SONS OF TEMPERANCE GAINING GROUND

Large and Steady Increase of Order in British Islands During last Twenty Years.

On Dec. 31, 1890, the Sons of Temperance in the British Islands had 440 Divisions, 26,693 adult members, 229 sections, with 7,559 juvenile members, and accumulated capital of £102,087.

On Dec. 31, 1910, the figures were: 1,099 Divisions; 97,262 adult members; 958 sections and 73,836 juvenile members, with capital of £480,801, again in twenty years of 659 Divisions, 738 sections, 70,599 adult members, 66,277 juvenile members and £378,804.

The gain for 1910 was 2,577 adult members and 4,675 juveniles, total, 7,152, whilst the branches increased by 90 and the funds by £44,696.

The I. O. G. T. in Britain are about as numerous, and statistics point out that the consumption of liquor in that country has for the last few years steadily decreased.

In New Brunswick the Sons of Temperance number about 3,000, of whom more than 600 are in the Kent and Northumberland District Division. The I. O. G. T. in New Brunswick has also about 3,000 members in Miramichi, Westmorland, Albert, Charlotte and the St. John River Counties.

TOWN COUNCIL DISCUSS ST. EXTENSION

A meeting of the Town Council was held on Tuesday evening. His Worship Mayor McDonald presiding over a full attendance of councillors.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and confirmed. Communication received from Mr. John B. Christopher re the continuing of Hillside Street, westward to afford an outlet to tenants south of the I. C. R. tract on Christopher's land. Heretofore the tenants were allowed over private property to Gerrard Street, but this property having changed hands, the people are now debarred from using this way. After discussion on the Communication which elicited the fact that some of the landowners in the vicinity were willing to give land for street purposes to the town a special committee comprising Councillors Miller and White were appointed to interview Mr. R. L. Duncan regarding a proposed street.

Communication was read from Mrs. Robert Nelson regarding the dumping ground and after discussion on this question the Town Engineer was instructed to prepare plans and submit estimates for a proposed dump, lying ground at the new power station.

The chairman of the various committees presented their reports recommending payment of accounts which were all received and adopted as follows:—Councillor Lunan from Police and Licenses accounts amounting to \$48.30; Councillor Miller from Finance committee \$7.25; Councillor Moore from Public Charities committee \$76.00; Councillor Alexander from Water and Sewerage committee \$457.81; Councillor Pinault from Public Property and Streets committee \$170.08; Councillor White from Fire Protection committee, \$59.50.

Councillor Moore reported from the special committee to look into the matter of a site for a p. or house. Various properties had been looked over but the committee felt they could make no recommendation at present.

Councillor Pinault reported that the claim of Furlong an employee of the Town for compensation in respect of injuries received while at work on the streets had been settled and was being dealt with by the insurance company.

Council then adjourned.

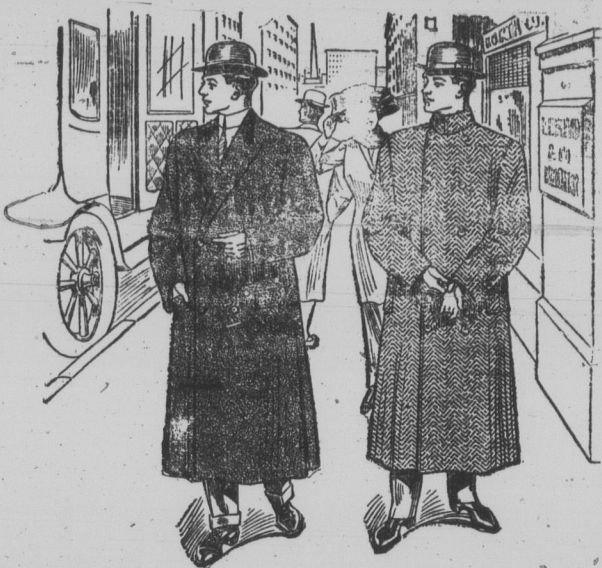
NO PROTESTS

PUBLICATIONS OF THE INTERNATIONAL AGRICULTURAL INSTITUTE

The new number of the bulletin "The Publications of the International Agricultural Institute" gives the latest data concerning the Wheat, Rye, Barley, Oat and Corn crops of the world.

Estimates of the wheat crop received by the Institute from twenty countries of the Northern Hemisphere (Austria and the Ottoman Empire being the only important omissions) show a total of 3,048,927,000 bushels compared with 3,034,879,000 for the same countries last year. The 1911 production of the countries so far reported is thus 100.5% of last year's production.

No estimates have yet been made for the countries of the southern Hemisphere—Australia, New Zealand, Argentina and Chile, whose harvest will begin in December.

For fifteen countries reporting the rye crop of 1911 is 1,364,804,000 bushels compared with 1,416,169,000 for the same countries last year.

Estimates for barley in 18 countries show a total of 1,127,858,000 bushels compared with 1,128,121,000 last year.

The oat crop of 17 countries so far reported is 2,888,221,000 bushels compared with 3,151,125,000 last year.

The bulletin contains many brief articles and summaries of articles, written by scientific experimenters and others, which have appeared in official bulletins and other trustworthy publications issued by the foremost agricultural countries of the world.

References are made to the following subjects, which are of peculiar interest:

The Karite or Butter-tree grows in Central Africa and from it a vegetable butter is produced. The tree grows to a height of nearly 54 feet. The butter is made from the fatty substance found in the seeds. The butter has a slight odor of cocoa. It finds a ready sale in European markets.

An item refers to the product of a cross between the tomato and the pepper, known as the peppertomato. In appearance, it resembles the tomato. As the tomato and pepper plants are closely related, it is supposed that the tomato blossom was fertilized with the pollen from the capecucum.

It has been concluded by an Italian investigator, who has gone deeply into the study of the form and performance of cows, that the largest production of milk corresponds with the largest girth and the heaviest weight of the animal. Under the head of Farm Machinery a description is given of an electric wind motor used in Danish agriculture.

The apparatus includes a windmill, a dynamo, a battery with automatic accumulators, a switchboard, and an automatic tension regulator for lighting purposes. The installation expenses for a farm with 40 incandescent lamps and a 3 to 5 horse power motor is said to be about \$1435.

A method of determining the age of eggs is described. It is to float the eggs in a large tumbler of water in which has been dissolved a tablespoonful of ordinary table salt. An egg one day old will fall to the bottom of the glass; if older it does not reach the bottom; if three days old, it sinks only just below the surface and the older the egg, the more it protrudes above the surface of the liquid.

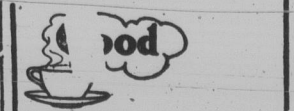

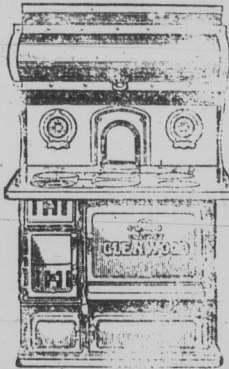

K. & N. DISTRICT DIVISION

The Kent-Northumberland district division report, submitted by Rev. R. H. Stavert, District W. P. and H. H. Stuart, District Scribe, showed a membership of between 600 and 700 in 15 divisions, and a balance of \$31.68 on hand; and recommended the endorsement of amendments to the C. T. Act and Provincial License Laws proposed at its sessions of January 20th and April 7th last, viz:

That impositions of liquor in districts under Canada Temperance Act or Provincial local option should be prohibited except by Vendors appointed by Government and residing within such districts, that persons arrested for drunkenness be compelled to tell where and from whom they obtained their liquor, imprisonment to be the penalty for those refusing to tell; that no prescriptions from medical men residing outside of such districts be obtainable except where medical man nearest to the patient resides in an adjoining municipality; and that the Dominion and Provincial governments take the necessary steps not only to carry into effect the above recommendations but also to make in all other respects their laws relating to sale of liquors as effective as the laws of Nova Scotia, which provide: That the finding of liquor on any premises shall be, until the contrary is proved, deemed evidence of intent to sell, although no barroom appliances may be present; law officers to have power to search for and seize liquor without warrant, the finding of liquor concealed or falsely labelled to be prima facie evidence of intent to violate the law; prosecutions for second offence to immediately follow first convictions, and no appeal from decisions of stipendiary magistrates.

STATE OF THE ORDER

In the afternoon the report of the committee on the state of the order—Rev. C. Flemington, Petitioner; Rev. R. H. Stavert, Harcourt; Rev. W. J. Kirby, Albert; Rev. W. R. Robinson, St. John; and Ald. H. H. Stuart, Newcastle—was adopted section by section and as a whole. It read as follows:

Your committee on the state of the order, beg leave to report that they find in the papers put into their hands at this annual session of the grand division, very much to encourage them.

1. Notwithstanding the usual leakage through withdrawals and suspensions, we are gratified to note that our present membership is 2,948, an increase of 363 over last year.

2. We are also pleased to note that the financial condition of the grand division is so good, there being a balance on hand of \$282.65.

3. Our energetic G. W. P. has been in labors abundant throughout the year, visiting many divisions and by constant correspondence keeping in touch with all parts of the work.

4. Our newly appointed grand scribe has also done a lot of effective work for the order and for the cause of temperance and social reform, and has proved a worthy successor of the noble and faithful men who have filled this most important office in the past.

5. We note with great satisfaction the good work done by our grand patron, and would urge upon the membership the importance of young people's work.

6. Some of our district divisions have done excellent work holding successful public meetings and encouraging local divisions. We congratulate our workers in the districts of St. John and Kent and Northumberland on the recent local option victories in the parishes of Lancaster and Richibucto.

7. We realize how much our work could be strengthened and extended by the employment of a lecturer and organizer, and would recommend the Grand Division to authorize the propagation committee to take the matter into consideration at once and appoint such officer, if finances permit.

8. In many places in this province serious complaints are being made as to the method in which our liquor laws are being enforced. In too many cases where fines should be imposed according to law, a loose system of periodical charges and fines amounting to a license fee is in vogue. Your committee feels that both in license and local option districts there should be strict enforcement of the law, and we recommend that prompt action be taken to place the responsibility for negligence upon the guilty parties and enforce compliance with the law. To this end we recommend the immediate appointment of a commission by this Grand Division, to consist of five members in St. John and corresponding members in the main centres of population throughout the province whose object shall be to thoroughly investigate all violations of our liquor laws, ascertain who are the guilty parties and make representations accordingly.

9. Now that three-fourths of the population of the province of N. B. is under local option and the goal of provincial prohibition is already in sight, your committee feels that a strong determined effort should be

Temperance Federation to convene a representative gathering of all temperance orders and societies for the purpose of adopting a policy which shall receive the support of all the workers with a view to obtaining a provincial prohibitory law.

The following residents of St. John

were appointed the central committee, as laid down by section 8 J. R. Woodburn, Alfred Burley, E. S. Hennigar, Joseph Stark, and Rev. W. R. Robinson.

The appointment of corresponding members of the commission was directed to be made through the central commission.

It was decided, in case an organizer was put in the field, to discontinue special grants to district divisions for propagation purposes.

After passing usual votes of thanks, the Grand Division adjourned.

ORGANIZER SELECTED

After the public meeting the Propagation Committee, met at Mr. H. Ingram's, and offered the position of Grand Organizer to Rev. R. H. Stavert the work to begin about December 1st. Mr. Stavert asked for time to consider.

PLEBISCITE ON CANADIAN NAVY

General Election Advocated by Some After Redistribution Bill is Passed

Ottawa, Oct. 24.—There is belief in some quarters that the plan of a plebiscite on the naval question may be coupled with a general election a couple of years hence, after a distribution bill is put through. It is argued that if the government is going to the expense of taking a vote upon the navy, it would be unfair not to take advantage of the opportunity to give the west the additional representation to which redistribution will entitle them. Advocates of this plan claim with so strong a majority as it now has, the Borden government would run no risk in making an appeal to the people, and it would come back with its base of power considerably extended. The whole question will be thoroughly threshed out in caucus soon after Parliament meets.

A SUMMER IN THE ROCKIES

Mr. A. O. Wheeler, E. R. G. S., Director of the Alpine Club of Canada, has just returned to Vancouver from a summer spent in the Canadian Rockies in the vicinity of the Yellowhead Pass, and is greatly impressed with his trip.

In an interview with Mr. Wheeler, he stated "It has been the general impression that the Rocky Mountains of Canada attain their greatest average height—very far north of the Robson, which dominates the region of Yellowhead Pass, but the population was that there was not a single peak in the neighborhood of the Yellowhead Pass, which would pass through a region of little interest from a point of view of the tourist mountaineer.

There was no mistake about Mount Robson. It is without doubt, as was stated by one of the most travelled and skilled mountaineers of the day, Dr. Norman Collie, one of the most magnificent mountains in the world, which seen from the south, he view the is most familiar; or from beautiful Berg lake, it still stands supreme. In the hundred mile circuit of the great massif on all sides we found mighty snow-clad peaks, wide-spread snowfields, huge ice falls, rushing torrents, waterfall-flower-clad meadows and vast stretches of dark pine forest. Many of the peaks were named by the surveyors, but they are legion, and it will be many years before they are familiarly known as individual mountains."

In speaking of the Robson Glacier, which lies on the east side of the monstrous mountain Mr. Wheeler said: "It struck us dumb with amazement that any-

thing so stupendous, so fearful, so undreamed of should exist. At our feet flowed the great river of ice, every crevasse, every moraine, every icefall, clearly portrayed. Directly opposite rose the massive, its outlines clear from base to summit, to fully 8000 feet. From the beautiful meadows at the head of the mountain, twenty-five peaks were counted all unknown. All lakes, which perhaps held the most beautiful scenery in the Canadian Rockies, were every-where.
