



OTTAWA, May 10.—Two Ottawa

TAFT REVIEWS CONDITIONS ON ISLAND OF PORTO RICO

Situation of Unusual Gravity—Islanders Have Forgotten Generosity of the U.S.—Latter Has Gone Too Fast in Granting Self Government.

WASHINGTON, May 11—President Taft today sent to Congress a special message recommending legislation at the present extra session, amending the Foraker act under which Porto Rico is governed. The President directs the attention of Congress to affairs on the island laying particular stress on what he terms "a situation of unusual gravity," developed through the failure of the legislative assembly of Porto Rico to pass the usual appropriation bills, leaving the island without support after June 30 next.

Porto Ricans have forgotten the council and the House of Delegates as the legislative assembly. The House of Delegates says the President, proposes itself to secure this legislation without respect to the opposition of the executive council, "or else to pull down the government."

This growing spirit shows that too great power has been vested in the delegates. The message presents an exhaustive economic review of conditions on the island, its trade and its wealth, its improved educational facilities.

PEN PICTURES OF THE CAPITAL OF SERVIA

High above the valley of the Danube looms the crumbling red-brick citadel of Belgrade, a beacon ready to set the Balkans aflame. Flanked by the Danube and the Save, it is thrust into Austrian territory like the toe of an aggressive boot, a challenge to the army that waited so long beyond the Hungarian shore.

Behind this picturesque souvenir of Turkish occupation lies Belgrade itself huddled together on a ridge like a camel's hump with the heart of the town perched on the summit and the by-streets sprawling down to the valleys on either side. It is a capital of spires and warm cream-colored buildings, modern, yet primitive, full of curious contradictions, Eastern yet Western—a little bit of Paris, a little bit of Galway, all blended in a semi-Oriental atmosphere that is likewise a relic of the days of the pashas who held their authority from Constantinople.


