





ENGLISH AND FRENCH ARE ONE IN CANADA

Official Eye-witness Hopeful Over Outcome of Present War in Cementing Union of Ancient Foes

Sir Max Aitkin, writing as official eye-witness with the Canadian Forces, argues from history that Britain and France, English and French Canada are forever united. He closes with eloquent reference to Crecy and Joan of Arc. Sir Max says, in part: Empire is not inconsistent with liberty; none the less the reconciliation of French Canada to the Empire was one of peculiar difficulty because of the secular antagonism between Great Britain and France. In Europe we have fought feudal France and monarchial France and the republican France and imperial France. Times out of number our ancestors, whose blood still flows red in our veins and whose thoughts dominate our thoughts struggled flercely against each other at Crecy, Blenheim, Minden, Busaco and Waterloo; and, far beyond the European empires the conflict extended, from the plains of the Ganges to the mouth of the Mississippi.

But we always fought each other as plain men and brave men should. Even Napoleon, who is sometimes credited with the invention of many modern Prussian doctrines, was a strict observer of the rules of war. With the Anglo-French Alliance vanished the last great obstacle to a thorough union of the two races of the Dominion.

Ancient Wars Unite Us

We come back to the poet for the reason why the two great Western races of Europe are reconciled. Kipling seizes at once on the battles of long ago as the very reason for our mutual liking. On Historic Ground

INVENTED LEE-ENFIELD

Canadian Made Greatest Discovery . Which Germans Stole

It is not generally known that the Lee-Enfield rifle was invented by a Canadian, the late James P. Lee, of Galt. In an article in the Reporter of that city, the former editor, Mr. J. P. Jaffray, tells the story of Lee. As a boy he doted on firearms, and as a young man went over the border and started a gun factory in Milwaukee. During the Civil War he made the Lee carbine for the Northern cavalry, and after the war joined the staff of the Remingtons at Ilion, N.Y., where he designed a number of sporting rifles. He evolved the "magazine" system of loading and perfected it during a vacation in Galt and made other improvements still in use. He went over to London and had his weapon adopted by the War Office. Mr. Jaffray says: "In the Remington and Hartford shops, where Mr. Lee constructed his gun, there worked at the time one Mauser and one Krag. Both these men stole the Lee inventions, and other foreign Governments were quick to secure them. But the Lee-Enfield is still the best of the lot, s worth in hundreds according to all accounts. And it was an old Canadian boy-an old Galt boy British soldier." The Lee-Enfield has been remodeled more than once since James P. Lee perfected it. The short rifle of to-day is probably a great deal lighter than the original design, but the working principles of it are substantially the same.

SAVING AUTO TIRES

Most people, ignoring the simplest precautions in driving, more than double the wear on their tires, and so are out repeatedly the cost of a new set, writes a tiremaker. Some of the driving faults and the troubles they cause he lists thus:

Jamming brakes hard down or starting suddenly puts unnecessary strains on the tire fabric.

GOOD HORSE POINTERS

Sudden Changes in Feed-The in-foal Mare

A horse which has been idle during the winter months cannot be expected to suddenly start hard spring work without preparation. Exercise the work horses in the barnyard and gradually change to light and then heavy work. The over-fat, soft horse requires the most attention and loses most weight when put on heavy work. Sudden changes in feed cause stomach and other troubles, often the loss of the horse; feed in proportion to work done. You will find the following rations good: For light work-Equal parts oats and bran, % of a pound per hundred pounds live weight, with good clean hay, 1 pound per hundred pounds live weight. For heavy work -Gradually change the above ration to one of oats, 5 parts, and bran, 1 part, fed in the proportion of 1 to 11/4 pounds per hundred pounds live

weight and hay as above. Be sure that in-foal mare is not too fat and is getting regular exercise or, better, light work. Overfeeding of brood mares just before and after foaling is the cause of much of the digestive disorders and mortal ity in foals. Take special precautions against navel ill in foals, by thoroughly disinfecting the foaling box and also about the navel of the foal. After foaling, give the mare a warm drink only for the first few hours. Then start a light daily grain ration, gradually increasing until she is on full feed, in about a week. It is as important to feed for milk in the mare as in the dairy cow; a grain mixture of oats, 6 parts; bran, 3 parts; and oil cake meal, 1 part, will give good

Measuring the Wind

At all British ports are wind measuring instruments, or anemometres (anemos-wind), the reading of which is of great importance to the sailing vessels. The anemometer measures wind speed; it is like a weather vane, with cups instead of letters at the ends of its arms. The cups, catching the wind, whiz round, and thus turn the central shaft. This passes down into a box in which are several dials. The indicators of those dials are connected with the shaft, and move according to its revolutions. Thus the number of revolutions of the cup in a certain time gives the exact speed in miles per hour.




