He said any one who stops to consider the expense of running three Legislatures, with all the machinery of Government, for three small Provinces, and to contrast it with the expense of running one united body, must feel satisfied in his own mind that a saving would be effected by union. First, there would be a saving of \$16,000 to the whole country on the salaries of Governors, as well as a fursalaries of Governors, as well as a fur-ther saving of many thousands of dollars to the three Provinces concerned in keep-ing up establishments which under union will be dispensed with. There will be WEAKENED FRAME will be dispensed with. There will be a further saving in Executive management and in Legislative expenses. The Executive, the expenses of the three Provinces range as high as \$54,470 - bc-ing \$21,650 for Nova Scotia, \$21 270 for New Brunswick, and \$11,550 for Prince Edward Island. Under the scheme of union, as he would propose it, a saving in this class of expenditure of \$18,870 would be effected.

The next saving would be in Legislative expenses. At present the cost is \$91,853, being \$40,837 for Nova Scotia, \$31,192 for New Brunswick, and \$19,823 for Prince Edward Island. Under the scheme of Union he proposed to lessen

for Prince Edward Island. Under the scheme of Union he proposed to lessen this expense \$36,381. By dispensing with the three Houses of Assembly, which comprise 109 members, and three Legislative Councils, and establishing one House of Assembly of 60 members, and one Legislative Council of 20 members, the cost of the former would be \$27,849, and of the latter \$8,531. This, of course, simply embraces the pay and travelling expenses of members, but there must be added the ordinary expenses of machinery for carrying on these bodies, which figured at \$17,070, and added to the sums already given, would make the total cost something in the neighborhood of \$53,351.
