FIRST BATTLE ON FRENCH SOIL IN PRESENT WAR SEES DEFEAT OF THE KAISER'S FORCE

Tear Down Crepe; Put Bright Flowers in Place

Paris, Aug. 11.—(Via London, Aug. 11)—The crepe festoons which for forty years have hung from the monument of the City of Strasbourg, capital of Alsace-Lorraine, which stands in the Place De La Concorde were torn down today and replaced with flowers and palm branches, while a tri-colored sash was draped about the figure.

HERE IS FIRST NEWS FROM BRITISH WAR OFFICE AND ADMIRALTY

London, Aug. 11.—(12:33 p.m.)—The admiralty and war office information bureau established by the British government started work this morning. Its first announcement was as follows: "About two cavalry divisions are in the neighborhood of Tongres to the north of Liege. Three German army corps are still opposite Liege and other German troops are reported to be entrenched along the line of the River Aisne.

ALL SILENT YET AS TO THE GERMAN AND BRITISH FLEETS

London, Aug. 11 (8:40 a. m.)—The correspondent of the Daily Mail at Copenhagen telegraphs under yesterday's date that the export route for provision steamers from Denmark to England has been re-opened. The steamer Konstantin, from Grimsby, and the steamer Express from Newcastle, arrived at Esbjerg. Both captains said that they had sighted no warships in the North Sea.

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LOCAL PRICES

Liege Forts Still Hold Out

Terrible Scenes of Bloodshed and Great Acts of Heroism Prince and Son Reported Killed in One Desperate Assault in Which 800 Germans Fell—Kaiser's Men Occupy Town 10 Miles Away

London, Aug. 11.—(4:55 a. m.)—Despatches to the 'Times' from The Hague and to the 'Telegraph' from Maastricht, sent under yesterday's date, agree that the struggle for possession of the forts at Liege was going on continuously and giving rise to terrible scenes of bloodshed and great acts of heroism.

MORE THAN HALF MILLION OF BRITISH TROOPS NOW UNDER ARMS NOT COUNTING THE RESERVES

London, Aug. 11.—According to today's 'Times', Great Britain is now well on with her mobilization, and has between 500,000 and 600,000 men under arms. "We should, however, view the situation with comparative equanimity," says the 'Times', "and not be turned from any masculine resolve by the threat of assault by the Germans."

British Merchant Shipping Suffers Little GERMAN LOSS IS HEAVY English Cruiser in Lower Gulf of St. Lawrence—The Port of Halifax Opened at Today Noon

New York, Aug. 11.—According to the Tribune, British shipping, which has practically the freedom of the Atlantic, is not losing a great deal by the European war. The Vaterland, which cost the Hamburg-American line \$10,000,000, is lying at her pier in Hoboken, with no prospect of leaving port.

NORTHROP FREE

Alibi Proven in Riot Case—Damage Placed at About \$8,000

Frederick Northrop, one of the men in jail charged with taking part in the riot on Market Square, was this morning released on his own recognizance, after proving an alibi. Francis Kerr appeared for him.

Northrop's wife, Aubrey Brown, Arthur Brown, Leslie McKel, James LeClair and Gordon Kennedy all testified as to Northrop's movements on the night of the riot. It was shown that he left home with his wife at seven o'clock and was seen in the Gem Theatre about eight o'clock. Going from there he was in King Square for a time. At ten o'clock he was talking with Aubrey Brown in Charlotte street, a few minutes later was seen by McKel at the foot of Union street on his way home and talked with Arthur Brown and James LeClair near Brown's cigar store in Main street soon afterwards. The magistrate thought this alibi sufficient.

H. M. Hopper gave evidence in the William Edleston case this morning. He said that the damage done to the street railway property amounted to about \$8,000 as far as could be estimated at present. This was divided as follows: Windows and frames in power houses and office, \$1,000; damage to cars, \$2,000; damage to machinery, \$3,000; and damage to stock in office, \$2,000.

ARTILLERY OF FRANCE MAY HURRY THE END

Guns Which Did Tremendous Damage in Balkans to Play Havoc With Germans

(New York Mail.) When the news came that the Kaiser's Uhlans had been moved down by French machine guns in the skirmish at Saint Croix, the French army officers watching the European situation exclaimed: "I told you so."

The eyes of every artillery officer in the world are today following the French artillery, on which is pinned the hope of France to win the Germans.

Will the French artillery, admittedly the best in the world, wreak the havoc in the German ranks that has been predicted? Will the new pieces of the French repeat the awful slaughter for which their old pieces were responsible in the Balkan war of a little more than a year ago? At that time the Serbians in particular, were armed with the marvellous French guns and swept from the field the opposing Turks armed with German guns.

If the French artillery refuses in this war to meet the expectations of France, then every nation in the world which has been copying it, is predicted a failure of the artillery will mean the defeat of the French.

The French, since the time of Napoleon, have specialized in artillery, and their guns of today, with their handling, form the backbone of the army.

The guns are manufactured in secret, such is the value placed on them. The famous Dreyfus affair of fifteen years ago, grew in part out of the suspicion that the secret of their manufacture had been sold to Germany. Friendly as France is to her Russian ally she has never even lent to Russia any of her newer models.

FRENCH CANADA AND THE EMPIRE

(Montreal Gazette) "I was quite aware that a broad British national sentiment had developed very rapidly in Canada during the last few years; but not before tonight did I realize the overwhelming character of the change from narrow provincialism and race prejudice to a feeling so deep and so strongly imperial as if we were on the banks of the Thames."

"This was the way Sir Rudolph Forget, M. P., sized up the war fervor of his compatriots of both races after the parade of the 68th of which he is the honorary colonel."

"I have heard it said since my arrival this evening," he continued "that our French Canadians would not be so fervent in their support of this war as we are. I believe that no unit in the Dominion appreciates more fully than the French Canadians the degree of civil and religious liberty accorded them by the British crown, and I know they will show this appreciation in whatever corner of the earth our soldiers are called for duty during the present conflict."

ROLE OF THE KIEL CANAL

(From the Toronto World.) On June 24 the German Emperor formally opened the enlarged Kiel Canal, connecting the North Sea with the Baltic. Kiel, the principal naval station of the empire, is situated at the Baltic end of the canal, and is heavily fortified. Originally opened in 1895 and constructed for naval rather than for commercial purposes, it saves a journey of 200 miles through the straits that divide Denmark from Norway and Sweden. The straits can be made exceedingly dangerous to navigation, and it is unlikely that the fleet will expose itself to needless risks.

As enlarged the Kaiser Wilhelm Canal permits the largest war and merchant ships to pass from sea to sea, and this will form an important factor in the naval strategy. The new works necessitated the construction of new locks, of double the first dimensions, and the deepening of the waterway. One of the locks exceeds the largest on the Panama Canal, and the Kiel Canal is longer by ten miles than the waterway of its Central American rival.

THINKS GERMANY OVER-ESTIMATED HER WAR STRENGTH

Such is Opinion Expressed by Lord Richard Nevill, Household Chamberlain—The Australian Fleet

Montreal, Aug. 10.—"It seems to me that Germany has rather over-estimated her strength," said Lord Richard Nevill, chamberlain of the household of the governor general of Australia, who arrived here en route for London. Beyond this remark Lord Nevill declined to give his views on the European crisis, but he said the mere fact of Canada and Australia having expressed such readiness to come to the aid of the other country must have a great moral effect in favor of Great Britain all over the world.

It was most gratifying to me," he went on, "to read the report that Australia had volunteered to send an expeditionary force of 20,000 men to the Old Country at the expense of the Commonwealth, and I have no doubt that Canada will take similar steps. It is not much the men that count as the moral support, which I am sure will make itself very widely felt."

"Australia is, of course, now in a position to defend her own coasts and seas as she has a fleet of about ten ships, including the flagship 'Australia,' of Dreadnought type, besides cruisers, destroyers, etc. Since the measure for compulsory training of cadets, introduced three years ago by about 20,000 men in the field for defensive purposes. The Price of Foods. (From Le Devoir.) They Be Victorious. (From La Presse.) And the entire Canadian people will pray ardently that the English flag and the French shall fly triumphantly in Europe.

Quebec Militia for France. (From La Patrie.) Canada has fifteen regiments composed of French Canadians. All the members of these battalions speak the French language and are descendants of Frenchmen. Now that Great Britain has officially declared war upon Germany and is marching side by side with France in resisting the invaders, why should not the Canadian government obtain the extraordinary privilege of offering these battalions for direct service in France? Would it not be a splendid spectacle for the whole world to see French Canada, this ancient colony of France, now living happy and prosperous under the protection of England, offer its arms for the protection of its former mother country? Can a better or a more striking example be found of the entire cordial and can it not be hoped that it would result in immeasurable good for our own country from the union of the two races which compose the Dominion?

MR. CARVELL AND ATTY.-GEN. CLARKE

The Telegraph yesterday received the following letters from Attorney-General Clarke: Attorney-General New Brunswick, Fredericton, N. B., Aug. 8, 1914. To the Editor of The Telegraph. Sir—In the Saturday issue of your paper, Mr. Carvell is reported as saying: "The government of the province could get the books (meaning the New York books of the St. John & Quebec Railway Company) if they did their duty. The government now owned a majority of the company's stock and the people are entitled to a strict account." Will you permit me to say that Mr. Carvell could have used these words only under an entire misapprehension of the fact. The government has never owned, and does not now own, any portion of the stock of the St. John & Quebec Railway Company. Knowing Mr. Carvell's deep sense of honor, I am sure he will accept the first opportunity to retract the statement. Yours sincerely, GEORGE J. CLARKE.

Mr. Carvell's Reply. F. B. Carvell, K. C. M. P., to whom the substance of Mr. Clarke's letter was communicated by The Telegraph, promptly took up the Attorney-General's challenge. Instead of retracting Mr. Carvell's statement, he directed Mr. Clarke's attention, and the public's, to the fact that the government of the province had guaranteed the construction of a line of railway along the valley of the Saint John River—C. 10, S. 12. "Before any of the bonds authorized by the Act are guaranteed for the St. John & Quebec Railway Company, fifty-one per cent. (51 p. c.) of the authorized capital stock of the said company shall be assigned to and vested in His Majesty, for and on behalf of the Province, as fully paid up and non-assessable stock, and the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council may, from time to time, appoint two of the Board of Directors of said Company, none of which Directors so appointed need be a shareholder in such Company."



The French lines that cost from 40 cents a yard upward come in the patterns that make up this suit most effectively in wash materials. They are also exceedingly smart in silk. The jacket is unusually attractive. To make the dress requires 3/4 yards of striped and 6 yards of plain material 44 inches wide.


The linen should first be folded carefully, then the pattern of the pattern marked by triple "T" perforations laid along the fold. For short sleeves the lower parts of the sleeves are cut off. Indications are also given for a lower effect for the neck if same is desired. The lower edge of the over-front of the jacket may be finished straight if desired, but the cut out effect exposing the vest is very desirable.

In making the vest is first finished by taking up the dart at the front and hemming. Then pleat the material making "T" on single large "O" perforation and tack. Arrange front on vest, shoulder, under-arm and armhole edges even. Close under-arm seam as notched; close shoulder seam. Sew collar to neck edge as notched.

Sleeve—For short sleeves see cutting directions. Close seams as notched, easing any fullness between notches at elbow. Close cuff seam as notched, sew to short sleeve, double "oo" perforations even, single small "oo" perforation at inside seam of sleeve. Sew sleeve in armhole, inside seam at notch in front, easing any fullness between double "T" perforations.

Close the sleeve seams, add cuffs and sew into armhole, easing any fullness between double "T" perforations. Finish the neck with accordion pleated hemstitched ruffle.



BELGIANS FLOCK TO MONTREAL FOR SERVICE

Montreal, Aug. 11—"Every train is bringing to Montreal Belgian reservists ready and anxious to return home for active service against Germany," said Clarence I. de Sola, the Belgian Consul. "More than four thousand have already reported, and they are coming in all the time. The office has been as you see it now all day."

At the time a party of between fifty and sixty Flemish reservists were concluding arrangements for their passage home. They were a fine body of men, every one of whom had seen service. The news of Belgian victories caused great excitement and was followed by demonstrations around the consulate. Mr. de Sola found himself constantly surrounded on the streets by crowds wishing to offer their congratulations upon the victories achieved by Belgian arms.

The recruits now coming in, he said, are largely from the farmers in the west, which they are leaving without question in spite of the approaching harvest. Many are paying their own passage home.
