takes this shot at Dr. Joseph M. L. Lincoln. "His name is neither a name nor vote—publicly, at least. Consequently, he has nothing to answer for and can look every man in the face. Lincoln's representative is a great cursturne politician."

In East Nipissing, the probable Conservative candidate will be Mr. J. B. Klock, ex-M.P.

At a Prohibition Convention, held at Wingham, in West Huron, a committee, appointed to secure, if possible, prohibition in the coming election, and, failing in this, secure one who will run as an independent.

In Durham, also, the prohibitionists are active, and a committee has been appointed to consider the situation there.

In the new riding of Sault Ste. Marie, it is likely that a convention will be called shortly to nominate a Socialist candidate.

The Socialists of Brantford intend to contest South Brant in the coming election. Amongst the several names which have been suggested, the name of Joseph Ham, a well-known manufacturer, who runs his factory upon conservative principles, seems to be the one most favored. Aid. Ham is also probably receive their full support, if nominated.

The Berlin Socialists are considering the advisability of nominating a candidate to contest North Waterloo in the coming election. Rev. A. B. Francisco and John Turf of the Trades and Labor Council are possible nominees.

The West York Prohibition Association is arranging for a series of organization meetings. The first one will be held at Mimico on the evening of Wednesday, April 2.

On April 9, the Conservatives of West Simcoe, the riding represented by James Duff, will meet in nomination convention, probably at Cooks' town. Mr. Duff will undoubtedly again be chosen as candidate.

In East and West Hamilton, neither party has as yet nominated its candidates. As for the Conservatives, there is no doubt that Mr. Carstairs and Mr. Colquhoun, the sitting members, will again be nominated.
