Before his death he made a statement to the police in which he declared that no blame could be attached to Perrin, as several of the boys were skylarking and the wound was received in a purely accidental manner.

Perrin is a son of John Perrin a porter employed at the North Street station. Burke came to Halifax about a year ago from South Africa and has since been living with his aunt, Miss Mary Tobin.



# Russian Mine.

Colliery Always Was Known to Dangerous and Men Had to be

# Paid Double Wages.

YUSOVO, Russia, July 14.—An inquest into the fatal coal mine explosion of last week has revealed a terrible picture of the archaic methods of mining in vogue in Russia. It has been a matter of common knowledge for years past that the kikovsky mine was dangerous. The workmen called it "The Inferno," beworkmen called it "The Inferno," because of the prevalence of stifling gas in the workings and they would only consent to go down at double wages. The explosion itself was not of great force and a majority of the 300 men who lost their lives were burned to death or suffocated by afterdamp. It would have been possible to save all but one dozen of the men below if prompt measures had been taken, as fully one hour elapsed after the explosiion before the flames burst out. During this hour the rescuing parties waited with folded hands for information as to how and where they were to descend. Immediately after the explosion the mine engineer recklessly decended the main, haft without a mask.
