"Liberty of speech and of the press, when exercised within the bounds of constitutional guarantees. are limitations upon the exercise of the right of privacy.

"One who seeks public office, or any person who claims from the public approval or patronage, waives his right of privacy to such an extent that he cannot restrain or impede the public in any proper investigation into the conduct of his private life which may throw light upon the question as to whether the public should bestow upon him the office which he seeks or accord him approval or patronage which he asks. The holder of public office makes a waiver of a similar nature, and subjects his life at all times to closest scrutiny, in order that it may be determined whether the rights of the public are safe in his hands."

It appears from this decision that the seeker of office or public honors must submit not only his public but his private life and record to publicity in so far as the published reports are necessary to show whether he is fit for public honors or office. Even the right of privacy in a private person is not absolute, altho the press must not abuse its liberty by offensive or injurious publications. There is danger in either extreme. Belgians have bred these, as they did the canary, to new types, and have produced an almost yellow shell parrot. The little zebra finch is also a great favorite, one Melbourne dealer alone sending away 10,000 a year. The gem of all Australian finches sent to Antwerp is the Gouldian or painted finch. The chief firm of dealers in Antwerp and the world, the Jamrachs, offer high prices for rare birds, and one of the best customers of the house is Baron Rothschild.

Not only Europe, but also America, receives birds in cages from Antwerp, There live the deafers who import birds from all parts of the world, but in greatest number from Australia. In a month or so the bird catchers of the Australian bush and downs will take their season's catch to the nearest towns, and soon after an immense gathering of the feathered emigrants will go to Antwerp to be acclimated. Finches and parrots constitute the larger part of the collection. In recent years the tiny shell parrots have been in great demand, England receiving in one year as many as 50,000 pairs. 


