# MINUTES.

THE GENERAL CONFERENCE OF "THE FREE CHRISTIAN BAPTIST CHURCH OF NEW BRUNSWICK," convened according to appointment with the Church at Tracy's Mills, Carleton County, on Saturday, 13th October, 1883, at 10 o'clock, a. m.

The session was for general conference, and was numerously attended and deeply impressive. The two hours were taken up in the relations of experience, reviews of Christian work, and exhortation to renewed work.

At two o'clock, p. m. Conference convened in business Session, the Moderator, Rev. G. A. HARTLEY, in the Chair.

Rev. G. W. McDonald, Corresponding Secretary, submitted the following Report:

### FIRST DISTRICT.

#### BROTHER MODERATOR:

The Churches composing the First District Meeting are scattered all the way from Bath to the Upper Settlements of the Tobique on the Eastern side of the River Saint John, and from Wicklow to the Mouth of the Aroostook on the West side, extending also to Fort Fairfield in the State of Maine. This section of the country gives evidence of industry and thrift; new settlements are opening up, and in those of older date indications of rapid improvement. The farms seem in a good state of cultivation; the buildings new and enlarged, and in the place of the rough roads or paths formed only by the *blaze* on the trees, made by the axe of the woodman, by which the pioneer settler found his way to and from his home, in what was once a dense wilderness, there are good turnpike roads in almost every direction. The rivers which our older brethren crossed in the log canoe, or forded on horseback, are now spanned by substantial bridges, or crossed by good ferries. The New Brunswick Railway also passes this way, so that the most remote settler can in a few hours find communication with the outer world.

The old school house has also disappeared, giving place to new and commodious buildings, thus indicating that with the growth of wealth and material prosperity come an increase of intelligence and educational advantages that must necessarily place the present and coming generations leagues in advance of the times when the Churches of this District were planted.

I wish it could be said that the interests committed to these Churches had kept pace with the secular affairs of the country, but truth forbids us this privilege; on the contrary, while the country is rapidly increasing in wealth and intelligence, the religious life of the people seems dwarfed, and in many parts of the District almost lifeless. Indeed, from what we have learned in various ways, and from information that reports of this year give us concerning these Churches, we are forced to the conclusion that they are weaker and more inefficient than when your Secretary first visited the District, fifteen years ago. We are sorry to say this, but are compelled to do so in the interest of truth. Why is it so? The Home Mission Society have spent hundreds of dollars in caring for these Churches, and much voluntary labor has also been expended. They ought to be self-supporting, and strong

enough to send out their influence to new settlements as they open up around them.

There must be a radical wrong somewhere. It would be well for us to dig deep, and finding the root of the difficulty, devise such means as will bring about the desired change. There are many good brethren and sisters in these Churches who are desiring a better state of things, and are praying for the change to come; and come it will ere long, either by this territory passing from under our influence or being made better by proper effort and the blessing of God.

The annual session of this District Meeting was held with the Church at Fort Fairfield, Maine. Nine Churches reported at the meeting, as follows:—Wicklow, Bath, Upper Kent, Middle Kent, New Canaan, Arthurette, Andover, Portage, Salmon River, and Fort Fairfield, Maine. Two of these (Bath and Wicklow) have Rev. J. Perry for their pastor. Rev. J. Henderson and Charles F. Rideout reside in this District, and give what aid they can to the Churches. Bro. Abraham Rideout has also spent some time among these Churches.

Rev. A. Taylor's labors, I presume, will be reported by the Home Mission Society, under whose directions he spent some time with these Churches, contributing greatly to their comfort and strength.

New Canaan Church has just completed and dedicated a new meeting house, which has been built mainly by the efforts of our aged brother, Rev. E. Sipprell. The society and community ought to be, and no doubt are very grateful to Bro. Sipprell for his unwearied efforts to erect this neat and comfortable house in which this people can worship God. The Lord reward him for his work and labor of love.

No additions are reported; there is a decrease of two.

## SECOND DISTRICT

Bro. W. B. Wiggins was licensed to preach at the session of the District Meeting. Revs. B. Colpitta, G. T. Hartley, Henry Hartt, and E. Sippell, with Licentiates A. Rideout, and Aaron Hartt, reside within the limits of this District. They have had no pastorate, but have been working zealously and profitably with the

Churches of the District, helping Churches having no pastors, and also giving valuable assistance to the pastors of Churches in especial effort.

### THIRD DISTRICT

Sends reports from sixteen of its twenty-seven Churches. Four of these have additions by baptism, viz.:—Canterbury, 25; Lower Prince William, 12; Campbell Settlement, 3; Fredericton, 4; total, 44. Fourteen Churches had pastoral care all or a part of the time; three prayer meetings; fifteen conference meetings.

Revs. W. Kinghorn, B. Trafton, John Jones, with Licentiate Sleep and Currie, reside in this District. Their names are not mentioned in the Clerk's Report; probably no Church reported their labors.

Bro. Kinghorn has made visits to Kingsley, and also regularly

attended Hartland Church part of the year. Rev. G. B. Trafton has done good work for the Lord at Canterbury and Hillman Settlement; at the former place he was assisted by Bro. W. B. Wiggins and Bro. Sharp Baker. The Lord abundantly blessed the labors of these brethren; thirty-five were baptized, twenty-five of whom joined the Church at the latter place. Bro. Trafton baptized a number, and the Church was greatly revived. He also baptized a number at McElroy's Ridge and vicinity. A revival is still in progress at this place; the results will no doubt be reported next year. Others of the brethren have, I presume, been working as best they could; if so, the Lord of the harvest will notice and reward.

Churches at Dorrington Hill, Grahamsville, Hamilton Mountain, and Lower Canterbury did not report.

#### FOURTH DISTRICT.

The Fourth District has formally reported seventeen Churches this year; ten of that number were represented at the yearly meeting; four of these report additions by baptism, viz.—Fredericton Junction, Patterson Settlement, Waasis, and Lincoln; seven have pastoral care; three have weekly prayer meetings; nine have monthly conference. Thirty-eight were baptized during the year.

Besides these, the list contains the following Churches, some of which have not reported for a number of years;—Upper Hampstead, Greenfield, Geary, French Lake, Douglas Valley, and Otnabog, (colored). Whether these have an existence or not, as

Churches, I cannot say; probably some of them have become invisible.

Those reported this year are somewhat encouraged, and there seems to be an increase of faith and spiritual strength. The Sabbath Schools maintained by these Churches are certainly an encouraging feature in the church life, and gives us hope for their future that otherwise could not be entertained.

Waasis Church has been much refreshed under the labors of Bro. G. F. Currie, Licentiate of Third District Meeting, who has also visited Oromocto Church, and given them great encouragement. Victoria Church has been helped by Bros. Grass and J. S. Porter; and Greenfield has also been assisted by these two brethren. On the whole there seems to be an improveemet over last year's report. The net increase during the year is twenty.

### FIFTH DISTRICT.

The Fifth District reports fifteen Churches; the list contained fourteen. Seven have been added by baptism; ten Churches have received regular ministerial care; two have weekly prayer meetings, and ten sustain conference meetings.

The aggregate of all the care received by these twelve Churches is one year and eight months—a very small amount of labor for Churches, scattered as they are over a large area, and with many natural disadvantages hindering the ministers in their visits. Yet small as this is, it is a much more favorable showing than last year's report gives, as only one or two Churches were then reported as having regular ministerial care. Several visits from different brethren have helped these Churches. Brethren G. W. Clark and O. N. Mott made a lengthy visit to Fourth Church, Hampstead. Rev. T. W. Carpenter baptized seven as the result of their labors.

Rev. J. A. Robertson spent some time with the First Church at Kars, previous to their engaging Bro. McKenzie.

First Church, Johnston, was visited and encouraged by Rev. J. Perry, T. W. Carpenter, T. S. Vanwart, and Bros. Jones, A. Porter, G. N. Clark, and others.

Rev. T. S. Vanwart has visited Second Church, Wickham, quite regularly, but not in the capacity of Pastor. His labors are appreciated highly. This Church finished and dedicated a new house of worship last March. They miss greatly one of their oldest members, and Deacon of the Church, Bro. Daniel Carpenter.

First Church at Wickham reports profitable visits from Bro. T. S. Vanwart.

The Church at Kars was encouraged by visits from Rev. W. Downey and Bros. G. N. Foster, Erb, and Clark.

Licentiate H. H. Cosman has made visits to some of these Churches, which tended to their encouragement.

The Clerk of this District has sent a lengthy abstract of Church reports. A careful examination shows an improvement in the state of the Churches; still they give evidence of weakness and discouragement. It could not well be otherwise. The Holy Spirit works through appointed instrumentalities, and Churches can prosper only through the use of such means as He has given. The regular preaching of the Word, pastoral visitations, the weekly prayer meeting, the administration of the Lord's Supper, are as necessary now as in the days of primitive Christianity; and the Churches that neglect such means must suffer the sure penalty of weakness, barrenness and inefficiency. We do not, however, attach too much blame to the members of these Churches, as, since the death of Bro. Merritt, there has been but two ordained ministers residing among them, until last Spring, when their force was increased by the coming of Rev. T. S. Vanwart, whose labors have been of great value to many of the Churches. May the Lord encourage them much more during the coming year.

—Bro. A. C. Thompson received License to preach at the session of this District Meeting. The brethren of this District adhere strictly, it appears, to the Pastorate arrangements, and are thus enabled to divide their labor quite evenly among the Churches ; none

of the seventeen Churches having had over one half year's labor, and no one less than one quarter. Had they more ministers all the Churches would probably secure help under this arrangement.

### SEVENTH DISTRICT.

The Seventh District, the youngest of the family, seems to be in the vigor of life, and full of youthful energy, which, if maintained, will soon carry her far in advance of her older sisters.

Thirteen Churches compose this District Meeting; six of them have additions by baptism, viz.:—St. John, 17; Portland, 13; Carleton, 11; Beaver Harbor, 1; North Head (Grand Manan), 30; Seal Cove, 17.

The Churches having Pastors seem to be in a healthy condition. The Church at Saint Martins—a weak interest always—has grown more weak by the removal of many of its members, and is scarcely visible as a Church.

In this Seventh District there are many natural disadvantages in the way of the ministers who care for some of these Churches, many of them being situated on the sea coast, and upon the Islands of Charlotte County, making them very difficult to reach, especially during the winter season. Yet the Lord has enabled the brethren to help those Churches much during the year, and they are in a much more healthy state than at the close of last year.

The Churches in Saint John, Portland, and Carleton seem to be

encouraged, and looking to the Lord in faith and hope for an increase of strength and an ingathering of souls.

The total number added to the Churches by baptism is 311.

There are 144 Churches, 77 of which have had Pastors during the year; 79 maintain monthly conference meetings; and 44 have weekly prayer meetings.

Rev. T. H. Siddall, Corresponding Delegate from the Free Baptist General Conference of Nova Scotia, expressed his pleasure in being the messenger from his Conference. He brought the hearty salutations of his Conference. He said, we were glad to receive at our last Conference your Delegate Rev. A. Taylor, who rendered efficient and appreciative service. Also Rev. Joseph McLeod, as visitor, who to us is one with you. Ministers 15, Churches 35, membership 3,415; additions during the year 68; net gain 30.

For denominational purposes last year we received \$9,000. The Women's F. M. Aid Society are doing a noble work. Last year they raised \$572. In Home Mission work we are centering our attention upon a single weak interest, to make it strong, instead of scattering our efforts upon a number of interests at the same time. In Education we are not altogether satisfied with the results of the past. Our people are firm in the demand for an educated Ministry. Many of our young men have found homes away from us. We are hoping by and through the Convention to secure an Academy or school of our own. Our last Conference was an excellent one. We have a bright out-look, and are looking for great things from the Lord. We trust the unity existing between the two Conferences may be strengthened and continued. We ask a continuance of the delegation.

Rev. A. Taylor, Delegate to the Free Baptist General Conference of Nova Scotia submitted the following Report:

**BROTHER MODERATOR.**—Your Delegate, appointed to attend the last session of the General Conference of the Free Baptists of Nova Scotia, respectfully begs leave to report that he attended to the duty assigned him, and was glad he had the opportunity of so doing. The Conference was held in Kemptville, in Yarmouth County, a country place about eighteen or twenty miles from Yarmouth town. Rev. William Knowlin met your delegate at the railway station in Yarmouth, kindly cared for him, gave him a seat in his carriage and conveyed him to the place of Conference. The brethren gave your delegate a warm reception, gave him a place in their sittings, and very kindly invited him to exercise his gift among them, which invitation he was only too willing to accept. Your delegate was soon joined by Rev. J. McLeod, whom it was a real pleasure to have present. He reported the Conference as best he could, giving them a relation of its present standing, future prospects, and advancing work. He took part in a number of the meetings; and in the ladies' meeting he was called upon to explain the condition and working of the Ladies' F. M. Society in New Brunswick. He responded to the call, as our sisters had no representative present, and can only say that the ladies' meeting was an excellent one, and he was glad to be there as a speaker, for

the Lord was with us of a truth. The Conference throughout was an excellent one, and its business of session done in harmony and love. Your delegate need not state the business done, for it is so much like our own that you understand it all. The Convention scheme was adopted by the Conference, and it only remains for you to adopt it as well, and then the union will be closer and the work more effective. Your delegate feels satisfied that the tide is turning in Nova Scotia, and a grand work will be done in that Province for our God. Your delegate is only sorry to report that he was very sick on Saturday and Sunday of the Conference, and could not attend any of the meetings of those days. The family where he made his home for the time being were very kind, and did all in their power to make his condition easy and comfortable. Their kindness in this respect will not soon be forgotten by him. Bro. J. Sturges, M. D., hearing of his illness, came immediately to his assistance, and by the blessing of God, and the skill of the doctor, he was soon on his feet again, and ready to take a part in the meetings of Monday and Monday evening. If he was unable to preach to the congregation on Sunday, he inclines to the opinion that it was all right, for his very dear brother in Christ, Rev. J. McLeod, more than supplied his place, and preached (as he afterwards understood) a most effective and eloquent sermon to a highly appreciative audience. The adage says, "There is no great loss but there is some small gain." The adage ought to be reversed, for the loss was the smaller and the gain the greater on this special occasion. On Monday evening was held a consecration meeting of great power, and this session of the Conference closed with a renewed determination to labor harder and to do more for the Master. Your delegate asked, on your behalf, a continuation of the correspondence, and the request was most cheerfully complied with.

E. C. Freeze, Esq., from the Committee on Temperance, submitted the following Report:

**BROTHER MODERATOR.**—Your Committee on Temperance, beg to report as follows:

As a Dehomination the F. C. Baptists of this Province, from their organization, now over half a century, have demanded total abstinence from its members, and approved of prohibition for the State. It is on record, as a part of their faith, that no Christian can use intoxicating liquors as a beverage, and be held guiltless according to God's Word; it was therefore made a standing rule, that no person who used intoxicating liquors as a beverage should be admitted to Church fellowship, which is sufficient evidence of the decided opinion held by this denomination on the temperance question.

Your Committee are glad to be able to report that stringent Legislative enactments have been passed by the Parliament of Canada, and as an evidence of the strong feeling in favor of temperance, we find that more than half the Counties of the Province have adopted the Canada Temperance Act, which gives the authorities power to prohibit the sale of spirituous liquors as a beverage. The Act passed during the last session of Parliament, and which

comes in force, generally, on 1st May next, and on 1st January next where the C. T. Act has been adopted, provides for the more effectual enforcement of the C. T. Act, giving additional powers for the enforcement of that Act.

\* We think it but right to recommend and urge that the members of this denomination use their individual and collective influence whenever and wherever they can for the enforcement of these restrictive temperance enactments.

There can be no question that we now have sufficient legal restraint to control the trade in alcoholic liquors in this country, but it requires union of effort on the part of the moral and temperance people to see that the laws are properly enforced, and that some officials do their duty. Encouragement should be given for the organization of temperance bodies for the purpose of securing the enforcement of these laws.

In retrospecting the past we cannot but rejoice at the onward progress made in the temperance cause, not only in Canada, but in every Anglo-Saxon country. We can but believe that this reform will continue its onward movement until, like other great reforms, the evil and curse of the rum traffic will be, by the moral sense of a Christian people, wiped out of existence. This denomination has not been the least factor in this Province in pressing forward the cause.

Your Committee entertains the opinion that an increasing determination is manifestly among our people not to cease their labors in this direction until the prohibition of the manufacture, importation and sale of spirituous liquors of all kinds has been secured by law and enforced by the proper authorities. To this end let every Christian continue to ask God to bless the efforts of his people in the overthrow of this "crime of crimes."

BROTHER MODERATOR.—Your Committee, appointed by Resolution 13 of last Conference to Consolidate the Constitution, Bye-Laws and Rules of Order of the General Conference, District Meetings, and our different Societies, beg leave to submit the following Report:

## CONSTITUTION

OF THE

### FREE CHRISTIAN BAPTIST GENERAL CONFERENCE OF NEW BRUNSWICK.

ARTICLE 1.—This Association shall be called "THE FREE CHRISTIAN BAPTIST GENERAL CONFERENCE OF NEW BRUNSWICK."

ART. 2.—This Conference shall be composed of its Ordained Ministers and Licentiates, its Officers, the Members of the Board of Managers, the Sabbath School Agent, and Delegates from the several District Meetings, and such persons as the Conference may elect Honorary Members.

ART. 3.—The Officers of the Conference shall be: a Moderator, and an Assistant Moderator, who shall be elected annually; a Recording Secretary and an Assistant; a Corresponding Secretary, a Treasurer, and an Auditor, who shall hold office during the pleasure of the Conference.

ART. 4.—The duties of the Officers of this Conference shall be as follows:

(a) It shall be the duty of the Moderator to preside over the Sessions of the Conference, and perform such other official acts as the Conference may direct by its Bye-Laws, Rules of Order or votes.

(b) The Assistant Moderator shall preside in the absence of the Moderator, or at his request.

(c) It shall be the duty of the Recording Secretary to keep a true

and faithful record of all the business transacted in each sitting, and furnish a copy of the same for publication when required.

(d) It shall be the duty of the Corresponding Secretary to conduct the official correspondence of the Conference, and to prepare an Annual Report of the state of religion in the Churches, and read it in the first business session of the Conference.

(e) It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive all moneys forwarded or paid to him for the Conference, to pay to the order of the Conference such sums as may be required, as long as there are funds in the Treasury; and to render at each annual meeting a just and proper account of all moneys received and paid, stating from whom received and to whom paid.

(f) The duties of the Auditor shall be to carefully examine and report upon such books and accounts as shall be referred to him by the Conference.

(g) The Assistant Secretary shall assist the Recording Secretary in the discharge of his duties.

ART. 5.—There shall be an Executive of seven members, who shall have the general charge of the affairs of the denomination between the Annual Sessions of Conference. The Executive shall act for Conference, such action to be subject to the approval of Conference at its next Annual or Special Session. The Executive shall be composed of the Moderator, Recording Secretary, and five members elected annually by ballot.

ART. 6. The Churches composing the Conference shall be divided into seven Districts (as at present), and Conference shall have power to add to, alter or amend the number and bounds of the said Districts from time to time, as occasion may require.

ART. 7.—Each District shall be entitled to a representation in Conference, consisting of two Delegates, by virtue of its organization, who shall be the Clerk and Treasurer of the District, and one additional Delegate for every four hundred Church members.

ART. 8. The duties and powers of the Conference shall be:

- (a) To appoint its own Officers and Executive.
- (b) To appoint a Board of Managers, and such other Agents or Agencies as may be found necessary for the transaction of the business of the Conference.
- (c) To appoint the Officers of all Mission and Benevolent Societies in connection with the Conference.
- (d) To receive and act upon all communications, requests or appeals that may come through the Districts composing the Conference, or from the decisions thereof.
- (e) To deliberate on all such points of doctrine and practice as the welfare of the Districts and Churches may require, and to give such decision thereon as it may believe is warranted by Scripture.
- (f) To devise any measures not incompatible with the Word of God, that it may consider advantageous to the interests of the cause of Christ.

(g) To make such Bye-Laws and Rules of Order, not repugnant to this Constitution, as it may think necessary for the government of the Conference.

ART. 9.—The Conference shall hold one General Session yearly. Special Sessions may be held when necessary.

ART. 10.—This Constitution may be altered or amended at any Annual Session of the Conference, by a four-fifths vote of the members present; provided that notice of such intended alteration or amendment has been duly given at a previous session, and published in the Minutes.

## BYE-LAWS

OF THE

### FREE CHRISTIAN BAPTIST GENERAL CONFERENCE OF NEW BRUNSWICK.

ARTICLE 1.—The Annual Session of this Conference shall commence on the Saturday of or preceding the full moon nearest the first day of October in each year.

ART. 2.—The meeting held on Saturday at 9 30 o'clock, a. m., shall be a Social Conference, and shall be presided over by the Pastor of the Church with which the Conference has convened; or in the absence of the Pastor, by the Moderator of the General Conference.

ART. 3.—The Business Session of this Conference shall commence on Saturday at 2 o'clock, p. m., and shall be presided over by the Moderator or the Assistant Moderator, or in their absence by the next preceding Moderator present, until after the election of the new Moderator.

ART. 4.—Twelve Ministers and six lay members of Conference shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. A less number may adjourn from time to time till a quorum is present.

ART. 5.—Each session and each sitting of the Conference shall be opened and closed with prayer.

ART. 6.—The election of a Moderator and an Assistant Moderator shall take place in the first session on Monday.

ART. 7.—Each ordained Minister present shall be eligible to the office of Moderator, and each member of Conference present shall have the right to vote. The voting shall be done by ballot; and the Recording Secretary shall count the votes, and declare the candidate, who has the largest number, to be Moderator elect for the ensuing year, and the candidate who has the next greatest number, to be Assistant Moderator.

ART. 8.—The Moderator shall associate with himself two or more

Elders, whose names he shall announce to the Conference, who shall be a Committee to regulate the time and place of meeting for worship during the session, and after consultation with them, appoint Ministers to preach on the Sabbath, and at other times, if necessary.

ART. 9.—All letters addressed to the Conference shall be examined by the Moderator and the Secretaries, and if by them considered proper to be brought before the Conference, they shall be distinctly read in Conference before being referred to appropriate Committees.

ART. 10.—All Ministers of the General Conference or District Meetings are required to attend each Annual Session of Conference; any one failing to do so subjects himself to the censure of the Conference, unless satisfactory reason for absence be given.

ART. 11.—Each Church in the Denomination is required to recognise the acts of the Conference; and govern itself accordingly.

ART. 12.—The Conference may hold correspondence by delegate or otherwise, with other religious bodies.

ART. 13.—At each annual session of the Conference, Committees shall be appointed on the following subjects:—Education, Sabbath Schools, Temperance, and Observance of the Sabbath, their reports to be submitted to the next session of the Conference. Committees on Finance, Correspondence, and Appeals, and Special Committees may be appointed to report at such times as the Conference shall determine.

ART. 14.—Every Church of the Conference is expected to pay annually, a sum equal to twenty-five cents for each of its members into the General Conference Fund; and it shall be the duty of the Deacons of such Churches to see to the collecting and forwarding the same to the Treasurers of their respective District Meetings, at or before the annual session thereof.

ART. 15.—The Board of Managers shall be appointed at each annual session, and shall consist of six members of the Free Christian Baptist Church, who shall be the General Agent of the Conference, and shall have control and management of all property and the monetary business of the Conference. The members of the Board of Managers shall continue in office for one year, or until a new Board of Managers is appointed.

ART. 16.—The Board of Managers shall appoint from its own members a Chairman, Secretary and Treasurer. The Chairman shall preside over all meetings of the Board; the Secretary shall keep a true and faithful record of its meetings and business; the Treasurer shall receive all amounts due the Conference for principal or interest, and give receipts therefor, and take charge of all funds, titles of property, and papers of all kinds, entrusted to the Board by the Conference, and keep a faithful account thereof, and render the same to each annual session of the General Conference.

ART. 17.—The Treasurer shall give bonds for the faithful performance of his duties, in such sum as the Board of Managers may

determine, and shall pay to the order of the Board all such sums as may be required, so long as there are funds in the Treasury. When requested so to do by the Board, or by the General Conference, the Treasurer shall deliver all funds, papers and property of any kind, belonging to the Conference, which may be in his possession, to such person as he may be directed.

ART. 18.—The Board of Managers shall hold its regular annual meeting for the transaction of business, at the time and place of holding the annual session of the General Conference. Three members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business; a less number may adjourn.

ART. 19.—The Chairman of the Board of Managers may call special meetings at any time, by giving two weeks' notice thereof in the *Religious Intelligencer*, or by written notice forwarded to the Post-Office address of each member two weeks before said meeting.

ART. 20.—The Board of Managers shall have authority to appoint such agents or agencies for the current year, for the transaction of any business under its control, as it may think necessary, and may pay a reasonable sum for such service.

ART. 21.—All Leases, Deeds, Conveyances, Contracts, or other written documents, executed under the sanction of the Board of Managers, certified under the hand of the Secretary thereof, and having the Seal of the Conference affixed, together with the signatures of the Moderator and Recording Secretary, shall be considered valid.

ART. 22.—The Board of Managers shall have power to make any rules for its own government that it may think necessary, provided always, that such rules shall not be contrary to the Constitution or any Bye-Law of the Conference.

#### LICENTIATES.

ART. 23.—There shall be in connection with the denomination three classes of Licenses, known as Church, District Meeting, and General Conference Licenses.

ART. 24.—Any brother in good standing with a Church in the denomination, professing to be called of God to the work of the Ministry, may receive from the Church, by a two-third vote of its male members at any regular meeting, a License to preach; but in no case shall a Church grant a License without the concurrence of its Pastor, or in case of not having a Pastor, of an ordained Minister belonging to the Conference, who shall examine the candidate in doctrine and ability to teach, and be satisfied also that he has a good moral character.

ART. 25.—Church Licenses shall be presented to the District Meeting to which the Church granting such License belongs, at the first session that it may be practicable, when the Licentiate shall be examined, and if approved by a four-fifths vote, shall receive a District

Meeting License. Such License may be renewed annually until presented to the General Conference.

ART. 26.—It shall be in the power of a District Meeting to refer such Licentiates to their Churches for re-license, and in case of disapproval to recommend the Church to revoke such License.

ART. 27.—District Meeting Licenses shall be presented to the General Conference at the first session that it may be practicable, when the Licentiates shall be examined, and if approved by a four-fifths vote of the Conference, shall receive a General Conference License. Such License may be renewed annually.

ART. 28.—It shall be in the power of the General Conference to refer a District Meeting Licentiate to his District Meeting for re-license, and in case of disapproval to recommend the District Meeting to revoke his License. On the recommendation of the Elders' Conference, it shall be in the power of the General Conference to suspend any Licentiate from preaching on the authority of the District Meeting License, until the next meeting of the District which granted the License.

ART. 29.—No candidate who has at any time had a License revoked, can be licensed by a District Meeting, or by the General Conference, until he shall have obtained a License from the Church to which he belongs.

ART. 30.—No Licentiate has the authority to administer the ordinances of Baptism or the Lord's Supper, or to receive members into Churches by the hand of fellowship.

ART. 31.—Before any brother, who uses tobacco, can be licensed or ordained, the body applied to shall require him to abandon its use; but in case it be shown to be necessary to his health, as a matter of expediency, a License may be granted or ordination allowed.

ART. 32.—The General Conference, in Committee of the Whole shall be a Committee to examine Licentiates.

ART. 33.—It shall be the duty of the Licentiate Committee to examine all Licentiates who may come before it, in soundness of doctrine, ability to teach, literary and general qualifications for the work of the Ministry, and to report on each case to the Conference.

ART. 34.—No Minister can be a member of the Conference, or can hold the pastorate of any of its Churches, unless he be a member of some Church connected with the Conference.

ART. 35.—No Church shall receive to its membership a Minister who has been ordained by any other denomination, until he shall have been approved by a four-fifths vote of the Conference. It shall be in the power of the Conference to acknowledge such ordination, or to ordain the Minister according to its own forms, as it may deem best. No Minister who has been excluded from the Conference, can hold the pastorate of any of its Churches; and any Church opening its house to or receiving such excluded Minister, shall be liable to the censure of the General Conference.

ART. 36.—The right of ordination is vested in the General Conference only, and can only be exercised by a four-fifths vote. All ordination services shall be held at such time and place as the Conference shall determine.

ART. 37.—A Church having an accusation to prefer against an Elder or a Licentiate, during the time between the sessions of the Conference, may, by having a special session of the Elders' Conference, or the Executive thereof, called, bring such charge before them. In such case, the Elders' Conference, or the Executive thereof, shall have power to investigate and act thereupon; and if, in its judgment, such action be required, can exclude the accused from its own membership, and suspend him from exercising the functions of an Elder until the next session of the General Conference, or the Executive thereof, and then make such recommendation to the General Conference, or the Executive thereof, as it may think the case and the cause demands. All such special sessions of Elders' Conference, or the Executive thereof, shall be held, and the labor continued and ended with the Church which called the meeting.

ART. 38.—That Conference shall have authority to discipline, and if it should be found necessary for the good of the denomination, to exclude any District Meeting connected with it, or to decide any question or trial of magnitude that may be referred to it by a two-thirds vote of the District Meeting; but it shall have no power to reverse the decision of a District Meeting or Church, nor to interfere with its internal or local affairs, except when an appeal is made from the decision thereof. In such cases the decision of the Conference shall be final.

ART. 39.—A Special Session of the General Conference may be called, when considered necessary by the Executive, by the Moderator directing the Recording Secretary to give three weeks' notice thereof in the *Religious Intelligencer*, or to send a written notice through the Post three weeks beforehand to each member of Conference.

ART. 40.—All who were members of the preceding Annual Conference shall be members of the Special Conference, except in case that any of the District Meetings shall have appointed delegates, when the newly-appointed delegates shall be members of the Special Conference as well as of the regular Annual Conference.

ART. 41.—These Bye-Laws may be added to, altered or amended, at any Annual Session of the General Conference, by a unanimous vote of the members present, or by a two-third vote, if notice of such changes shall have been given and recorded at a previous session.

## RULES OF ORDER.

### DUTIES AND PRIVILEGES OF THE MODERATOR.

- 1.—It shall be the duty of the Moderator to preserve order, and to endeavor to conduct the business before the Conference to a speedy and proper result.
- 2.—The Moderator shall state to the Conference every question

properly presented to him, and before putting it to a vote, shall ask, "Is the Conference ready for the question?" Should no member offer to speak, he shall rise to put the question, and after he has risen no member shall be permitted to speak upon it; nor shall any amendment or substitute be entertained.

3.—The Moderator may vote in all ballottings for the election of officers, and in all votes that are taken by ballot; but in ordinary cases he shall not vote, except in case of a tie, in which case he shall have the casting vote.

4.—The Moderator may speak to points of order, in preference to other members of the Conference, rising from his seat for that purpose; and he shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Conference, such appeal to be asked for in writing by at least three members of the Conference.

5.—When an appeal is made from the decision of the Moderator, he shall put the question thus:—"Shall the decision of the Chair be sustained?" The Recording Secretary shall then call the roll of members, and they shall answer "Yes," or "No." If a majority vote in favor, the decision of the Chair shall be sustained; if against it, the decision shall be reversed.

6.—It shall be the duty of the Moderator, and the privilege of any member of the Conference, to call to order a member who violates any rule of the Conference.

#### MOTIONS.

7.—A motion must be seconded, and afterward repeated by the Moderator, before it can be debated. A motion shall be put in writing if any member of the Conference requires it.

8.—All resolutions shall be submitted in writing.

9.—A motion may be withdrawn by the mover, with the leave of the seconder, before it is debated; but not after it has been debated, except by leave of Conference.

10.—A motion to amend an amendment to an amendment shall not be entertained.

11.—An amendment destroying or altering the intention of a motion or resolution shall be in order, but an amendment in relation to a different subject shall not be in order.

12.—On an amendment to "strike out and insert," the paragraph to be amended shall be first read as it stands, then the words proposed to be struck out and also those to be inserted, and finally the paragraph as it would stand if so amended.

13.—On a call for a division of the question, the majority shall decide; but the call can be granted only when the division called will leave distinct and entire propositions.

14.—Every member of Conference present shall be required to vote on every question submitted to vote from the Chair.

15.—The names of the yeas and nays on any question may be called for and recorded on the request of five members, made in writing to the Moderator.

16.—A motion or resolution to prevail must receive a two-thirds vote of the members present.

17.—A motion to reconsider any motion or resolution passed, may be moved and seconded by members who voted with the majority on the question to be reconsidered; and the motion cannot be made later than in the sitting next following the one in which the original question was passed. If the motion to reconsider prevails, the resolution reconsidered shall stand as it was before voted upon, and will be open to discussion, amendment, adoption or rejection.

## DEBATE.

18.—When a member wishes to speak or offer a motion, he shall rise in his place and respectfully address the Moderator.

19.—When a member speaks he shall confine himself to the question under consideration, and shall avoid personal and unbecoming language.

20.—When a member speaking is called to order, he shall immediately take his seat, and remain seated until the point is determined, when he shall be permitted to conclude his remarks, if they are in order, and he is not debarred from speaking by rule.

21.—When two or more members rise to speak at the same time, the Moderator shall decide who is entitled to the floor.

22.—No member shall speak more than twice, nor longer than ten minutes each time, on any question, without leave of Conference such leave to be granted or refused without debate.

23.—While a member is speaking, no one shall interrupt him, except for the purpose of calling to order, or asking of the Moderator leave to explain. A member allowed to "explain," shall only have the right to explain an actual misunderstanding of language, and shall be strictly prohibited from debating the merits of the case.

## PRIVILEGED QUESTIONS.

24.—When a question is before the Conference, the only questions in order shall be the following:—(1) To adjourn; (2) the previous question; (3) to lay on the table; (4) to postpone indefinitely; (5) to postpone to a definite period; (6) to refer; (7) to divide, if the sense will admit of it; (8) to amend; but none of these questions shall be in order while a member is legally in possession of the floor, or while a point of order is being decided.

25.—When "the previous question" has been moved and seconded, it shall be put in this form:—"Shall the main question be now put?" If this is carried all further amendments and debate shall be excluded, and the question be put at once. If an amendment has been moved to the question, the vote shall be taken on the amendment first. If more than one amendment has been moved, the last amendment shall take precedence in the vote. If the amendment is carried, then the question shall recur on the original motion as amended; if the amendments are lost, the original question must be put, and all further amendments, substitutes or postponements must be excluded.

26.—When a motion has been postponed indefinitely, it shall not come up again during that session.

27.—A motion to adjourn shall always be in order except (1) when a member is in possession of the floor; (2) while a vote is being

taken; (3) when to adjourn was the last preceding motion; or, (4) when it has been decided that "the previous question" shall be taken.

28.—A motion to adjourn simply, cannot be amended or debated; but a motion to adjourn to a given time is open to amendment, and may be debated.

29.—The following questions are not debateable:—(1) a motion to adjourn simply; (2) a motion to lay on the table; (3) a motion for "the previous question;" (4) a motion to reconsider; (5) a motion to read a paper; and (6) a motion to take up particular items of business.

30.—It shall be the duty of all members of the Conference to be present at the time appointed for each daily session; and any one wishing to retire shall first obtain leave of the Moderator. No member shall leave the Conference before its close without obtaining permission from Conference.

31.—The Conference shall sit with open doors, except when it shall go into Committees of the Whole.

32.—Any person not a member of the Conference, may take part in its discussions by obtaining permission from the Conference.

33.—Any agent or agents, Committee or Committees, appointed for any special object or objects by this Conference, shall render a written report of such labor to the Conference.

34.—The foregoing Rules of Order shall apply in Elders' Conference and District Meetings, as well as in General Conference.

Rev. T. H. Siddall, from Committee on Free Baptist Convention, submitted the following Report :

**BROTHER MODERATOR.**—Your Committee beg to recommend the following :

I. That the Convention Scheme, endorsed by the Executive at the joint meeting held in St. John, we recommend to this Conference for acceptance, which is as follows :

**PREAMBLE.**—That *whereas*, For some time past committees from the Free Christian Baptist General Conference of New Brunswick, and the Free Baptist General Conference of Nova Scotia, have been considering the question of a Convention ; and *whereas*, Your Committee appointed to draft a Constitution believe that the time has come to form a Convention of Free Baptists, to promote the interests of Education and Foreign Missions, and for mutual help in promoting and sustaining the interests of our cherished principles ; and *whereas*, We believe such a Convention, if wisely conducted, will be mutually beneficial ; and *whereas*, We are not in a position at once to form and establish a school for the benefit of the denominations respectively uniting in Convention ; therefore

*Resolved*, That we seek to form such a Convention, and respectfully request our respective General Conferences to ratify the action now taken and endorse the spirit and principle of the annexed Constitution. Further

*Resolved*, That we request all our young men seeking to enter the ministry to secure an education, and until we have a school of our own that they be requested to attend the Freewill Baptist schools at Lewiston, Me. ; and we would urge upon each General Conference to do all possible to aid them.

#### CONSTITUTION.

**ART. 1.**—This Convention shall be known as the **FREE BAPTIST CONVENTION OF THE MARITIME PROVINCES.**

**ART. 2.**—That it shall be a Convention of representatives of the Free Baptist General Conference of Nova Scotia and the Free Christian Baptist General Conference of New Brunswick.

**ART. 3.**—That each General Conference shall appoint seven delegates, to be chosen at each Annual Session of each General Conference entering the Convention.

**ART. 4.**—That the Convention shall be for the purpose of promoting and sustaining Education, Foreign Missions, and dealing with such matters as may be referred to it by the respective Conferences entering the Convention.

**ART. 5.**—That the officers of the Convention be a President, two Vice Presidents, Secretary, and Executive Committee of three, to be elected at each regular session.

**ART. 6.**—That the Convention shall be held annually, alternately

in each Province, at such time as the Convention at a previous session shall decide. The first session of the Convention shall be held at Tracy's Mills, Carleton County, N. B., on the 16th of October next. Three weeks' notice of the same to be given in the *Religious Intelligence*, signed by the Chairman and Secretary of the Committee.

ART. 7.—That any minister within the limits of the General Conferences, united in the Convention, shall have the liberty to labor in any General Conference (subject to the General Conference of that Province) without receiving dismission from one Conference to the other, unless dismission is requested.

ART. 8.—That this Convention shall co-operate with the F. W. B. brethren of the United States, for the purpose of advancing the interests of Foreign Missions, and other kindred subjects (or interests) as may be hereafter determined upon.

ART. 9.—That any Article may be amended or additions made thereto, by giving one year's notice after the Constitution has been completed and ratified by the respective Conferences herein named; said change to be by a majority vote of the members representing each Conference forming the Convention.

II. That we at this Conference arrange for the holding of a Convention in Nova Scotia at a date to be decided upon hereafter.

III. That a Committee of three be appointed, with a like number of Nova Scotia Conference, to mature a plan for the establishing a School; their report to be presented at the Convention.

Rev. G. A. Hartley, Secretary of the Board of Managers, submitted the following Report :

**BROTHER MODERATOR.**—In laying before you another Annual Report, your Board of Managers have little more to say than that, beside our regular annual meeting, the Board has had no occasion for any special meetings during the year; and that the matters of the Conference in their hands continue much as they were a year ago. The securities remain unchanged, and the property managed by the Board is considered entirely safe, and paying 6 per cent. interest.

During the year there have been deeded to the Conference several lots of land for sites for Churches, situate in different parts of the country, on some of which houses of worship have already been erected. In this way the property of the denomination is constantly increasing. Whether it can be as convenient for themselves, or is, or is not any safer, there seem to be Churches amongst us who appear to think it better to have the titles of their property vest in the Conference than in the Church. Whatever may be thought about convenience or safety, it should not be forgotten, in cases of this kind, that the Trustees or Agents who are to hold and manage the property for the Church, must be appointed by the owner (the Conference) through their Agent, the Board of Managers. Also, that in cases where houses of worship, or other buildings, so held, are insured, it should be done in the name of the owner, having the policy made payable to the "Free Christian Baptist General Conference of New Brunswick, its successor or agents." For in case of loss by fire, no person, not having a legal claim to the property, could collect the insurance, not even the Church occupying the house, or Trustees appointed by the Church. Hence the importance of Churches being careful in this matter. The title cannot vest in the Conference and in the individual Church at the same time. Churches wishing to have such agents appointed should forward the names of the parties to the Conference, or to the Board of Managers.

The Treasurer's Report will show the state of the finances.

The Free Christian Baptist Home Mission Society assembled in Annual Session at 8.30 p. m.

The President, Rev. John Gravinor, in the Chair.

Rev. G. A. Hartley, Corresponding Secretary, submitted the following Report :

#### HOME MISSION REPORT.

MR. PRESIDENT AND CHRISTIAN FRIENDS.—So long as there shall be connected with our Conference so many small and isolated Churches, the work done by this Society will be indispensable ; and so long as the means for carrying out the objects of the Society come in so slowly, their accomplishment can only be partial. We still have quite a number of weak Churches, some of them owning good comfortable meeting houses, who are unable to support the preaching of the gospel. For years this Society has been aiding them, and they continue looking to us for assistance. And most assuredly help they must have from some source, or they and we together suffer serious loss. The pressing needs of these Churches, with calls from whitened fields, where we have no Churches, have been before the Executive, who deeply regret to have to say that only a small part of these Macedonian calls have been responded to ; and yet, thank God, we rejoice to have it to say that something has been undertaken and accomplished during the year just closed.

Rev. A. Taylor was engaged by the Board to spend his entire

year under their direction. In securing this veteran Missionary for so long a time, the Executive considered themselves especially fortunate. Probably no minister amongst us has a greater care for the Churches, or is better fitted by general adaptation and extended experience, for missionary work, than he. But so hard was the winter, and so long the drives, involving so much exposure that our devoted brother found it too much for his age and strength, and was compelled to discontinue his travelling a part of the roughest winter weather. He laboured, however, nine months, the greater part of which time was spent in the First District. He visited all those needy churches, giving to each such a portion of his time as was thought best, considering the location and needs of each; and the large number amongst whom he had to divide his labour. He went up the Tobique River as far as Riley Brook, taking on his way the churches at Birch Ridge, Arthurette, and Long Island. These are small churches and located long distances from each other. He was at Perth, Wright neighbourhood, Middle Kent, Lower Kent, Canaan, River De Chute, Andover Portage, Fort Fairfield, Salmon River, Peel, Bath, Knoxford and Bristol, and found the cause low in nearly all these places.

A number of these interests were helped by his timely visits and earnest preaching. He spent a short time in King's County, holding some very profitable meetings with the Church at Corn Ridge. Both the Churches on Campobello were visited, and were considerably helped by the highly appreciated labour sent to them. That all the Churches visited by Bro. Taylor, were strengthened and encouraged for the time being, we feel fully assured, but whether it will be possible for us to continue this kind of labour amongst these scattered Churches, especially those of the First District, and if possible, whether by missionary labour they can ever be made self-sustaining, is a problem hard for us to solve. Your Executive, however, is strongly impressed that we can only save our interests, and build up our cause there, by having settled amongst them a faithful pastor, who for the love of his Lord and Master, and the love of souls, will give his undivided time and strength to that field. And the Board would now, in this very meeting, like to appeal to our Ministers present, asking if there is not amongst us, some brother who can see his way clear to go to the help of those scattered flocks, and in the Lord's name be a shepherd to them. Certainly it would be a Christlike and noble work. The support might not for a time be large, and yet, should the Churches make an effort worthy of themselves, aided by such an annual grant as the Society might be able to make, it seems to us, that one if not two good men might be supported, and soon those Churches become strong and thrifty. We sincerely hope

and pray that some brother may, at once, feel a "thus saith the Lord" in this matter. Without such help, we fear that our cause there will pass under other care, or, what would be much worse, will be without ministerial care altogether.

Rev. C. F. Rideout has been under engagement with the Board eight months, travelling amongst such of the Churches as seemed most in need of his labor. He spent two months on Campobello, dividing his time between Wilson's Beach and North Roads' Churches, with good acceptance, and we trust with profit to the cause. Forest City, North Lake, and other adjoining places were visited and labored with for nearly two months. He also extended care to the Churches at Fort Fairfield, Canaan, Wright Settlement, and Middle Kent, expending several months of his time in that section of the country. We think Bro. Rideout's mission has been profitable to all the places where he preached and so faithfully visited the people from house to house.

The Church at Fair Haven, Deer Island, was assisted in securing the labor of Rev. J. N. Barnes. The Board sent Bro. Barnes to them, and they paid for one month's mission. Then we gave them a grant of \$30, with which they were enabled to make such an arrangement as secured regular monthly visits from him nearly every month since. This labor has been blessed of God. Several additions have been made to the Church, their new meeting house finished and occupied, and there is now some prospect for the erection of another place of worship in another part of the island. Our interest on Deer Island has been somewhat extended, so that the outlook is quite hopeful. Bro. Barnes has worked with his usual zeal and success.

In care for the Churches at Grand Harbor and Seal Cove, Grand Manan, Bro. J. H. Erb was sent to make them a visit, hoping that a mutual liking between minister and people would result in an engagement for one or more years. Happily such an engagement was made, and the Lord has greatly blessed the labor of our young brother to the strengthening of those Churches. Quite a number of souls were converted and added to the Seal Cove Church. And Grand Harbor Church has been helped, and is now preparing to build a new and larger Church edifice.

Rev. John Giviner supplied the Churches at Bristol, Gordonsville, Foreston, Knowlesville, and one or two other preaching places, and was aided in his support to the amount of \$50. This brother was not able to labor all the year, as he hoped to do, but we trust the cause, under his ministry, has been permanently helped.

The large pastorate of which Rev. A. Kinney has the care, has aided to the amount of \$50, enabling those Churches to procure

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the efficient assistance of Bro. A. C. Thompson, who has done good work in that part of Westmorland County during the year.

Beaver Harbor Church was granted \$33, by which assistance they were able to have the labor of Rev. J. N. Barnes one month longer than the time for which they had engaged him. This Church has always done nobly in its financial engagements, and as they are expending a good deal in the enlargement of their house of worship, the Board thought it wise to give them this assistance.

It will be remembered that the matter of the establishment of a Mission in Manitoba and the North West, was by the General Conference last year referred to the Executive of the Home Mission Society. (See Resolution 51.) It may be well to say here, that the Executive opened correspondence with several brethren and friends in Winnipeg, and also through the *Religious Intelligencer* solicited pledges and help towards the establishment of such a mission. Farther than this nothing has been done. The only response to the calls for help was that given by the Church of this place, (Tracy's Mills,) who sent to our Treasurer the sum of \$24.60. Nearly all the letters received in answer to the enquiries made were gratifying, but the Executive has not had sufficient financial encouragement to warrant them in going farther, nor have we had from any one of our Ministers an assurance that he would go. And here the matter rests for the present.

This is about the extent of our year's work. What the final results may be God only knows. The seed sown by the missionaries has been watched by the progress of the members of the Board and other interested brothers and sisters, and we leave it with Him, who only can give the increase.

This is a very important part of our Denominational work, and it is greatly to be desired that all our people may take an increased interest in it. Let us each try to realize our individual responsibility. There is danger in the Church, as elsewhere in Society, of a swallowing up of individuality in the multitudinal mass, so that personal concern and personal contributions will be lost sight of in the operations of organizations. This ought not so to be with us. If the views so commonly held by us be correct, every member of our denomination should be a missionary. We well know that our Fathers in the ministry held with a tenacity like that with which men hold their life-blood, the importance of general care one of another, and of possessing an aggressive spirit. Were they not right?

There is now amongst us great need for the exercise of this care and of personal devotion to God. Indeed it is very doubtful if we ever see the extensive change in the spiritual prosperity of our Churches, we so much desire, until the whole great heart of our

TRACY'S MILLS, CARLETON CO., OCT. 15, 1883.

The Free Christian Baptist Foreign Mission Society assembled in Annual Session in the Free Baptist Church, Tracy's Mills, on October 15, 1883, at 7 o'clock, p. m. Rev. John Perry, President, in the Chair.

Opened by Singing and Prayer by Rev. J. N. Barnes.

Rev. Joseph McLeod, Corresponding Secretary, submitted the following Report:

**FOREIGN MISSION SOCIETY REPORT.**

MR. PRESIDENT AND CHRISTIAN FRIENDS.—As last year, I have to express regret that no more is being done by us in Foreign Mission work. Are we doing all we can? Failure to do all is disobedience of the great commission, and involves the loss of souls to whom it is our duty to send the news of salvation, and great spiritual weakness and loss to ourselves. It becomes us to consider well, and immediately, our responsibility in this great work. This Society is supporting in India a native preacher of standing and ability—Purna Chandra Basu. He has for several years been a faithful worker for Jesus in a difficult field, and has had no small degree of success. He has his head-quarters at Dantoon, and is pastor of the Church there. The Church has twenty-seven members, seven of whom were added by baptism during the year. There is also a Sabbath School in connection with the Church,

in which forty-two scholars are every Lord's day taught the story of Jesus' love, His life and death. In addition to the work done in Dantoon, our Missionary visits the surrounding district, scattering the good seed, the Word of God, in the confident hope that it will bear fruit unto the eternal life of many souls. The Report of the Church and the work for the past year says:—

"Dantoon is counted hard soil; but nothing is too hard for the Lord. Purna Chandra Basu has continued his labors in the bazaar and neighboring villages and markets. He has been preaching also occasionally to the patients who come to the dispensary. He is everywhere kindly received, and his message treated with respect. Some enquirers in a village a mile away have disappointed his hope; still he visits them, and is by no means despondent concerning their state. The Report expresses the hope that there will soon be an increase of effort at Dantoon, and that several village schools may be opened.

The Dainmari branch of the Church has, during the year, afforded the missionaries real cause for joy and gratitude. There have been several conversions; all those added to the Church being from this section, and all of them were from the heathen community. One very cheering feature is that whole families come together into the Church. A beginning has been made towards erecting a chapel, and the Hindus in the village appear very friendly towards the converts. There has been very little of the petty persecutions that converts to Christianity have been subjected to elsewhere. Dr. Phillips says that whenever he visits the village the people flock about his tent, and seem eager for instruction; and whenever believers have been baptized, nearly the whole village has come together on the banks of the pond to witness, with quiet decorum, the sacred ordinance. There cannot be a doubt that other households will soon be numbered among the converts.

One very pleasing feature of the Dainmari work is the power of personal testimony in bringing men to Christ. Dr. P. says that he has over and again been reminded of the words of the woman of Sychar: "Come, see a man which told me all things that ever I did; is not this the Christ?" The converts here have been diligent workers from the first. They have gone from house to house telling their neighbours of the blessed Savior whom they had found, and saying "Come,—is not this the Christ.!" In this personal, patient and persistent effort of converted natives for their fellows, an effort which is characterized by the spirit and spontaneity of grateful and voluntary service in behalf of Him who has redeemed them, is seen the secret and the promise of India's speedy evangelization, more than in all foreign agencies

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and appliances combined. It is a witnessing church that India needs, and our chief work there is to help in the training up of such a church. The missionary must work through his native helpers, until they need his aid no longer, in building up the native church.

The work of the year throughout the mission has been, in the main, much like that of its predecessors. A great deal of hard, earnest, prayerful toil has been done; there have been successes, rejoicing the hearts of the heroic missionary band, and there have been difficulties, reverses, and losses which have severely tried their courage and patience. But through all their faith in God abides, and their confidence that He will not let their labour be in vain in the Lord. The work of the Churches has gone on regularly; the training school for teachers has been well attended and has done efficient work; the Bible school, in which native Christians are prepared for the work of preaching, has had twenty students during the year; these native preachers are expected to do good work in the near future; even while pursuing their studies they are engaged in Christian service as opportunity offers. The Zena work, which is especially the work of the women, is being vigorously and successfully prosecuted. As it has been fully reported by our Woman's Society, it will not be referred to here in detail. The Reports, covering every branch of work engaged in, give many signs of real growth. It needs to be remembered, however, that growth is not always to be measured by increase of members, not in India any more than in Christian New Brunswick. It is as much a sign of growth to cut off unworthy members, to promote spiritual life, and to toil more earnestly for the extension of Christ's kingdom. Some of these signs of progress have not been wanting. The Church of India is as yet in leading strings, and would that she seemed more eager for liberty and independence. Foreign cash and control are still too marked a feature in her life and work, but we look confidently for a change, which shall develop the better traits of Eastern character, and plant the Christian faith so firmly in Hindu and Mahomedan and aboriginal soil, that it shall not be any longer regarded as an exotic, but an indigenous and friendly institution, calculated to bless the land and elevate the race. Some of the native Christians are beginning to reach this very important conviction, that the Church of Christ is the great hope of their native land, hence well worth working and sacrificing for. As this conviction deepens we may look for strength and efficiency in the native Church.

There is still a cry for more workers, and a more liberal support of the work. The Missionary Band is small—all too small to do the great work entrusted to us. Nor is the support given at all

commensurate with the work undertaken by them. With more money greatly more could be accomplished, even with the present force of missionaries. But were there a sufficient number of missionaries, adequately supported and furnished with the needed facilities and appliances for their work, God only knows what great victories for Christ might be achieved. I cannot do better than place before you the words of Mr. Burkholder, one of the missionaries, who says:—"The field is a great one; but the workers are neither mighty nor many, but few and weak. Oh, when will the burdens, *so many and so heavy*, now resting on only a few, alas too few! be lessened and lightened by those upon whom the responsibility rests—the people at home! May God grant strength and heart to those upon whom rests the duty of sending more money and more men—to the home Churches—into this work. I speak of the work in all parts of the of the mission and all kinds of work. It is *money, more money, and more men*, that we want. If we as a people are ever to prove faithful to the great trust God has committed to us, the time has come to be up and doing; the time has come when by nothing but by more money and more men, can that trust be kept faithfully and wholly. May we as a people be able in the last great day to say, Here are they whom Thou didst give us! and with them and towards them, every duty done, and well done; and every trust kept, and faithfully kept."

What say you, Christian men and women, to this appeal? Can we, dare we, turn a deaf ear to it? God calls us to the work. Disregard of His call is sin. Sin blights and destroys our spiritual life; this sin not less than any other. Our Churches need the blessing that comes of participation in this work for Jesus' sake. "He that watereth himself also shall be watered." May God help us to see our duty and faithfully discharge it.

Mrs. Weyman, the Corresponding Secretary, read her Annual Report, as follows:

DEAR SISTERS:—It again becomes my duty as your Cor. Secretary to present my Annual Report. God has mercifully preserved us and our dear Missionary another year, and we meet again to devise means to further our work. As my report must necessarily be lengthy, I will not speak of the Foreign work more than to give you Miss Hooper's report *verbatim*, as it contains all that is necessary. In a private letter she says: "My home is now in the room that dear Miss Crawford called hers. Mrs. Smith has all the care of the orphanage and I of the work in the villages. We are very happy together and I trust will be a help to each other." Her report says: "Another year has rolled away, and the time has come when you ought to know something definite of your work

in India. The usual number of difficulties and seeming defeats have been our portion. Times when my cry has been "O Lord I am oppressed, undertake for me," surely and speedily has the answer come, not only in grace to endure, but also in the opening of new ways and means for work. My sudden and unexpected removal to this place, and the taking up of the work here which was dropped at Midnapore, has been a tax on my mind and strength that will not permit of my giving the details of the work in each school as I wish. Suffice it to say, nine schools were in good running order, and all the conditions seemed favorable for their continuance. As a stimulus to the teachers and the pupils, we had just succeeded in obtaining a small allowance from government of twenty-one rupees per month, for the schools, hoping this would serve as a basis for a larger amount, as the number of schools would increase. We lay our little plans, and all the while God has His plan for us, which, if we do not follow, regret, sorrow and disaster are the result. Looking back over the work of the year, with all its mistakes and imperfections we cannot feel that all has been spent in vain. We think of the homes that have been entered with the gospel message, that last year were closed to us, and remember the women who crept timidly to our side, to learn the alphabet, who now are able to read the story of Jesus' love for themselves. How our hearts have leaped with joy as again and again we have heard the words spelled out one by one and letter by letter, the finger on each, "For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish, but have everlasting life," and then hear the comment "Such love!" The verandahs where the schools are held are often surrounded by old women who will never learn to read for themselves, but come to listen and drink in the wonderful story. The Gospel has been left in the hands of those who can read, and they have promised to read a little every day. Our Lord hath said "Not by might, nor by power, but by my spirit," and have we not also the blessed assurance, that His word shall not return unto Him void.

It is only four weeks since my coming here, and in that time I have only been able to get around to the schools once, on account of the rains. The villages are distant and only accessible through rice fields, by going on horseback across the ridges which separate them. Even this is attended with much danger as there is scarcely stepping-room for the horse's feet, and even that may give away any moment from the water running underneath. Till the rains are over I shall devote my time more especially to one in the bazaar near, and to working, in the others by helping the teachers and encouraging them all in my power. There are ten teachers em

ployed ; several of them go from house to house, as there are so many little boys who would not otherwise be able to learn. Bertini is the only teacher whom I have brought with me. The others, being married and having their homes at Midnapore, of course could not come. Bertini has long had a desire to be employed as a Bible reader, and devote all her time to giving religious instruction. As she has a particular tact and liking for such work, I trust the friends at home who support her will approve of my allowing her to begin that work here. She evidently is as much called to it as true preachers of the Gospel are to the Ministry. The work here is partly in Bengali, and partly in Oriya, so that I must study the latter. Although not able to speak Oriya, yet I am able to understand what is said, and in turn find no trouble in making myself understood in Bengali.

I have so often been asked about my health that you will pardon a few words of personal reference. With the exception of slight illness from too great exposure to the sun my health continues good. I do not suffer from that depression of spirits which is one of the effects of climate. Truly I can say from my heart " Bless the Lord O my soul and forget not all His benefits." To the friends at home who have so liberally provided means for work, and sustained me by prayer and sympathy, I feel daily and hourly grateful, and feel the assurance they will still follow me to this new field where I can only say,

" I see not a step before me,  
As I tread on another year ;  
But the past is still in God's keeping,  
The future His mercy will clear ;  
And what looks dark in the distance,  
May brighten as it grows near."

#### HOME WORK.

FIRST DISTRICT.—In this district there is but one Society reported viz., at Wicklow, C. Co. It has ten members, paid this year \$5.25 Mrs. Milberry's Sunday School Class at Wicklow has paid \$1.05, and the Infant Class in same school sends 20c. The Secretary says they are thus trying to teach the youth to be interested in the Missionary work. We also have a Society at Bath ; they send \$5.00. Since coming here I learn that at Arthurette we have one member, and she tells me she hopes to form a Society there. Your Committee appointed last year to attend the First District Meeting, and look after our interest there, stated that they found this District had difficulties to contend with which the other Districts do not have, being very much scattered, and many of the Churches in a very low state, notwithstanding several of the sisters manifested a desire and willingness to work, and two copies of the

*Helper* were subscribed for. Here is a large field for some one to labour in. Who will put their shoulder to the wheel?

SECOND DISTRICT.—In this District we have fourteen Societies. Hartland Society has ten members, hold monthly meetings, paid \$14. Society at the mouth of Big Presque Isle has three members and five contributors, hold monthly meetings, and have paid \$8.31. Upper Brighton Society has six members, hold monthly meetings, and have paid \$7.50. Rockland, a new Society of ten members, sends \$4.50. Third Tier Society has eight members and twelve contributors, they send \$12.70, do not hold meetings. The Society at Victoria Corner has done nobly this year. They have twenty-one members, do not hold meetings, have paid \$35.00. Waterville Society has two members, paid \$3.00. A Sunday School Class at Waterville sends \$1.20. Knoxford, a new Society, have eighteen members, hold monthly meetings, interest good, send as a beginning \$4.00. Woodstock Society has fourteen members. The interest is good and still increasing. They hold monthly prayer meetings and enjoy good seasons. At those meetings they have collected \$32.50, making a total of \$49.00. Lower Brighton, Jacksonville, and Pembroke Societies have not reported, so we have no means of ascertaining what they are doing. Tracy's Mills have paid \$23.00 or more. In this District there are twenty-one copies of the *Helper* taken. The Secretary says, "It has done much good." She reports the interest steadily increasing, and thinks regular monthly meetings of the Societies and continual agitation will bring about the desired results. Although much has been done in this District, there is yet a large field uncultivated, as there are thirty-one Churches in the District, and we have only fourteen Societies. Sisters of the Second District, will you not aid your Secretary this year in trying to establish a Society in every church. The Secretary says, "The sisters seem willing to give when they know the need." Who then, in each Church, where we have no Society, will volunteer to do something for our Mission next year?

THIRD DISTRICT.—This District contains seven Societies of which I have knowledge. There may be more but I could not ascertain that there were. Eel River has three members and thirteen contributors, send \$11.20. Middle Southampton is still at work; they send \$7.00. Campbell Settlement Society sends one dollar. At Keswick, Mrs. Reud collected \$10.00. Fredericton is still at work. They send this year \$42.56. Dumfries and Caverhill were both at work last year, but as I have no report from them, I do not know whether they are yet alive; I hope the Treasurer has heard from them. In this District there are twenty-seven Churches. Here is another large field for our sisters.

FOURTH DISTRICT.—This District only reported one Society,

Upper Hampstead, having ten members, paying \$10.00. This was the only Society in that District last year, and I do not think we have any other Societies except we have one at Frederickton Junction. This District contains seventeen Churches. Cannot there be something done? There could if we only had some one to work. Our dear sister Seely, who has gone Home, collected in 1880 something like \$32.00 in this District, viz.: At Frederickton Junction, Blissville and Tracy. Who will make *this work their work*?

FIFTH DISTRICT.—From this District I had no report, I presume it was owing to a mistake in the names of the Secretaries published in the Minutes. The Minutes report Mrs. Amasa Smith as Secretary, while it should have been Mrs. Amasa Merritt, and Miss Jennie Carpenter as Assistant, when it should have been Miss Janie Carpenter. We have but one Society in this District that I have any knowledge of, viz.: Lower Hampstead. I think they do not hold meetings but they are always prompt in paying. I hope the Sisters in the Fifth District will go to work earnestly, so that we may have a report of much being done there next year.

SIXTH DISTRICT.—For this District we have seventeen Societies and four Mission Bands. Middleland Society has four members and seven contributors; they hold no meetings; have paid this year \$7.25. Norton has one member and five contributors, hold no meetings, have paid this year \$2.75. We hope next year to have a better report from Norton. Apohaqui has three members and three contributors, paid \$4.25. Snider Mountain Society did not report. From Sussex Society the Secretary had no report. They had sixteen members last year and some contributor. Dutch Valley Society has not reported for two years. Penobscuis Society has thirteen members and six contributors, do not hold meetings, have paid \$16.00. New Town reported but did not give statistics; they are still at work; have always done nobly, and we presume they will still live. Millstream has sixteen members and seven contributors, do not hold meetings, have paid this year \$19.00. Cornhill has eight members but when reported only three had paid. Coverdale sends \$6.55. Wheaton Settlement, Moncton, and Portage Societies did not report. Taylor Village Society has twelve members; hold meetings every month; have always had good interest, pay \$12.25 for Miss Hooper's salary, and \$4.25 for Miss Hooper's Orphan, total \$16.50. Dover and Lutes Mountain Societies did not report. Middleland Mission Band have raised \$40.00 at least, perhaps more. Millstream Band \$2.50. Snider Mountain and Apohaqui Bands did not report. The Sunday School at Cornhill have raised about \$14.00, perhaps more. There are quite a number of Missionary Helpers taken in this

District, and we find them a great help in teaching our sisters about the work. The annual District Meeting was interesting and I trust profitable.

SEVENTH DISTRICT.—In this District there are seven Societies. North Head Society reports forty-four members; hold meetings fortnightly; good interest; raised \$50.00. St. John holds monthly meetings; interest rather low; raised \$23.00. Carleton, thirty-seven members, hold monthly meetings; interest increasing; raised \$37.64. Beaver Harbour, a new Society, only two months old, has fifteen members; hold monthly meetings; have paid \$10.25: bids fair to be a prosperous Society. Seal Cove is in good working order; has nine members; hold fortnightly meetings; paid \$9.00. On account of diphtheria at White Head Island they have not held meetings, but the interest is good. They have raised \$14.35. Grand Harbour Society was organized at the time of the annual District Meeting, and bids fair to be one of our best Societies; it has eleven members. The annual District Meeting was interesting, and seed was sown that will bring forth fruit.

Thus I have given you what information I could gather in regard to our Societies. While some of the Secretaries have reported fully, some of the reports have been very meagre, and from one District I had no report at all. If I have failed to report any Society's work, it is because I have not known of it. I would be only too happy to have a report of their work from every Society or worker in the home field. As we are learning and growing every year, I hope we will ere long be able to have a report from each Society.

In reviewing the Home work for the year, we have much for which to thank God and take courage. I trust we will each be enabled to go back to our respective fields to work with renewed energies for the Master. All of which is respectfully submitted.

Mrs. S. McLeod read the following interesting Report on  
Missionary Intelligence:

The nineteenth century may well be denominated the age of missionary enterprise. We must be impressed with this thought, when we see the wonderful rapidity of the spread of the Gospel.

In glancing back to the early part of the eighteenth century a general awakening having taken place, we find many associations and societies were formed. As early as 1701 the "Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts" was chartered and from that time down through the last two centuries, there have been societies organized by all churches; even the Moravians, noted for being so zealous in reform, when they were relieved from persecution, sent out their missionaries—the London Missionary Society, on the principle of embracing all denominations—and many others. The Tract Society was formed in 1799 and the Bible Society in 1804—institutions which are rightly termed the bone and sinew of missionary work.

In the year 1704 at a Baptist association held at Nottingham, it was decided that on the first Monday evening of each month, one hour should be devoted to solemn and special intercession for the revival of genuine religion, and the extension of the kingdom of Christ throughout the world—hence the origin of the monthly missionary prayer-meetings. We can truly bear testimony that God has heard and answered prayers. How true it is that the name of Christ is a secret power that sends men and women to mission fields, knowing those who preceded them have been persecuted and even murdered; but the same power holds them, though for years they see but little result from their labors.

Early in this century we read of missionaries who toiled for years before they had even one convert. Robert Morrison gave seven years to China, Adams ten to Port Natal, London Mission Society ten to Madagascar. One Society labors twenty-one years for twenty-one converts. Seed sown then and since, bring an abundant harvest, so that in the last ten years converts are counted by tens of thousands. Where there were five hundred and two missions fifty years ago, there are now *five thousand seven hundred and sixty-five*. Then, six hundred and fifty-six ordained missionaries, now, six thousand six hundred and ninety-six, with other laborers an army of forty thousand.

There are fifty-six churches in the Sandwich Islands, with 7,454 members. Last year they gave \$27,642 to home and foreign work, \$4,428 were for foreign missions. The Japan missions which have been so prosperous were started by the Christian converts of these Islands. American missionaries arrived there in 1820, found

the people, without a religion; the whole nation having, under the teaching of Vancouver, destroyed their temples, furniture and idols, were anxious for Christian teachers. They were sent, and a great work has been accomplished. It was in this country that sixty families were led to renounce idolatry through the influence of one copy of St. John's Gospel.

So the work progresses. Where help has been sent to the heathen years ago, they in turn are sending the Gospel to those who are still groping in darkness. The desire for religious instruction is fast increasing. An eagerness to buy the Word of God, where two years ago they would not accept it as a gift, tells us that prejudices are being broken down, and that the light of the Gospel is breaking in many hearts. The British and Foreign Bible Society average nearly 10,000 copies of Scripture issued each working day, that is, Bibles, Testaments, and small portions, or 2,938,000 for the last year, being an increase of 92,000 more than the year 1881. It would almost seem, with the active endeavors of Bible Societies, missionaries, and colporteurs, all the world would soon have the Word of God and Gospel teaching. Indeed, they are doing a great work amid persecutions that we know nothing of; especially in Papal countries do they meet with abuse of all kinds, but trusting in the Lord they go forward in their work, extending their journeys over mountains and through valleys, sowing the good seed of the Word of God.

How precious the promise of God must be to those workers when he says, "For as the rain cometh down and the snow from heaven, and returneth not thither, but watereth the earth and maketh it bring forth and bud, that it may give seed to the sower, and bread to the eater, so shall my word be that goeth forth out of my mouth, it shall not return unto me void, but it shall accomplish that which I please, and prosper in the thing whereunto I sent it." Much has been done, and still there remains much to do. The harvest is still great and the laborers are few. In looking at what has been done, we would say very naturally the work will soon be accomplished, but let us look (giving no attention to other lands) at India, the field in which we are particularly interested, and where our beloved missionary, Miss Hooper, is giving her life work. There are millions of people there without a teacher. We do not wonder that the call comes from our missionaries: Have you no more workers to send, Are there no more men and women who will give their lives to India? They are praying and waiting for help. Will their prayers be answered or their waiting be in vain? It is estimated that there are over a hundred millions of females who cannot read, and consequently are beyond the reach of the Gospel, even though they had the Bible in their own lan-

guage—which they have not—there are races for whom neither versions nor colporteurs exist. No word of God, no voice of prayer. It is true they have priests, but they are *impostors* and *murderers*; altars, but they are stained with human blood; and objects of worship, but they sacrifice to devils and not to God. Dr. Harris says: "Look at them—their demon worship is over; but are they satisfied? How eager their looks! how objectless and restless their movements! how the living mass of misery heaves, and surges, and groans, and travails in pain together! Look at them once more! they are travellers into eternity; mark how vast the procession they form, how close their ranks, how continuous the line, how constant and steady the advance toward the great eternity." We must soon meet them. Oh, that we might remember that we are living in the very world for which Christ died in *agony*; those very scenes which hardly raise an emotion in us, are the ones which moved the heart of God, which produced the cross of Christ, *which* paid the price of our redemption; "That if one died for all, then were all dead; and that he died for all, that they who live should not henceforth live unto themselves, but unto Him who died for them and rose again." With lives thus consecrated we will give or do what God requires, giving our money, our talents, our lives for his service.

The Fourteenth Annual Session of the F. C. Baptist Sabbath School Convention was called to order (in the absence of the President, Rev. A. Kinney,) by the senior Vice President, Rev. Joseph Noble.

Opened by Singing and Prayer by Rev. G. N. Ballentine. Minutes of previous meeting read and approved.

Bro. E. C. Freeze, Sabbath School Agent, submitted his Annual Report, as follows:

MR. PRESIDENT.—In compliance with my official duty, I wish now, through you, to lay before Conference my Annual Statistical Report of the Sabbath Schools of the Denomination. Annually it has been my lot to complain of the evident want of interest in some whose duty it is to assist in furnishing the necessary information, out of which to prepare my Report; this year is no exception; yet, glancing over my past reports and comparing them with the present, there is evidently a marked improvement in the results of our schools as reported.

My first endeavor to report statistics was the production of a very meagre amount of information; gradually, we are now able to secure a knowledge of the condition of nearly every school in connection with our churches.

This year, we have for the first time a report from the 1st District. Notwithstanding but one school is reported, still it gives encouragement that a better result may soon be reached. From the 2nd District we have a report of 19 schools; from the 3rd 11; from the 4th 7 reported; from the 5th I have received the usual report, giving an account of eight schools, from the 6th District 18 schools are reported, and in the 7th District we have 12 schools, making a total of 76 schools in which are taught by 423 teachers 4269 pupils, or an average of about 10 to each class or teacher. The amount of money raised in these schools is reported at \$1120.98. The Books used in the several schools amount to 8861 vols., which when compared to last year's report, and those of former years, an advance is observable all along the line. It may be remarked here, that in some sections of our province there are many Sabbath Schools classed under the head of *Union*, in which the F. B. element largely enters, which do not appear in this Report; for instance, in Carleton County there are 76 Sabbath Schools in operation, while but 18 are classed as belonging to the F. C. Baptist Denomination, and under the head of *Union* there are 29. From the well known F. C. Baptist element in this County, we may safely conclude a large proportion of the pupils in the *Union* Sabbath Schools are from Free Baptist families.

As intimated last year, Carleton County has taken an advance movement in the Sabbath School cause well worthy the imitation of the other Counties of the Province. The Convention, organized in this County, has already awakened a deeper interest in the cause; this should induce the members of this Conference to take an active part in like organizations in their respective Counties upon their return home.

In closing my report, I wish to remark:—To the children we must look, largely, for our numerical increase in the Churches for the future. While we may still extend our borders as a Denomi-

nation, yet a large interest lies within the families of our own denomination; hence too much care cannot be bestowed upon our schools, to make them not only attractive but instructive as well. Teachers must learn to teach the hearts of the children with God's Word.

It is worthy of note that but few conversions are reported from our Sabbath Schools this year, which is not the most favorable part of this Report. May we not hope that, before the time for another Annual Report, we may have the privilege of hearing of a larger ingathering of the lambs into the fold of Christ.

Wishing not to weary you, I beg to submit the foregoing as my Annual Report.


