

No public moneys will be reaeived by Disits which fail to establish Schools under the ct. It will be observed that the amount Provincial and County moneys to be exaded in any District in aid of Schools will spend almost exclusively upon local exertion, the direct efforts made by the people of the yeral Districts in maintaining their own depend almost exclusively upon tocal exerton, or the direct efforts made by the people of the several Districts in maintaining their own Schools. The sum to be received by the Teacher from the Province is definite, but the exact amount that will be received by the Trustees from the County Fund on account of the average attendare of pupils, cannot be known at the time of the School meeting. The meeting should, therefore, be carcital in voting its estimates to authorize a sum amply sufficient to enable the Trastees to meet the liabilities of the School year.
