CHOLERA IS HELPING TO END THE WAR

Many Cases Among Turkish Troops and the Refugees

DANGER IN CONSTANTINOPLE

Fear That Contamination of Water Supply May Come to Add to Horror—Twenty Corpses Taken Off One Train

(Canadian Press)

London, Nov. 15.—Rifles for military transport or on account of the cholera which is spreading rapidly at Hadzemeti, the government, the Constantinople correspondent of the Daily Telegraph declares, is prepared to make large concessions in order to prevent the Balkan armies from entering Constantinople.

An uncorroborated despatch dated November 12 from Constantinople to the Reuters Telegram Company, says that the cholera is extending alarmingly among the troops. The cases are reckoned by the hundreds, while among the refugees there are even more victims.

In Constantinople, adds the despatch, the disease is more difficult to control. One train alone brought 166 patients from Sofia. They were conveyed to the barracks at Brusa on the Bosphorus. The bodies of twenty soldiers who had died from the cholera were taken from the train.

Many trains have returned from the front with soldiers who are not wounded but are in a state of physical collapse, owing to exhaustion due to exposure and lack of food. The sights at some of the stations near Tchtalja are unenviable. Cholera victims crawl to the stations for water or in the hope of getting to Constantinople. They can be seen lying about in every stage of the infection.

Water May Become Contaminated

The greatest danger threatening Constantinople is that the water supply from Lake Serik may become contaminated. Only a few cases have been reported up to the present among the people of the capital, and it would seem that the disease is still in its early stages.

Fortunately the Muslim population is naturally charitable, and will share the last crust with the wandering fugitives. "One thought, and that an obscure one, is that of seeing this people migrating back to their ancient homes," says the correspondent, "namely how little altered after 500 years are the wanderers returning practically in the same manner in which they came into Europe five centuries ago. The same rough wooden carts dragged by bullocks or buffaloes, and covered with straw matting which covers the houses hold lumber, and the female members of the family hunched into the smallest conceivable spaces, peering with sad eyes at the unfamiliar sights, while the sheep and goats are prevented from straying by the younger members of the family."

(Constantinople, (By Way of Kustendje). The cholera epidemic among Turkish troops holding the line of fortifications at Tchtalja in front of Constantinople is rapidly becoming worse. More than 300 cases are reported daily and the total number already exceeds 6,000. Whatever hope the Turks may have had of maintaining the State of Belgrade at Tchtalja has been dissipated by this outbreak of cholera. An eye witness declares that he saw 200 corpses buried in one big trench at Hadzemeti, the headquarters of the Turkish commander in chief, on Tuesday. The bodies were dragged to the spot on hooks and dropped into the trench, which was not nearly deep enough for the purpose.

Checks Bulgarian

While cholera is undermining the Turkish defenses it also at the same time constitutes a most formidable opponent to the Bulgarian advance and it is generally believed here that the outbreak has disposed of the question of even a temporary occupation of Constantinople by the Bulgarian troops. It is thought unlikely that King Ferdinand of Bulgaria will risk the lives of his soldiers in this way if he can avoid it. It is said on good authority that cholera has already appeared among the Bulgarian troops.

The Bulgarian army on last Sunday occupied the town of Derkos at the Black Sea end of the Tchtalja line and thus controls the water supply at Constantinople. This, however, has not yet been interfered with. The steady and unrelenting series of overwhelming disasters deserves commendation. It is a true severe application of martial law prevents public expression of any criticism or demonstrations of resentment. The great mass of Moslems however is inclined to bow to inevitable and to accept without violent opposition what they regard as the dictates of fate.

ARE SURROUNDING CONSTANTINOPLE

Bulgarians Creep Around Forest of Belgrade and Are On Outskirts of Capital

Turkish Troops Surrender to Servians After Conflict—Graphic Tale of Fighting at Adrianople Reaches London

(Canadian Press)

Constantinople, Nov. 15.—Bulgarian troops have reached the vicinity of Kiles on the Black Sea coast at the entrance to the Bosphorus. The men belonging to the Turkish life boat station have left.

London, Nov. 15.—The announcement that the Bulgarians had reached the vicinity of Kiles came in a single line telegram from Constantinople this afternoon. It lifts a corner of the veil which has been baffling observers for some days regarding the movements of the victorious invaders in front of the Ottoman capital.

Their appearance at Kiles shows that they have managed to creep round behind what is known as the forest of Belgrade on the outskirts of Constantinople, and are now in close proximity to Thrapsia, the summer resort of the residents of Constantinople.

From Thrapsia a good road leads to within a few miles of Kiles. Nothing has yet come to hand to show whether the Bulgarians at Kiles are in strong force or merely a detachment of cavalry scouts clearing a new route of approach to the Turkish capital. There is a strongly defended fort at Kiles, but this was captured by the Bulgarians on the 12th.

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The Bulgarians are now in a position to surround the city of Constantinople. The Turkish troops are being driven back towards the city.

London, Nov. 15.—Bethel Burleigh, in a despatch from Mustapha Pasha to the Daily Telegraph, describes the fighting around Adrianople. He says: "Port Arthur produced no grander or more terrible effects, than Sunday night's furious bombardment. Hundreds of shells burst in the same instant and around Adrianople. Guns of all sizes and kinds, made a flaming roaring inferno, which must have reverberated for miles along the houses in distant Mustapha Pasha. The Turks attempted to reply but were soon overpowered by the tremendous strength, energy and accuracy of the besiegers' artillery."

The correspondent describes the storming of the forts on the north and east the same night. He says: "The Bulgarian storming battalions first attacked the forts. They then stripped the forts of their garrisons and carried off the stores. They then set fire to the houses and burned them down. There was a tornado of artillery and rifle fire on both sides."

"Then the Bulgarians ran in with the bayonet. There was wild and terrible work with no wish to ask or give quarter. Such Turks as could fled, but they left an awful trail of dead and dying on the ground."

"Blind Banker of Paris" Confesses Misappropriation

Creates Sensation by Giving Himself up to Police—Says Sum is \$2,000,000

Paris, Nov. 15.—Augustin Max, known throughout France as the "Blind Banker of Paris," has created a mild sensation in financial circles here by surrendering himself to the police and confessing that he has misappropriated \$2,000,000 of his clients' money.

Max declared that he had invested the depositor's funds in copper and nickel mines in New Caledonia. The enterprises were complete failures.

Max, who enjoyed the highest reputation in banking circles here, declares he had decided to commit suicide, but was persuaded by his family to give himself up to the police.

Barry's Bay, Ont., Nov. 15.—The ill-fated Mayflower, the old paddle-steamer which sank on Tuesday night with the loss of nine lives, was floated last night in Kaminning Lake, near the scene of the tragedy, in twenty feet of water.

STENOGRAPHER IS FOUND DEAD IN BATH TUB

Marjorie Powers' Death Being Investigated by Boston Police

Boston, Nov. 15.—Marjorie E. Powers, 28 years old, unmarried, of 108 West Canton street, employed as a stenographer by Arthur T. Cummings, a proprietor of the Arthur T. The young woman came to the hotel on Wednesday accompanied by a man who engaged a room for her. They registered as "Mr. and Mrs. Davis." The identity of this man is known to the police. Yesterday morning some man called up the Revere House (formerly on the telephone).

During the conversation with the room of the guest, but failed to get any response. They kept trying to arouse the occupant every time the telephone rang. Finally they climbed onto the 12th floor near the room on the second floor and entered to look into the room. They did not see the girl in the bathtub.

Rushing to the street they located Patricia Hurley who had the door of the room unlocked. She saw the body of the young woman submerged by the water.

Just what caused this tragedy is the employer of the girl the police would not say.





TO RECONSTRUCT SOCIAL MISFITS

Many Backward Children Who Are Not Defectives

MAY BE USEFUL CITIZENS

Address by Dr. A. E. Schmitt at Conference of Association For Study and Education of Exceptional Children

Philander P. Claxton, United States federal commissioner of education, presided at the third annual conference of the National Association for the Study and Education of Exceptional Children. Thirty-one states were represented by physicians and educators.

Ungraded classes in the public schools are commonly supposed to care for defectives only. Probably they contain more exceptional, or sub-normal, than abnormal. This association hopes to make the distinction clear and to help the unfortunate rather than the imbecile—to reduce the great number of misfits in society," as Dr. Grossmann expressed it.

"There are many children within our schools who are backward in their mental development," said Dr. A. Emil Schmitt, president of the association, in his address. "In some cases the proportion is as high as 20 per cent; it has been reported as high as 75 per cent in one of our states. We are not concerned with defectives, who require permanent custodial care, but with the great mass who, by training, can be brought up to useful citizenship. Many of these children may be helped by special attention to environment, physical conditions, and special pedagogic training, to live useful lives. The association plans the development of useful potentialities of every child, thereby eliminating the factors which make for the unstable, erratic, shiftless and inefficient members."

"In our physique we inherit tendencies rather than disease. In our mental and moral makeup it is rather the tendency than the disease state which is transmitted. Thus, in the development of the child physically, mentally and morally we can institute practical measures in the school by medical care, change in the social surroundings and educational training, so that the balance may be turned to normal, effective growth of body and mind instead of to lowered vitality and mental

talities. The backward, the nervous or the overbright child is no more the concern of the educator alone; it has become the concern of physicians, the psychologist and the sociologist. Besides good working knowledge in the specialties of eye, ear, nose and throat, internal conditions and pediatrics, the school physician of the future should be equipped in neurology and psychology.

"On account of the dearth of teachers for training these special children the association inaugurated a series of lectures in the past summer for regular teachers, who desired this preparation. I think it should be made a part of every teacher's training to acquire a deeper insight of the general medical aspect of pupils. More and more attention is being paid to the vocational training for boys and girls, particularly the training of home makers among generation of girls, as the most powerful means of combating the divorce evil and general discontent among the female sex."

"The association owes its origin to a clinic established 12 years ago by Dr. Macmillan, F. E. Ross, who has since undertaken the study and education of a nervous and peculiar boy. The work proceeded rapidly and in 1905 the association was formed which took over the work and has since maintained it. It is a school for crippled children, type Plainfield. Fees are charged but no pupil is refused on account of inability to pay, in fact, so many cases have been treated free or for nominal fees, that the school has been run at a loss. Dr. Grossmann reserves himself for special lectures on the creation of a central information bureau and reference library, to general propaganda and to pedagogical laboratory work. His son has charge of the school at a salary of \$400, which he has drawn less than one-half."

Dr. Grossmann has prepared a classification of children other than normal, which the association has adopted and which will be employed hereafter in scientific designation. He calls children who differ only slightly from the normal type "pseudo-stypical." His atypical children consist of those who have hereditary congenital age human type, from hereditary congenital or environmental causes. He classes children as imbeciles, perverts, feebleminded, and those who are "borderline." "It is unfortunate that the public interest is so morbidly fastened upon the problem of the feebleminded and the defective," said Dr. Grossmann, in addressing the conference. "As this work represents a type which does not consider the 'school problem'; it is rather a social problem, a psychopathic problem, a medical. The special ungraded classes have largely been used for disposing of the mentally defective. As a makeshift such an arrangement may pass. There can be no objection to preliminary measures which may lead to more radical provisions, and in a way these classes may be used as educational clearing houses as it were until a better plan can be adopted, but we must face the issues squarely and state the case properly."

"We must have an agreement upon a proper classification and terminology in speaking of exceptional children. There should be connected with every public school system a pedagogical clinic where children of difficult mentality or difficult management can be examined by pedagogical and psychological experts, in connection with the chief of medical school inspection. Such cases as would seem to be unfit for maintenance in the public school system should be referred to a state board for a thorough examination and classification by specially trained experts. This board should have power either to return the child to the public school system with proper advice as to its condition, or to place it in an institution under custodial care such as would fit the case."

"Legislation should be developed which would modify and extend the compulsory laws so that they shall apply to all children of schools, with the exception and provide for their training."

"There should be provisions in every school system to meet the special needs of the exceptionally bright child and of the slow child; special help, either by more individualized work or by the establishment of ungraded classes, should be

extended to retarded or otherwise handicapped children; and special classes and special schools with modified and re-adjusted courses of instruction should be developed so as to give opportunities to children of special aptitudes to develop along the line of their strongest powers. "Not only should our public school system recognize these differences in aptitudes in the children, but it should study them carefully so that the pupils may be guided in the selection of their vocation and life work on the basis of their special aptitudes. The vocational guidance, determined by physio-psychological tests, will materially reduce the great number of misfits in society."

GRAHAM GEMS. One egg, 1/2 cup sugar, 2 table-spoonfuls molasses, 3 table-spoonfuls melted butter, 1 cup sour milk or buttermilk, 1/2 teaspoon soda, 1 cup sifted graham flour, 1 cup sifted wheat flour, 1/2 teaspoon salt.

DRESSED CELERY. Wash, scrape and cut celery in thin slices. Mix with cream dressing made by mixing 1/2 table-spoonful each of salt and mustard, 3/4 table-spoonful of sugar, 1 egg slightly beaten, 2 1/2 table-spoonfuls of butter and 3/4 cup of cream, then add 1/4 cup of vinegar very slowly. Cook over hot water, stirring constantly until mixture thickens. Strain and cool.

TO REDUCE THE FLOW OF ORATORY

Time Limit For After Dinner Speeches is Advocated

BELL TO SOUND TIME

Ten Minutes For Banquets, Twenty for Sermons, Thirty for Political Addresses—The Public Speaking Club in Action

(New York Herald.)
Ten minutes for after dinner speeches, twenty for sermons, thirty for political addresses. This all must be if the country hears the appeal issued by Greenville Kleiser, director of the Public Speaking Club of America, which trains its gung from the streets of the West Side Young Men's Christian Association.

Truly it might be regarded as a Christian act, certain of the cynics say, if life imprisonment were given to each of the "We have with us tonight" union who would talk beyond the beating of the gong. Mr. Kleiser means business, for he has sent his manifesto to senators, politicians, secretaries of societies, lawyers, editors and orators.

"My time has expired," will say the postprandial ponderosity of the future. And—bang goes the bell and up rises the sergeant prepared to take vengeance.

Edward L. Wertheim was in charge yesterday of the abate talk office and said that he had every reason to believe that the new movement would have the support of a long suffering public.

"First of all," said he, "we would cut down the apologetic introduction or cut it out altogether. No more 'By, friends, or—ah—um—um—this is indeed a great surprise that I should be called upon to—' Great disadvantages—um—um—not accustomed to public speaking. Did not know, 'pon honor, that I was to be asked until a few minutes ago, to—' in the position of the old lady who, or the darky, who, or the old maid who said, or the little boy that thought—er—um—ah—"

Waste Many Weary Minutes
"By the time the average after dinner speaker gets his extemporaneous speech out of his system many weary minutes pass. He might reduce the time considerably by dropping the introduction and plunging into his subject."

"It may be that the small attendance at some churches is due to too long sermons, although, needless to say, sermons seem to be more concise. Thirty minutes is surely enough for any candidate to possess the finger of pride, to extend the digit of scorn, to proclaim himself the simple son of the plain people."

"Why do you ask editors to help in this reform?"
"Editors do not often make speeches at banquets," was the answer.
"But are not editors often prolix on paper?"

"One thing I like about the Herald is that it prints on one page short, concise summaries of the news. One by reading this may select what he desires to read in more detail. Mr. Kleiser in an address, in which the Public Speaking Club was opened for the season last night, spoke of the injury which may be done to the mind, of the interference with success which comes from prolonged reading of newspapers. In the Becker trial accounts for instance, many columns were employed. It is impossible for the average man to keep up with all that detail."

Appeal For Short Speeches
The appeal to the members of public opinion, including senators who ask leave to print in the Congressional Record, is concise and explicit.

"Your earnest co-operation," it reads, "is solicited in a proposal to establish a time limit for speeches. It is generally acknowledged that speechmaking is too frequently lacking in brevity and conciseness. It is, therefore, proposed that at all meetings, public dinners, business conferences and similar occasions each speaker be allotted a definite number of minutes, and that he be promptly notified of the expiration of his time. It is further proposed that the officers of every organization where there is public speaking cooperate in this movement to shorten speeches and whenever possible to use definite and if necessary rigid means for obviating speeches of wearisome and inordinant length."

ENGLISH M. P. AUTHOR OF PLAY
To Be Seen at the Opera House Next Week.

One of the authors of A Butterfly on the Wheel, which will be seen in this city on next Friday and Saturday, is a member of the British parliament. He formerly lived in America, where he was employed as an actor. He then went to England, studied law and later entered politics. Much of the interest in the trial scene of A Butterfly on the Wheel is due to his knowledge of the law and the conduct of the court and his skill as a playwright.

The sheds are too near the tracks used by immigrant passenger trains to be considered safe, and as they are not used at present there is no objection to their removal. The commission also decided to offer for sale by auction on Saturday, November 23, a city lot at the foot of Duke street, near Pitt, for which there have been several applications.

E. G. Evans, former manager and chief engineer of the road is in the city giving the commissioners the benefit of his experience in their work of preparing the affairs of the road for the transfer.

A happy event will take place on Monday evening next in the rooms of the association when one of the girls will be united in marriage in the presence of immediate friends, and the members of the committee of supervision.

THE PRICE OF MILK

Although it has been reported on several occasions that the price of milk in St. John would be advanced from four cents a pint and seven cents a quart to five cents a pint and eight cents a quart, milk is still retailing at the former prices, but it is now said on good authority that the price will be advanced before very long.

A prominent dairyman told a Times reporter that the milk supply for St. John was rather limited. High freight rates from one section, he said, had to do with this. He was of the opinion that the opening of the Valley Railway would alleviate matters considerably.

The matter of raising the price of the milk was being discussed now by the farmers and dairymen, and some wholesale dealers had already advanced their prices. Farmers of Sussex and vicinity have formed a milk shippers association and decided to advance their prices five cents a can for milk and twenty-five cents a can for cream, these advances to hold until September 1 of next year.

MARRIED IN CHIPMAN

An interesting wedding took place yesterday at Chipman when Miss M. Laura Darragh became the bride of Andrew Norman Mungall, resident engineer with the Transcontinental Railway in Cochrane, Ont. The ceremony was performed by Rev. Edwin Smythe, at the Chipman House, of which the bride's brother, Wm. C. Darragh, is proprietor. They were unattended.

After the wedding a dainty lunch was served and later Mrs. and Mrs. Mungall left by train for St. John, passing through here to Montreal, where they will spend a few days before going to their future home in Cochrane. They have a large number of friends and that they are held in esteem by them was shown in the variety of remembrances received in honor of the event.

PHILLIPS CASE TO BE GONE INTO ON TUESDAY MORNING

Papers Coming From Ottawa—Today's Proceedings in Police Court

Herman G. Phillips, who was brought to the city from Marlboro, Mass., yesterday by Detective Killen, was arraigned in the police court yesterday afternoon, charged with obtaining money under false pretences, theft and forgery. He pleaded not guilty and was remanded to jail. The preliminary hearing in the case was to have been begun this morning, but G. Earl Logan, acting for the department of justice, asked for an adjournment as several papers which were to be used in the case had not arrived from Ottawa. His Honor granted the adjournment until Tuesday morning next at eleven o'clock. John Murphy, aged 23, charged with being drunk, breaking windows in John McCluskey's house in Carmarthen street, and also using threatening language to Mr. McCluskey, was fined \$8 or two months in jail for drunkenness and was remanded on the other charges. The complainant said that Murphy went to his house last night, and when refused admittance, threw a stone through a window and threatened to break every window in the house. Albert Elliott, aged 27, charged with lying and lurking in a barn of Metolf street, and also with being a common vagrant, was fined \$6 or two months in jail with hard labor. One prisoner, charged with drunkenness, was fined \$8 or two months in jail.

FIRST WINTER PORT STEAMERS NOW ON WAY TO ST. JOHN

Empress of Ireland and Corsican Left the Other Side Today

In about a week the winter port season at this port will be inaugurated. Workmen are busily engaged around the wharves at Sand Point getting things in shape for the arrival of the first steamer, and getting the cables repaired for the shafts that occupy them during the season. Within a few days the employees of the company are expected to arrive from Montreal and Quebec.

The first two steamers, scheduled to arrive on the opening day of the season, are leaving the other side today. The S. S. Empress of Ireland will be the first C. P. R. vessel, and the S. S. Corsican the first Allan liner. Both are due here on or about Nov. 22 with large cargoes and quite a few passengers. Both will come via Halifax. With the arrival of these two steamers the season will have begun. The outlook generally is for an exceptionally busy and successful period. Several of the steamship companies have arranged for the sailing this winter, and it is predicted that the business will be far exceed that of any previous year.

WARNING TO BOYS WHO STEAL PAPERS

A lad named Jacob Holtzman was arrested this morning by Detective Lucas for stealing copies of The Telegraph from the doorway of E. G.
