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CATHOLIC MAN ABROAD
LAST NIGHT'S SUBJECT

Father Borgmann's Sermon in The Men's Retreat in St. Peter's Church

At the services last evening conducted with the men's retreat in St. Peter's church, Rev. Henry Borgmann, C. S. R., delivered a practical and forcible sermon on "The Catholic Man Abroad," a companion discourse to that which he gave the previous evening on "The Catholic Man at Home." The words were spoken before the church was well filled with men, and the retreat thus far has been a distinct success. Tonight's subject was chosen by the men, as the services on Sunday evening will be for both women and men.

Father Borgmann spoke strongly on the necessity of the church having a strong force of laymen cherishing her interests and devoted to her prosperity, true-hearted sons of God interested in the development of the Catholic faith, and having "Catholic hearts and a Catholic heart."

"They try to tell me," said he, "that France has among 30,000,000 of her population 20,000,000 Catholics—France a Catholic country. Why is it ridiculous. There's no truth in it. Who will tell me that with that number of Catholics in the proper sense with the words France would have been driven from France 100,000 innocent, defenceless women, sisters of mercy and charity? Dr. Portugal, which they have said is a Catholic country, if there had been men there with true Catholic hearts, would they have permitted the slaughter of the nuns and sisters in their convents? The church wants Catholic laymen. Twenty five years ago when I was at college I remember reading that a priest in France wrote that the women were faithful in their church, but that the men never went near the communion rail. What does this prove? What followed from this? Demons in the form of men have been permitted to take the reins of government and the persecution of the church and her interests has resulted."

"There was no necessity," said the speaker, "of openly crying out to the world, shouting it to the four winds whenever one changed to wander. 'I am a Catholic.' The fact that one lived up to his duties as a practical Catholic and took an interest in the affairs of the church was sufficient. His holiness and respectability before anything else the church needed Catholic laymen and this was becoming more evident every day. Among them must be conversant with the doctrines and the matters pertaining to the church. To families themselves with Catholic truths they should support Catholic papers.

"Many men could be found, said Father Borgmann, who could easily enumerate the different baseball players, their records for a decade past, and do the same with regard to the names of the men who had familiarized themselves with something more beneficial, a knowledge of God's holy teachings, that was beyond most of them. He urged affiliation with fraternal societies, particularly insurance societies and fraternal associations with Catholic members. The lack of interest among Catholic laymen in Europe was becoming more common all the time it seemed to be finding a place as well in the United States, and it was a blessing from God, he thought, that a feeling of sympathy was being aroused towards the suffragettes, for they would better interest themselves in the things of Christ in a country government than did the men. Twenty-five years ago had there been suffragettes proceeding with their cause in France and Portugal, those countries would not have been lost to the church today.

"The greatest need of the church from her early ages has been Catholic laymen, Father Borgmann urged the necessity of always maintaining an interest in Catholic matters, living up to the faith, and being ready to defend the church on all occasions."

Dr. John L. Elliott, Noted Social Betterment Worker, Propounds Doctrine of Self-help—Does Not Believe in Charity

(Toronto World)

A heartfelt, inspiring and highly informative address was given by Dr. John L. Elliott, to the Canadian Club Wednesday on "Human Conservation." Dr. Elliott is a Ph. D. of Heidelberg, and one of the chief workers in social betterment work in New York. His address was of special interest to those connected with social settlement work in Toronto, where there are three centres, the Evangelia House, which operates on religious lines, and the university and Central Neighborhood House, one in West Adelaide street, and one in West Gerrard street. There are 300 boys and girls teachers in these activities.

"I bring out of my youth no memory brighter than that of the years spent with him in that work in New York," said Dr. Elliott, of Sanford Evans, who was the "strongest, finest, whitest, best citizen" he ever knew.

Dr. Elliott's methods are very practical. He does not believe in charity. "Let the women and the weak-minded do the philanthropy and the charity," he said. His method is to develop his humanity in the poor and to train them to help themselves.

"You do not regard people as human. You see the letter carrier walking down the street. You think of him as a machine for delivering letters. 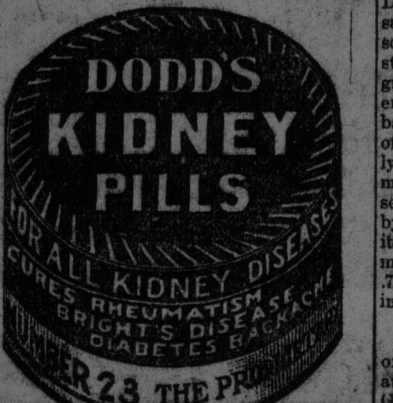

POLICE COURT TODAY

Theft Charged in Two Cases—Boys Who Gave Wrong Names to Police

James Tufts, arrested on suspicion of obtaining goods under false pretences, was arraigned before Magistrate Hilditch at the police court this morning, and after the charge was read over to him, he was remanded to jail. The charge is obtaining \$18 worth of silverware from the store of T. McAvilly & Sons in King street and also a watch valued at \$12 from the store of John De Angelis. While Mr. Magee was in the back of the store the prisoner, it is charged, picked up the articles mentioned and made off. The police were informed and McNally was locked up. The goods were also located. He was remanded to jail.

Gilbert Arsenault, a young lad, reported for listening about the corner of Brasels and Hanover streets, appeared in court and after being given a talking to by the court was sent into jail. Three other lads were reported, but they did not appear this morning. The three other boys reported were Charles Henry, George Scott and Thomas Digara. The police were unable to find these boys, and it appears now that the boys gave wrong names to the person reporting them.

Charles Cobham, Henry Coy and Allen Alberta, reported for driving teams in the city without a license, were before the court. The first two explained that they had taken out licenses and were excused. Alberta promised to take one out and was also allowed to go.
