COMMON COUNCIL.

At Wednesday's meeting of the Council,  
the increase of salary asked for by  
Constable Stockford and Harbour Inspector  
O'Brien were refused. So also was  
the increase asked for by some of the  
ferry employees.

The law requiring all houses to be  
numbered is to be rigidly enforced.  
\$1,000 are to be spent on repairs to the  
Market building. Messrs. Farling and  
Hastings are to have the privilege con-  
tinued of entrance to their Market  
Street properties on paying \$2 per foot  
frontage; and Messrs. McCafferty & Daly  
were granted the same privilege on the  
same terms as last year.

Necessary repairs to the ferry approach  
etc., etc., were ordered, to cost \$2,000.  
On recommendation of the Western  
Lands Committee the order of the Board  
of 29th March 1882, granting a portion  
of Rodney Ship for use as a dry dock, was  
rescinded.

The contract for re-planking South  
Market wharf was awarded D. W.  
Clarke & Sons, at \$275.  
Leave was granted some of the fire de-  
partment to go to Fredericton on Dominion  
Day, but a motion that \$50 be voted  
towards paying their expenses did not find  
a second.

Sir Leonard Tilley's letter to the Mayor,  
enclosing cheque for \$200, was read.  
The Sewerage Committee were asked to  
thority to issue \$50,000 debentures to put  
down necessary sewers. Referred to Finance  
Committee.

The Salvage Corps asked to have con-  
trol of themselves and property taken out  
of the hands of Chief Engineer Kerr and  
voted in their favour. Referred.

The communication from the Portland  
Council in reference to the re-appointing  
of Chief Engineer Kerr was referred to  
the General Committee.

It was ordered that action be at once  
taken to compel owners of unoccupied lots  
to put up proper fences.

A Band Stand is to be erected on King  
Square at once.

James Cullinan asked to be paid \$300  
the value of two horses drowned from the  
ferry boat. Referred to a Special  
Committee.

The question of providing a new fence  
for the old burial ground was referred to  
the General Committee.

Ald. Colwell complained that certain  
Carlton streets are encumbered with ad-  
vertisements. The policeman has reported  
the matter time and again, but no action  
has been taken. The Alderman threat-  
ened that unless something is done to  
remove the nuisance, he will at the next  
meeting move a resolution that the  
Police Magistrate do his duty.

The Council after disposing of a num-  
ber of petitions, bills, etc., adjourned.

TELEGRAPHIC.

LONDON, June 7.—In the House of Com-  
mons this afternoon, Mr. O'Donnell, mem-  
ber for Dungarvon, gave notice that he  
would move that the appointment of the  
Governor-General as Governor-  
Marquis of Lansdowne as Governor-  
General of Canada was calculated to excite  
grave discontent among the oppressed Irish  
in Ireland who look upon the appointment  
as in no sense a conciliatory movement on  
the part of the Government and among free  
Canadians.

Sir W. Harcourt, Home Secretary, read  
the letter from Lord Rosebery, in which the  
Governor-General had not resigned the office  
of Under Secretary for the Home Sec-  
retary because of the Home Secretary's  
statement in the House touching his duties.  
Sir W. Harcourt explained that Lord Rose-  
bery's acceptance of office in the first place  
was only temporary.

In reply to a question relative to the  
American Labor Reform League, Sir W.  
Harcourt said the Government were per-  
fectly alive to the necessity of paying atten-  
tion to such matters.

Lord Randolph Churchill called attention  
to the mission of Mr. Errington to Rome  
and argued there could be no doubt that the  
Government had recommended him to the  
Papal Government. This morning he will  
visit Plymouth and thence proceed to Cleve-  
land and Yarmouth. Digby is the first in the  
diocese, outside of Halifax, to receive the  
ministrations of Archbishop O'Brien.—H.  
Chronicle, 12th.

CONCERT.—On Tuesday evening last,  
Barnes' Hall, Hampton, was crowded,  
the occasion being a concert under the aus-  
pices of St. Alphonsus T. A. Society. The  
organists and instrumentalists were from St.  
John and Portland. The singing of the  
Missa Solenne was of the best; the Messrs.  
Latham sang a duet; Mr. P. W. Latham,  
a solo; Miss J. Lawlor and Miss L. Sul-  
livan also sang with good effect. The  
B. McGowan and M. L. Harrison furnished  
choice selections on the cornet and violin.  
Hon. Mr. Ritchie gave a brief and elegant  
address. The audience seemed to be en-  
tirely pleased with the whole entertain-  
ment.

AGRICULTURE.—An agreement has not yet  
been reached as to the terms on which the  
proposed double rail line between Han-  
lan and Lee and Conley and Hamlin shall  
take place. The Halifax Rowing Association,  
at a meeting held on Monday night decided  
to make a start, viz.: To substitute New  
London, Conn., for Campbellton, and agree  
to row at that place, Point of Pines of  
Maranock, allowing Hanlan and Lee  
as before, to suggest two of the three at  
which they would be willing to row, and  
the Halifax Association to select the  
place, or that the latter suggest two of  
the places, and the former to select the  
place, and the latter to select the place.  
Hanlan asks the modest sum of \$5,000 to  
exhibit himself on the Miramichi. There  
is very little hope of his getting it.  
Albert Hamlin, of Halifax is to row in the  
single scull race at Pullman, Illinois, on the  
22nd inst.

As inmate named Charles Rouse,  
supposed to belong to St. John, has again  
been in the Moncton police a good deal of trouble.  
When arrested he had in his possession a  
revolver cocked and loaded which was  
wrested out of his hand before he could use  
it. During the night at the lockup he at-  
tempted to commit suicide by cutting his  
throat, and then after blowing out all the  
lights made his escape. He was re-  
captured.

PORTLAND CITY COUNCIL.

The regular meeting was held on Monday  
evening.

Mr. Wm. Bertman, in a communication,  
asked the attention of the Council to a re-  
taining wall which is causing damage to  
property on Wall Street. Referred to a  
committee to examine into the matter and  
report.

An application from some Portlanders  
residing in the City of Portland, to have  
placed a license license was referred to the  
Licensing Committee.

Mr. P. McGoldrick wrote that he pur-  
chased a lot of land to hold for the city in  
1877 that a road might be built through  
it to Port Hope. The matter was referred  
to the City Engineer.

The Sewerage Commissioners presented a  
report in which they state that the best  
mode of dealing with the sewage is to  
construct a large box drain to run off the  
polluted water. They recommended that this  
work be attended to as soon as possible.

The appointment of a Solicitor was re-  
ferred to the City Engineer.

A report of the part of the City Engineer  
in the Centennial celebration was ordered  
to be entered in the City Engineer's  
minutes. Some details of the celebration  
of the Council were extended to the Mayor  
of St. John for the courtesy extended to  
them on that occasion.

Kerr's conduct on that occasion was a gross  
abuse to the citizens of Portland and its  
degradation, and that the Mayor and  
Council should be informed of the conduct  
of their Chief Engineer and of the  
result which the Council felt was  
necessary to be taken by him, and  
that a copy of the resolution be sent to  
the Corporation of the City of St. John.

On motion a resolution was passed  
that the City Engineer be removed from  
office and that the City Engineer be  
re-appointed.
