ANNEXATION TERMS NOT YET AGREED ON

Civic Committee and Barton Township Council Unable to Get Together—Day's Doings.

HAMILTON, Oct. 29.—(Special.)—The meeting this evening between the civic committee and the councilors of Barton Township on the terms of the proposed annexation was one long struggle. W. A. H. Duff, solicitor, did the talking for the township, and Mayor McLaren and City Solicitor Waddell for the city. The afternoon failed out one by one until there were but the mayor, the solicitors and the township council members left. They could scarcely agree on a single term. The mayor refused to discuss any part of the agreement but those affecting the township, as it would be after the annexation takes place. One clause provides that the city must carry out the present contract with the township, which will be taken over by the city, and Mr. Waddell said the township were already button-holing the members of the board of education for increases of salary. The mayor's real reason for the conference was the suggestion of a "reasonable" distance from the city mains in which the city must be complete.

The committee of men and women who have been trying to raise \$15,000 for the Y.W.C.A., and \$10,000 for the Y.M.C.A., in five days, have raised about \$12,000 up till to-night, which was supposed to end the campaign. The ladies gave \$10,000, and the men \$2,000. The campaign will be continued next Wednesday and Thursday.

The court of revision this afternoon dealt with appeals from Ward 3, and made reductions amounting to \$23,336, including a cut of \$19,000 on the assessment of Highland School, a number of lady school teachers who were assessed for income for amounts varying from \$50 to \$150 were excused. Bishop Dunlop made the usual request to have his income assessment raised from \$300 to \$380.

The citizens' campaign committee held an organization meeting in the Simcoe-street Methodist Church this evening. Rev. H. B. Christie remarked that it looked as if the aldermen were juggling with the power question so as to make it an issue in the coming municipal campaign, to the detriment of the temperance question. These officers were elected: Vice-president, B. Johnson; chairman, H. A. Martin; secretary, E. L. Kelly; treasurer, George Atwater.

The jury that investigated the death of Herbert E. Tuck, brought in a verdict of accidental death.

CHARGED WITH FRAUD.

F. J. Vale of Regina is charged with attempting to get \$6000 from the Bank of Commerce by fraud. He called upon D. B. Dewar, the manager, with a letter purporting to be signed by the bank's Regina manager. The signature was typewritten and Mr. Dewar received several epistles of the same kind, notifying him that Vale would call on him, and that he had \$6000 pounds on deposit. When Vale called this morning he said he would be satisfied with \$6000. It is thought that he is simple-minded.

WOMAN DROWNS HERSELF

Deliberately Walks into Water Until She is Submerged.

DRANK FROM WRONG BOTTLE AND DIES FROM POISONING.

SOBOUTG, Oct. 29.—(Special.)—Andrew Hyde, when returning from Colborne to his home two miles east of that place, had with him among other things two bottles, one said to contain medicine to be taken inwardly, another containing carbolic acid to be used as a wash for blood poisoning. Without examining the label, he drank from the wrong bottle and ran into a neighbor's yard, saying he had taken by mistake carbolic acid. He died a few minutes later.

Nursing-at-Home Mission.

The good work that has been carried on by the Nursing-at-Home Mission during the last six months was outlined in the reports submitted at the meeting held in the Mission Hall, Laybrite-avenue, yesterday afternoon. The chair was occupied by Mrs. Gowki. The report of the secretary, Mrs. Turnbull, showed that the nurses had paid 491 visits in caring for 672 patients. In the dispensary department 2148 cases were treated. Special mention was made of the great need for infants' clothing in the home.

The income of the mission for the six months was \$182, and the expenditure \$178. The trash air department sent 702 children to the country at a cost of a little less than a dollar a head.

TWO KINDS OF HOOK-WORM.

I find there never was a settlement and the issue is found in favor of the defendant Broom, who is entitled to his disbursement if any.

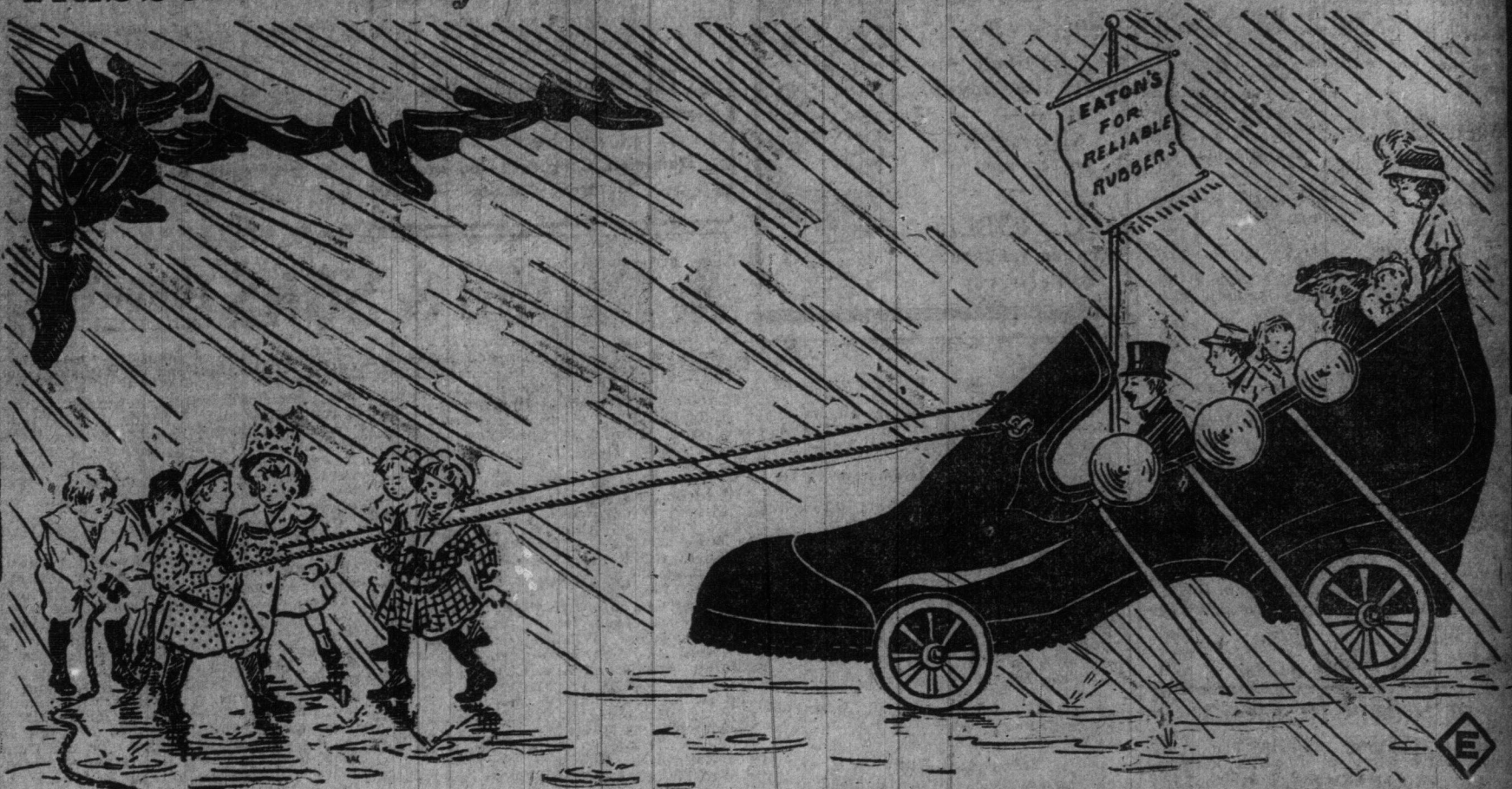

Candidate Pears Will Not Accept Vote of People as Final—A Lively Meeting.

NORTH TORONTO, Oct. 29.—(Special)—James Wright Brownlow, commission merchant, and James Pears, manufacturer, were to-night nominated for the position of councillor vacated by the death of the late William Parks, at a meeting which filled the Burlington town hall to the doors.

Mr. Brownlow was placed in nomination by S. J. Douglas and seconded by William Minton while for Mr. Pears a similar office was performed by Robert Cook and John Cleland.

Herbert H. Ball, H. Waddington and D. D. Reid who were likewise placed in nomination gratefully receiving the field to the two first named gentlemen.

F. A. Gibson, town solicitor, was in the chair and the at times the meeting was inclined to be boisterous, and there were spectacular features tending to excite high feeling with the two rival factions, the town had passed safely thru many another similar crisis unscathed.

Each of the candidates was enthusiastically received and early in the meeting disclosed any personal animus in the matter, avowing eternal friendship.

Short spirited addresses were given by Mr. Waddington and Mr. Ball, in which the latter scored the council for delay in the parallel roads.

The most dramatic feature of the whole meeting was the distinct refusal of Candidate Pears to answer a question submitted by H. H. Ball in which the latter asked Pears whether if elected he would pledge himself to abide by the expressed wish of the majority at the polls. To this the candidate declared he would not answer, but later stated that if he regarded the majority as not being representative, he would not abide by the vote of the people. "I think that Mr. Murphy and Mr. Grace were justified in doing as they did," said Mr. Pears, and the announcement was greeted with ominous silence.

"You need not submit any propositions to me like that," said Mr. Pears, for I don't agree to it.

TORONTO TO TAKE LEAD WITH AUTO SPRINKLERS

Two to Be Purchased at Cost of \$4500 Each—News of City Hall.

Toronto promises to be the first city in America to adopt the system of motor sprinklers. 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INFLUENCE OF THE STAGE IN FORMING IMPULSES

Is Human Mind More Susceptible to Suggestions in Theatre Than Elsewhere?

"The human mind becomes the most susceptible to suggestions in the theatre than in any other place," declares J. Alexander Fiske, in 'The Progress Magazine.' "The performance behind the footlights appeals directly to the feelings and emotions of the audience, and when a man of emotional nature is aroused, he seriously considers ideas that would never have occurred to him otherwise."

The truth of this statement can hardly be denied. The theatre exerts incalculable influence, emotionally, on the life of the people, and this influence is both helpful and deleterious according to the plays that the public attend.

William Courtney, a well-known actor, has often observed that when he enjoys what he would shun in real life. They appear to like crime on the stage, and in many cases the swindler and thief receive more applause than those working in the interest of law and order.

From sympathy with crime to commission of it is but a short step, declares Judge W. Foster, of the general sessions court of New York. He also says that unquestionably stage crime has a tendency to inspire crime, which is traceable to hypnotic suggestion.

David Beasco, however, is inclined to make light of such alarmist views. He denies that the stage could excite crime tendencies to crime either in theory or in fact.

Harrison Grey Fisk also comments in the same spirit. He says that the only forms of amusement that are likely to have any bad influence are those plays which make crime and criminals attractive, but as it is known that such forms of plays are rare, so the stage usually exercises a beneficial influence.

J. Alexander Fiske, in the article already cited, takes an equally optimistic view of the situation. By far the greater number of plays, he intimates, are wholesome and elevating. "The 'Such plays as 'The Gentleman from Mississippi,' 'The Lion and the Mouse,' 'The Winking Hour,' 'The Servant in the House,' 'The Third Degree,' 'The House of a To-Morrow,' have a powerful influence in the right direction. Besides, they are all intensely interesting and entertaining, and the same holds true of the lower degree about the better class of musical comedies."

"Many a person who has witnessed 'The Lion and the Mouse,' which will again be seen in Toronto this coming week, has received such a powerful stimulus in the increase of his will and determination that he goes forth for the last time for good in the world."

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HALF PROVINCE DRY

Of 806 Municipalities 345 Are Without Liquor Licenses.

According to a provincial government return there are 156 municipalities in Ontario where local option is in force, and 149 where no licenses are issued for various reasons. There are 306 municipalities in the province. Of the local option districts the act carried in 91 under the three-fifths clause. The tavern licenses in force number 519, shop licenses 258, wholesale 23, club 42, a total of 238, exclusive of breweries and distilleries. There has been a general decrease in the number of licenses since 1874 when the number was 618.

NEED \$25,000 MORE

New Buildings of Home for Incurables Far From Completion. The thirty-fifth annual meeting of the board of management of the Toronto Hospital for Incurables was held yesterday afternoon. The gathering was presided over by Sir Mortimer Clark, while his lordship Bishop Sweeney, and Ambrose Kent occupied the platform.

Dr. W. F. Burns in presenting the report of the medical board showed that there are now 146 patients in the hospital. At the first of the year the number was 141, while 31 deaths have occurred.

Mayor Oliver said that this was one of the most worthy institutions in the city, and he was sure that the City Council would see that they never got into debt. He thought that if the board would request a grant for the furnishing of the new wing from the coming council they would receive it.

Under the influence of Wall-street buoyancy a few local traders inclined to the buying side of a few of the active speculative issues, and this gave further strength to yesterday's advance.

On the whole the local speculative situation is too narrow to admit of any freedom in market operations in either direction and in this knowledge of conditions which is outlasting business. Steel and Coal shares were firmer, and as both of these stocks are under active manipulation the transactions in them overshadowed the trading in those issues not so favored.

La Rouse made a better showing today, and, incidentally, helped some of the other mining shares. Funds for actual investment are none too plentiful and this accounts for the quiet attitude of the stocks which center to the buyers of this calibre.

Speculatively regarded, the day was favorable to holders of securities.

MONEY RATES V. MONEY TIGHTNESS.

One Toronto bank went on record today as refusing to extend its call loans. This was no criterion, however, that stock collateral was not acceptable to other institutions; in fact, it is known that some are catering to extend these loans at the present 5 per cent. rate. The money situation seems to have resolved itself down to a desire among those with credit at their disposal to force substantial rates, while the demand for funds is good, rather than an actual scarcity of money. The Toronto stock market had a good undertone today, but the speculative following was small, and trading was not in any significant quantities.

INTEREST AROUSED
St. Lawrence-Chicago Navigation Co. Showing Excellent Earnings.

More than ordinary interest is being taken in the stock of the St. Lawrence and Chicago Navigation Company at the present time on account of the splendid earnings of the company which are being shown by the new boat Oster, which operates between Port Arthur and other points on the lower lakes.

On its last trip from Port Arthur the Oster carried no less than 320,000 bushels of wheat at good rates. It is very pointedly noted that wheat rates from Port Arthur are now as high as 3 1/2 cents per bushel, owing to the congested status of the ports and at this rate this one boat of the company is expected to make very large earnings during the balance of the season.

In connection with the St. Lawrence and Chicago Navigation Company, it is rumored that the relation which Mr. E. B. Osler holds in regard to both the C. P. R. and the navigation company will ultimately result in the latter being taken over by the C.P.R. as it is generally believed that the C.P.R. will acquire boats on the great lakes by purchase from present companies which are operating on these routes.

The dividend on the St. Lawrence and Chicago Navigation Company stock is paid at the end of the season in one sum and it is expected that this year it will be raised to 10 per cent as against 7 per cent in 1908.

Erickson Perkins & Co. (Beatty & Glassco) wired: The trading element was favorably disposed because of the advance in the price of copper, which in the past has been often employed as a leader. Yet we feel misgivings as to the real basis for the advance in this stock. We carry much else its purchase without better evidence of the facts which underlie the rise.

A radical improvement in Copper trade conditions would benefit most copper stocks, but first in order would be restriction of output. That such a thing is possible we doubt very much because of the diversity of interests, which have been mining the metal without restriction for two years, and brought conditions to such a pass that remedy of the evil is very difficult. In our opinion it will be a long time before demand for copper overtakes the output. Meanwhile, we think it is well to be very cautious in trading in Copper stocks of any kind.

Finley, Barrett & Co. wired J. P. Bickell: The market was strong and almost buoyant early in the afternoon. Personal investigation by our own firm justifies us in making the statement that there really is some foundation for the talk of a harmony of interests among the copper producers. We do not believe it will take the shape of any increase. We expect to see an improvement in the copper metal market shortly as a result.

Charles Head & Co. to R. R. Bongard: Money is somewhat easier and in free supply apparently at the lower rates. Closing was strong at best prices, with indications favoring a still further advance to-morrow. Preliminary estimates are for a favorable bank statement to-morrow. We would buy stocks on all recessions and take profits of a couple of points for the time being.

One Toronto bank went on record today as refusing to extend its call loans. This was no criterion, however, that stock collateral was not acceptable to other institutions; in fact, it is known that some are catering to extend these loans at the present 5 per cent. rate. The money situation seems to have resolved itself down to a desire among those with credit at their disposal to force substantial rates, while the demand for funds is good, rather than an actual scarcity of money. The Toronto stock market had a good undertone today, but the speculative following was small, and trading was not in any significant quantities.

On its last trip from Port Arthur the Oster carried no less than 320,000 bushels of wheat at good rates. NEW ASBESTOS FIELDS IN WYOMING PROMOTED
Theftford Mines, Sept. 9.—While it is true that Canada at present controls the asbestos industry of the entire world, yet her ability to indefinitely do so in the future is by no means positive or assured. In view of the progress and development of asbestos mining elsewhere, the principal market for Canadian asbestos is in the United States, where it is at present admitted free of duty, but our American neighbors, who are undoubtedly the hardest manufacturers and users of it, are hardly likely to continue to admit asbestos from Canada, should we become free of duty when American mines will be producing sufficient to supply the requirements of that country.

Realizing the importance and extent of the American asbestos market, it is with much interest that we learn of new discoveries in Natrona County of Wyoming, where asbestos has been known to exist in commercial quantities and quality in Natrona County for a great many years, and its existence there is vouched for by the Federal and State Geologists' reports as well as by the Canadian Government reports for 1905.

PEOPLE ARE ASKING FOR MORE AND BETTER BEEF Canadian Farmers Have Abundant Market at Paying Prices For All They Can Produce.

Best feeding beef cattle pay the farmer? Are present prices for grain and produce too tempting for farmers to make their return thru the market? Cattle prices on the Toronto market have been unquestionably good all the year. And Toronto has come to the forefront in matters of live stock, ever since the reorganized Union Stock yards attracted the big American buyers.

Best-feeding has been gradually on the increase in North America. England consumes enormous quantities yearly. She gathers her supply from South America and Australia as well as from the United States and Canada.

Recently Japan is taking to a diet of beef. Rice hitherto has been the chief article of food, but since the war caused by a too steady consumption of this staple. It is well known to all that Germany wants more good beef for her hungry manufacturing classes, in the absence of which consumption of dogs and old horses has been disgusting.

Our own Canadian Northwest has been raising more or less numerous herds of fat cattle, the great majority of which find its way to the old country, consequently the Canadian butcher trade has to be contented with the immature grades and with the dairy stock.

The time is rapidly approaching in the United States when the export of beef from that country will practically be checked, because of the war between her own people. Upon agriculture and the farming classes of North America rests the onus of supplying the choice cuts.

Consequently it is patent to all that the production of beef for a considerable time will not be so hopeless from the financial side as to leave the farmer and feeder at a loss from his operations. But does it pay now?

Reports of shipments of carloads of big feeders are constantly being made in The World's market report to Guelph, Fergus, Waterloo, Berlin and other places, and these feeders pay good prices for these cattle. They have to in order to get them. It is unnecessary to add that these feeders must make money or they would cease operating in this line of business.

More recently feeding of carload lots has been begun by many York and Ontario County farmers. Many others turn out large bunches of 800 lbs steers on a fifty acre farm in the spring and realize a good profit in the grain made during the season. An instance in point is given by Dr. McGillivray of Whitby, who has a 100 acre farm in that township. Last spring he brought out 25 head of choice 800 lb. steers and turned them on to the land. This fall the whole lot were marketed at an average of an even \$300 over his cost price.

Taking the weights of the cattle at pasture to be 500 pounds, the cost at \$2.75 landed at the pasture, the cost stands at \$660. The animals would easily gain 150 pounds during the season, and these for good stuff have been around the 4-4 mark. So that a gain is easily secured out. Now the question comes if it pays to stand the winter at all its attendant trouble and attention. It must be borne in mind that pasture feeding is the dearest way to get the best results. Wheat and clover, three acres in many places to feed one animal under pasture, the same land under cultivation will feed twice the number. Moreover, the manure from the manures on the land are not valued high enough.

St. Lawrence receipts are quoted as follows: Granulated, 47 1/2 per cent. in barrels; No. 1 golden, 43 per cent. in bags. Beaver, 44.50 per cent. in bags. These prices are for delivery. Car lots of less, in 100-lb. bags prices are 5c less.

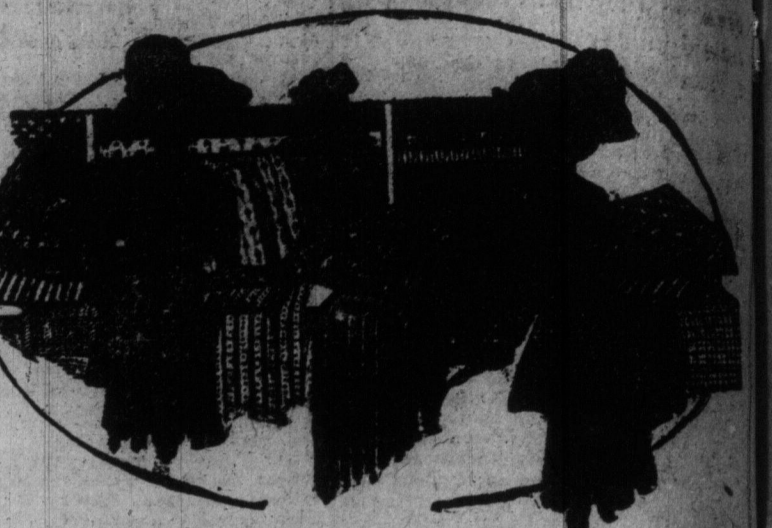
