Mr. Tarte was at some disadvantage in that the tariff question had already passed through two readings during the present session. His speech was weighted too much with a load of statistics, all of which were not given to the methods of Mr. Tarte, whose speeches are usually characterized by brevity and directness. All with applause came from the opposite side of the House, and it came in generous quantities.

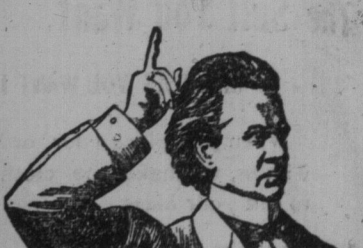
