SAYINGS AND DOINGS OF THE ASSEMBLY.

EXCELSIOR, March 26, 1853.

Much was said about the fisheries. Several noblemen and among the foremost were Messrs Smith and Needham—asserted that the fisheries were the most important branch of the commerce of the country.

The Secretary's one-sided Reciprocity Bill was severely handled, and no wonder, for never was there a greater insult offered by one people to another, than the American Congress would offer to the British Government.

Mr. Needham contended (and very justly, I think,) that the Americans have no equivalent to us for our fisheries, and therefore we should set out from all negotiations on the subject.

He also asserted that he had no right to negotiate with America on the subject, because he had no confidence in her, believing that she cared nothing about our interests; he therefore supported the motion made by Mr. Kerr, protesting against the right of the American Government to interfere with the fisheries of the Province.

The members of the Executive Government were willing negotiations should be carried on, and a treaty entered into by and with the consent of the Canadian Government, which they considered an equivalent. Messrs. Williston, Cutler, Hamington and Smith expressed similar views.

This expression of opinion will surprise many, and give many more. There is no doubt but the majority of the people are opposed to yielding up the fisheries, and if the Government went to the country upon this question they would be sure to find that we place ourselves in the humiliating position of the Americans in regard to reciprocal trade? The proposal is absurd, humiliating, and unpatriotic.
